GIRLS LIKE THAT



Girls Like That explores gender equality, self-image, modern female friendship, and the pressures on today's digital generation. Buzz. Click. Pop. Flash. A text. An email. A message. When a naked photograph of Scarlett circulates around a school and goes viral, she becomes the centre of attention – but for all the wrong reasons. While rumours spread across smartphones like wildfire, the battle lines are drawn. It is girl against girl and everyone forms an opinion. Her reputation becomes toxic, threatening to shatter the clique of girls she has grown up with. But how long can Scarlett remain silent? And why isn't it the same for boys? Girls Like That is based loosely on the story of Amanda Todd, a 15-year-old girl from British Columbia who died by suicide after being lured to send an explicit photograph online.
