1. Worship	Showing love and respect to God through prayers, songs, and other religious activities.	14. Pilgrimage	A special journey that people make to a holy place for religious reasons.
2. Liturgical Worship	A type of worship with a set structure and rituals, often used in Catholic and Anglican churches.	15. Christmas	A Christian holiday celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ.
3. Non-Liturgical Worship	A type of worship that doesn't follow a set structure, often used in Protestant churches.	16. Easter	A Christian holiday celebrating the resurrection of Jesus from the dead.
4. Informal Worship	A relaxed and less structured way of worshipping. Quaker or Pentecostal worship are examples of this.	17. Mission	The work of spreading the Christian message and helping people in need.
5. Prayer	Talking to God, often to give thanks, ask for help, or seek forgiveness.	18. Evangelism	Sharing the Christian faith with others, often by telling them about Jesus.
6. Set Prayer	A prayer that has specific words and is often used regularly in worship services.	19. Trussell Trust	A charity that runs food banks in the UK to help people who don't have enough to eat.
7. Spontaneous Prayer	A prayer that is made up on the spot, using one's own words to talk to God.	20. Street Pastors	Volunteers from churches who go out at night to help and care for people in their community.
8. Sacrament	A special religious ceremony or act that shows a person's faith, such as baptism or communion.	21. Alpha	A series of sessions exploring the Christian faith, usually run by churches, where people can ask questions and learn more.
9. Infant Baptism	A ceremony where a baby is welcomed into the Christian faith with water.	22. Christian Aid	A charity that helps people in need around the world, working to end poverty and promote justice.
10. Believer's Baptism	A ceremony where an older child or adult is baptised because they have chosen to follow Jesus.	23. Reconciliation	Bringing people back together after a disagreement or conflict, making peace.
11. Communion/Eucharist	A Christian ceremony where people eat bread and drink wine (or juice) to remember Jesus' last meal.	24. Community of the cross of nails	A group of churches and organisations working for peace and reconciliation, inspired by the story of Coventry Cathedral.
12. Transubstantiation	The Catholic belief that during communion, the bread and wine actually become the body and blood of Jesus.	25. Persecution	Treating someone badly or unfairly because of their religion or beliefs.
13. Consubstantiation	The belief, held by some Protestants, that during communion, Jesus is present with the bread and wine, but they do not actually become his body and blood.	26. Open Doors	A charity that supports Christians around the world who are facing persecution for their faith.
