Deputy Headteacher's message to parents

Key Stage 4 allows more time for students to study subjects in more depth, and an element of choice is introduced. This information contains an overview of courses available at Key Stage 4. It is designed to help pupils and parents understand the implications of option choices and to assist pupils, in particular, to make wise choices.

All pupils in Key Stage 4 will study the core subjects. Pupils will be asked to choose subjects from the Option Subjects provided within this information. Whilst making choices of subjects, it is beneficial to keep careers and further education plans in mind, however, many Y9 students are not yet sure about their future career plans. It is, therefore, important for the majority of pupils to concentrate on a broad and balanced education. It is also advisable to assess the academic study required by different subjects and to consider the assessment methods used in each subject. Whilst some subjects are 100% examination, others have an element of controlled assessment. Some of the courses are traditional GCSEs and others are vocational and technical awards.

It has always been important for pupils to make informed choices based on their own strengths, as once choices have been made, the scope for change is limited. It is also the case that, with regret, we may have to allocate pupils a reserve choice for popular subjects or those that are not popular enough to be run.

This table explains how many hours of lesson time will be allocated to each subject. The number of hours per subject may change in Y11 depending on the needs of the cohort.

Pupils studying triple science will do 12 hours of Science, plus an additional 1 hour of English and 2 additional hours of Maths per fortnight.





English Baccalaureate

The English Baccalaureate is a measure of success in core academic subjects; specifically English, Mathematics, History or Geography, the Sciences and a Language.

These are subjects most likely to be required or **preferred** for entry to degree courses. Pupils wishing to apply for Sixth Form and University are strongly encouraged to follow an English Baccalaureate curriculum.

All pupils will study English, Mathematics and the Sciences as part of their Core Curriculum. Pupils are encouraged to choose to study a Language (French, Spanish & Mandarin) *and* a Humanity (History or Geography) as part of option subjects. All students will need to choose at least <u>one</u> humanities or language subject.







What courses are there?

On the page 10, there is a table with **17** different courses to choose from. Each year these are reviewed, taking into account the teachers available to teach courses, the success rates of students in previous years and new courses that become available. The list may be different to those offered in previous years.

In the rest of this document, there are pages with a brief overview about each course, but more information can be found on the examboard websites if you want even more detail about them.

Many of the courses are GCSEs, but there are also some vocational courses that are BTECs, Cambridge Nationals, Level 1 /2 Vocational Awards and BTEC Tech Awards. These are assessed and graded in slightly different ways as explained on the next page. The main difference is in the style of learning. There is typically less focus on end of course exams in the vocational courses and more internal assessments.





How are the different types of qualifications graded?

All of our KS4 courses can result in either a Level 1 or 2 result. GCSES are graded 9-1 and Vocational

GCSE Courses are grade from L2 Distinction* - L1 Pass. Vocational courses have a points score equivalent which colleges use (for example a Level 2 Pass = 4 points) 9 **Distinction*** 8 7 Distinction evel 6 Merit N 5 Pass 4 3 **Distinction *** 2 Distinction eve Merit Pass U

Achieving a Level 2 qualification is Grade 4-9 at GCSE or L2 Pass-L2 **Distinction** *

Level 2 qualification grades lead to Level 3 courses at college or Level 3 Apprenticeships.

Achieving a Level 1 qualification is Grade 1-3 at GCSF or L1 Pass-L1 Distinction *

Level 1 qualification grades lead to Level 2 courses at college or Level 2 Apprenticeships.

In Hospitality and Catering, pupils can achieve either a Level 2 Pass, Merit or Disctinction. Those achieving less than a Level 2 pass can be awarded a Level 1 Pass. (There is no Merit or 4 Disctinction at level 1 in this course)

To achieve the EBACC you need to select either Geography and History and a Language, so to get the EBACC pick one these subjects from column B. Many top universities like students to have the EBACC suite of qualifications.

Choose 4 subjects in total

Choose 1 subject from Column A. Choose 3 subjects from Column B. Choose 1 reserve subject from each of Column A and 1 reserve subject from Column B

*It is not possible to choose Art and Design and Photography as they include similar content.

**You are not advised to choose Hospitality and Catering and also study Design Technology.

***You should only select one of these 2 subjects as they have some similarities.

Courses marked with a (V) are vocational courses. You are advised NOT to choose more than 1 of these. It may be possible to choose 2 after discussing this at school if you feel this is best for you.





The Option Process

DO Choose a subject because:

- You enjoy studying the subject
- You believe that you will gain success with the subject
- You understand that the subject will help you achieve future career goals

DO NOT choose a subject because :

- You think it is easy
- You like the teacher in that subject-you may not be taught by them next year
- Your best friend has chosen it.

You should do your best to find out about your choices and check they are right for you! You should think about the ways that courses are assessed. Do you think you are better at final exams, completing assessments in school, or a mixture of both.



