
## YEAR 8 KNOWLEDGE ORGANISER - SUMMER 2 THE CURIOUS INCIDENT

KEY TERMINOLOGY					
1	Ensemble				A group of performers who switch roles throughout the play.
2	Flashback				The chronology (timeline of the story) is interrupted by an incident from the past e.g. a memory
3	Still Image				This is a frozen picture which communicates meaning. It's sometimes called a freeze frame. It can provide a snapshot of a moment with a clear focus upon use of levels, body language and facial expression.
4	Thought Tracking				When a character steps out of a scene to address the audience about how they're feeling. Sharing thoughts in this way provides deeper insight into the character.
5	Choral Speech				When a group of actors speak a line at the same time to create dramatic effect. From the Greek word 'Chorus' meaning ensemble.
6	Body as a Prop				A physical technique in which actors use their bodies to create props or part of the set., eg creating objects using the actors' bodies.
7	Script				The written text of a play or film. The script contains the actors' lines (what they say) and the stage directions (what they do).
8	Blocking				When rehearsing a scene, deciding on when and where the characters move.
9	Stage Directions				Instructions in a script. They can tell you where a scene is set and what is happening. They can also tell you when a character enters and what they do in the scene
10	Proxemics				How near or far actors stand to each other which reflects their character's relationship to the other characters.
11	Synchronised Movement				Two or more people moving together at the same time.
12	Physical Theatre				A performance style that relies on physical skills more than vocal skills to communicate to an audience.