What happens after the options forms are submitted.

We want to try and ensure that as many pupils as possible can choose the selection of options that they most want to study. This is why we give students the whole list and allow pupils to choose quite freely from the entire list. However, once we have pupils choices, we have to make a curriculum model and timetable that can be managed within our current staffing structure.

We spend a lot of time, finding a curriculum model that maximises the number of students who can take all of their preferred options, but there will always be some combinations that are not viable or some courses that are over subscribed.

If a particular combination of subjects is **not** possible in the timetable, then we will consider students reserve choices.

Where a subject is over-subscribed, we will consider how high a students preference was for the course - so we will try to ensure that all students are allocated their first and second choice options and they may be asked to take a reserve subject for their third or forth option.

If a pupil is asked to consider a reserve subject, a discussion will take place and parents will be informed.

Once the options choices are confirmed, students will receive confirmation of their options via a letter.



OPTION CHANGES

Occasionally, pupils may feel they have made a wrong decision with an option and may request a change. However, please note that not all requests for option change can be granted due to staffing and timetable schedules.

Requests for Option Changes must be submitted via a Google Options Change form. This can be found on the school website.

This will then be passed to Mrs Johnson, Deputy Headteacher.

The final deadline for all option changes is the end of **September 2024.** Requests after this time will not be considered due to pupils having missed a number of teaching hours in the subject they wish to change to.

SUBJECT: GCSE English Language (English Baccalaureate Subject)

Head of Faculty: Ms Jones GCSE Exam Board AQA

Course Description

The English Language GCSE assesses the skills of reading and writing. In this GCSE pupils will develop their skills of inference and deduction which will equate to 50% of their final English Language GCSE. Pupils will also develop their writing skills which will involve writing creatively and for a specific purpose.

Assessment

The course is 100% exam with pupils sitting two papers at the end of Year 11: Paper 1: 'Explorations in Creative Writing and Reading' (50% of final GCSE) Paper 2: 'Writer's Viewpoints and Perspectives' (50% of final GCSE). All pupils will also undertake a Spoken Language Endorsement which will be videoed and teacher assessed.

SUBJECT: GCSE English Literature (English Baccalaureate Subject)

Head of Faculty: Ms Jones

GCSE Exam Board AQA

Course Description

The Literature GCSE focuses on the skills of reading and inference, exploring characters, plot and themes within the social and historical context of the texts. In this GCSE pupils will study works of poetry, a play and a novel.

Assessment

The course is 100% exam with pupils sitting two papers at the end of the course: Paper 1 'Shakespeare and the 19th Century novel' (40% of final GCSE) Paper 2 'Modern texts and poetry' (60% of final GCSE).

The set texts currently studied are; Romeo and Juliet, The Sign of Four, An Inspector Calls and the Power and Conflict poetry collection.

SUBJECT: GCSE Mathematics (English Baccalaureate Subject)

Examination Board: Edexcel (with a view to other exam boards depending on pupil need)

Course Description

The GCSE covers six areas of the Mathematics National Curriculum and will build on work studied at Key Stage 3. These six areas are 'Number', 'Algebra', 'Ratio, proportion and rates of change', 'Geometry and measures', 'Probability' and 'Statistics'.

In Year 11, all pupils will sit 3 x 1.5 hours linear papers. This course is designed to test all aspects of the Mathematical course including their ability to solve problems.

SUBJECT: GCSE Science (English Baccalaureate Subject)

Head of Faculty: Mr Wigham

Examination Board:AQA

Course Description

All pupils at Shevington High School Study Trilogy Science at GCSE. Pupils will study Biology, Chemistry and Physics and it is worth **two GCSEs.** This will include practical work to aid understanding and help prepare you for further education. In Biology, pupils will study Classification, Inheritance and the Environment. In Chemistry, pupils will study the Earth, Acids, Metals and Fuels. In Physics, pupils will study Light, The Electromagnetic Spectrum, Waves and Energy.

Assessment

The assessment at the end of Year 11 will consist of a 6 x 1 ¼ hour written examination. There will be short answer questions, which will then build up to longer answers to test knowledge and understanding of the subject.

SUBJECT: GCSE Triple Sciences: Biology, Chemistry and Physics (English Baccalaureate Subjects)

Head of Faculty: Mr Wigham

Examination Board:AQA

Course Description

Pupils who have demonstrated a very high ability and understanding of science and maths can study the triple science courses at GCSE. This is usually the 'top ability pupils regularly achieving at the platinum level in Year 9.' Pupils will study Biology, Chemistry and Physics and it is worth three GCSEs. This will include practical work to aid understanding and help prepare pupils for further education. Pupils will study the same topics as for the Combined Science GCSEs and also additional content to provide a broader range of knowledge and understanding in the three main science disciplines. Pupils accepted on this option do 12 hours of Science lessons per fornight, as well as 2 extra hours of Maths and an extra hour of English.

Assessment

The assessment at the end of Year 11 will consist of a $6 \times 1 \frac{3}{4}$ hour written examinations. There will be short answer questions, which will then build up to longer answers to test pupils understanding of the subject.

Pupils will not be able to select Triple Sciences unless they are working at the highest levels in Science, Performance in Maths/English will also be considered. Typically this would be those currently in Set 1 of their Core Subjects. There are a limited number of places on this course in one class. so assessment scores will be used to select pupils if it is oversubscribed. Students can still be accepted onto Science A Level courses with the other Science GCSEs.



SUBJECT: GCSE Modern Foreign Languages - French & Spanish (English Baccalaureate Subjects)

All pupils are offered the opportunity to study for a language GCSE qualification in French, Spanish or Mandarin. The course covers three main themes as listed below:

Topics of study include climate change, poverty, deprivation, global shifts in economic power and the challenge of sustainable resource use. Students are also encouraged to understand their role in society, by considering different viewpoints, values and attitudes.

SUBJECT: Cambridge National in Creative iMedia

Head of Faculty: Mrs Storey

Examination Board: OCR

Course Description

This qualification will help you to develop knowledge, and understanding relating to different sectors, products and job roles that form the media industry. You will learn how media codes and conventions are applied to create digital media products which engage audiences. You will also learn the purpose of, and reasons for legislation applicable to the media industry and what media producers must do to comply with this legislation. In addition, you will gain an understanding of the properties and formats of media files. You will also learn how to develop visual identities for clients and apply the concepts of graphic design to create original digital graphics to engage target audiences. Units of work in this course will help you develop understanding and skills related to different digital media products from a number of sectors of the media industry including: designing and creating comic characters, planning animations with audio and using digital camera equipment to plan and capture photographs and video footage.

Non Exam Internal Assessment- 60%: 2 Components completed in class. Examination - 40%: 1 hour 30 min exam on Creative iMedia in the Industry. Overall this course is graded from Level 2 Distinction* to Level 1 Pass.

SUBJECT: ICT Technical Award

Head of Faculty: Mrs Storey

Examination Board: WJEC

Course Description: Learners will explore the wide range of uses of hardware, application and specialist software in society. Learners will investigate how information technology is used in a range of contexts, including business and organisations, education and home use of information technology. Unit 2 introduces learners to a broad working knowledge of databases, spreadsheets, automated documents and images and enables learners to apply their knowledge and understanding to solve problems.

Assessment objectives for this specification.

Learners must: AO1 Demonstrate knowledge and understanding from across the specification.

AO2 Apply skills, knowledge and understanding in a variety of contexts and in planning and carrying out investigations and tasks.

AO3 Analyse and evaluate information, making reasoned judgements and presenting conclusions.

Assessment: Unit 1 - On screen exam - 1 hour 20 minutes - 40%

Unit 2 - Controlled Assessment - 60%

Overall this course is graded from Level 2 Distinction* to Level 1 Pass.

SUBJECT: Computer Science (English Baccalaureate Subject)

Head of Faculty: Mrs Storey

Examination Board:OCR

Course Description

Computer Systems Unit 1-Introduces students to the central processing unit (CPU), computer memory and storage, wired and wireless networks, network topologies, system security and system software. It also looks at ethical, legal, cultural and environmental concerns associated with computer science.

Computational thinking, algorithms and programming Unit 2-Students apply knowledge and understanding gained in component 01. They develop skills and understanding in computational thinking: algorithms, programming techniques, producing robust programs, computational logic, translators and data representation. The skills and knowledge developed within this component will support the learner when completing the Programming Project. Students will learn to code their solutions in a suitable programming language, and check its functionality.

Practical programming-Students are to be given the opportunity to undertake a programming task(s) during their course of study which allows them to develop their skills to design, write, test and refine programs using a high-level programming language. Students will be assessed on these skills during the written examinations, in particular component 02 (section B).

This course is only suitable for pupils with a high aptitude and proven skills in Computer Programming. Strong skills in Maths are required to manage the demands of this course.



SUBJECT: GCSE Drama

Examination Board: AQA

Course Description

Component 1: Understanding Drama - 40% of the qualification. Students will visit the theatre to review a play alongside studying a complete play-text to prepare them for answering questions in an exam paper.

Component 2: Devising Drama - 40% of the qualification. Students will create and develop a devised piece of theatre for performance (from stimulus) and will document and evaluate the devising process.

Component 3: Text in Performance 20% of the qualification. Students will rehearse and perform 2 key extracts from a play to a visiting examiner.

SUBJECT: Design & Technology

Course Description

Design and Technology is an inspiring, rigorous and practical subject. Using creativity and imagination, pupils design and make products that solve real and relevant problems within a variety of contexts, considering their own and other's needs, wants and values.

Our course covers core technical, designing, and making principles, including a broad range of design processes, materials, techniques and equipment.

Assessment

The course consists of one controlled assessment project and one written exam. The controlled assessment is structured to give the pupils the opportunity to be creative within their designs and portfolios and stretch their technical skills.

SUBJECT: LEVEL 1/2 TECHNICAL AWARD IN HOSPITALITY AND CATERING

Examination Board: Eduqas

Course Description

This qualification is made up of 2 units.

Unit 1: The Hospitality and Catering industry

- Learn about the importance of nutrition and how cooking methods can impact on nutritional value.
- Learn how to plan nutritious menus as well as factors which affect menu planning. You will learn the skills
 and techniques needed to prepare, cook and present dishes as well as learning how to review your work
 effectively.

Unit 2: Hospitality and Catering in action

- Learn about the hospitality and catering industry, the types of hospitality and catering providers and about working in the industry.
- Learn about health and safety, and food safety in hospitality and catering

Assessment

You will be assessed through a written examination and an assignment.

Unit 1-40% Examination.

Unit 2-60% You will complete an assignment where you will plan and prepare a menu in response to a brief. This will take about 12 hours of lessons in school.

SUBJECT: GCSE Art

Course Description

This innovative course is best suited to those who wish to channel their creative energies into producing original art pieces that reflect their individuality, and to investigate and respond to the world around them. This course provides students with a wide range of creative, exciting and stimulating opportunities to explore their interests in Art and Design in independent ways. Students will study Art and Design in both breadth and depth. Students will be encouraged to take photographs, be inspired by artists and develop their work in creative ways using a variety of materials, for example clay and printing. It provides natural progression from Key Stage 3 and a strong and appropriate foundation for further progression to Art and Design related courses such as A-level.

Assessment

60% Controlled Assessment -2 distinct projects Waterlife Project and The Everyday 40% Externally set exam - January to March/April of Year 11)

SUBJECT: GCSE Art and Design : Photography

Course Description

The GCSE Photography course will challenge the way you see and take photographs from a variety of sources. You will use research to inspire your ideas and become analytical and critical about your own photography, picking apart the reasons you have taken the photograph. The lessons will consist of research, analysing photographers work, taking photographs, drawing, digital and physical manipulation of your photographs to produce a sketchbook/portfolio of your work. You will learn the basics about how to use a camera and photography equipment. This course is a great starting point if you would like to develop your photography skills in college and further education.

Course Description

The WJEC Eduqas specification in GCSE Film Studies is designed to draw on learners' enthusiasm for film and introduce them to a wide variety of cinematic experiences through films which have been important in the development of film and film technology. Learners will develop their knowledge of US mainstream film by studying one film from the 1950s and one film from the later 70s and 80s, thus looking at two stages in Hollywood's development. In addition, they will be studying more recent films – a US independent film as well as films from Europe, including the UK, South Africa and Australia. There is the opportunity to experience a powerful medium which inspires a range of responses from the emotional to the reflective as they are drawn into characters, their narratives and the issues films raise.

Assessment

Component 1: Written examination paper 1 hour 30 minutes (35% of qualification) - Development in US Film

Component 2: Written examination paper 1 hour and 30 minutes (35% of qualification) - Global Film: Narrative, Representation and Film Style

Component 3: Production Non-exam assessment - Film extract or screenplay with an evaluation. (30% of qualification)

SUBJECT: GCSE Music

Course Description

All pupils complete the AQA GCSE in Music. Pupils are encouraged to take private instrumental lessons and all are expected to bring their musical instrument and any relevant sheet music/books in addition to their regular equipment for school. This course is mainly coursework-based but does include a listening examination based on the musical elements of The Western Classical Tradition, Popular Music of the 20th and 21st Centuries and World Music. It is recommended that pupils begin to work towards Rockschool or ABRSM grading before commencement of this course.

Assessment

Controlled Assessment-60% - This includes individual performing and composing coursework for Component 2 and 3. Examination - 40%: There is a 1 hour and 30 minute examination for Component 1.

Assessment

This course is split into units - 1 externally assessed (exam) and 2 written set tasks (R185 / R187)

- Unit R184 Contemporary issues in Sport 1 written exam = 40%
- Unit R185 Coursework based: Sports Leadership Planning and delivering a practical session to improve the ability of others. Developing sports skills. Practical performance in 2 sports which are internally assessed by staff.
- Unit R187 Increasing awareness of Outdoor and Adventurous Activities

Both internally assessed units are worth 60%. In the internally assessed units students will produce pieces of coursework to meet the given criteria under the supervision of staff and done on Google Classroom.
