As this academic year draws to close it is a good time to reflect on my first year as Principal of Shirebrook Academy. I have really enjoyed getting to know the school and the local community and have been made to feel very welcome. I said at the outset that I did not see any reason to make great changes and whilst we are always looking to improve I hope that you recognise the strengths of the Academy remain.

However, some changes have been forced upon us. The oneyear GCSE model that has served Shirebrook students well in the past will not work with the new-style GCSEs so next year's Y10s will follow a traditional 2 year GCSE course. This has meant some smaller courses couldn't run next year as there were just not enough students opting for them, which is a shame but out of our control.

Another change forced upon us was when the Aspire Sixth Form consortium with Bolsover, Springwell & Heritage schools had to be closed for financial reasons, disappointing a lot of our current Y11s who had hoped to stay on.

However, I am certain that young people in this area need and deserve a sixth form and I am delighted that we have managed to strike a new deal between ourselves and Chesterfield College. The BTEC Health & Social Care and Work Related Learning courses are still running for next year's Y12 and from September 2017 we will re-launch as Chesterfield College @ Shirebrook offering a full range of A level and BTEC courses between Shirebrook Academy & Chesterfield College. I hope that many of next year's Y11 will choose to stay with us and study at Chesterfield College @ Shirebrook.

Other changes have been made by choice as I have identified an opportunity to improve things. Our library has been transformed by the appointment of Katy Noyes as our full-time librarian and with a refresh of the stock and systems. Moving tutor time to the morning has also helped get the day off to a positive start, reduced wasted learning time moving around in the afternoon and increased opportunities for whole school communal activities at lunchtime – arts week proving a great example of that recently.

We are currently making changes to the school environment by providing more space to display students work and celebrate their achievements around school and we also have plans to improve the science labs and build more changing facilities. We are also introducing a new internet based information system called SIMS Learning Gateway that will allow you to see live data on your child's attendance, behaviour, progress and achievements. There will also be a new system for encouraging students to take on leadership roles and get their voice heard in school through Year Team Reps and a Junior Leadership Team that will have its own budget and genuine power to introduce things that the students want to help the school improve.

However, the biggest development I want us to focus on is a long-term one and it is to do with learning. Whilst I know our staff and students work incredibly hard I think we can all be better learners and instead of working harder, work smarter.

I wrote about the Growth Mind Set initiative in a previous newsletter and that is part of a major programme we are launching in September called 'Building Learning Power'. This approach will help our young people to not only achieve well in exams but develop the skills that employers look for, that they need to be life-long learners and to succeed beyond Shirebrook Academy.

As ever, for us to succeed in helping our young people be the best that they can be, we will need to work together and pull in the same direction. I look forward to building our learning power together over the next few years.

## Bright FOOTBALL Future

Talented footballer Kieran Darby is looking to a bright future with Nottingham Forest after he was chosen to represent the club in an overseas tour.

Fifteen-year-old Kieran, a Year 10 pupil here at the Academy and also a Derby County fan – is a member of the Reds' Under-15s squad and will be travelling to take part in a cup tournament in Portugal this month.

It was here that Kieran had his best game against the hosts, Ferencevaros, scoring two goals and providing an assist as Forest ran out 3-1 winners and finished fifth overall.

Kieran, a former Clipstone player, signed for Forest's Under-15s last year after a club scout watched him score six goals in one game. He juggles his school work in amongst training three times a week – with a game at weekends - attending Forest's Wilford Lane training ground, just a free kick's distance from the City Ground in Nottingham.

All are learning valuable life lessons from the experience – working in a team, committing to a timetable, following guidelines, improving customer service skills.

All students and staff now have access to an online library catalogue (also a portal to other educational resources) and a free downloadable App (iMLS) to be able to renew their books, write reviews, access free eBooks and search for useful websites relating to their studies.

## Anti-Knife Campaign

## Are you a parent or carer and worried about your child carrying a knife?

#### What you need to know about carrying a knife:

- · Gives you a false sense of security.
- Could be increasing the risk of you getting stabbed or injured.
- You are committing a crime it's breaking the law to carry a knife
- Police can stop and search anyone they suspect of carrying a knife
- Carrying a knife could mean being arrested, going to court and getting a criminal record, or even a prison sentence.

#### Communication is the key:

- Have a chat with your kids and see what they think about carrying a knife - you may have seen something current in the news about knife crime that you could discuss.
- Your child may be scared or unwilling to talk about this. But it is never a bad thing to talk and it's important to be clear that your child does have a choice, even when they think they may not.
- Talk to the parents of your child's friends. If you're worried, they
  probably are too and it's always good to talk about these things.







#### What to look out for:

Looking out for changes in your child's behaviour can help keep them safe. Has your child started displaying signs of:

- Complaining that schools not going well or they don't want to go in to school at all.
- They've been a recent victim of theft, bullying or even a mugging.
- Hanging around with a different group of friends, maybe older than your child.

Remind your child that they should always walk away if confronted with the threat of violence.

#### Anti-Knife Campaign

As you will be aware knife crime is currently high profile in the national press. As part of Derbyshire Police's antiknife campaign, Derbyshire schools have been asked to support the project by distributing literature to parents/carers and students.

Our local police officers have also delivered talks about knife crime to Y8 and Y9 students in assemblies. The project aims to discourage young people from carrying knives through a series of activities that will educate, prevent and enforce the consequences of doing so.

The school has a policy of zero tolerance of knives / blades in school. Students found to be in possession of a knife with a blade, whether folded or not, in school may be permanently excluded. (Please see the school's behaviour policy on the website if you require further clarification).

We would be grateful if you could read the above literature and discuss the seriousness of carrying knives with your son/daughter. Please encourage your child to tell an adult or contact the police either via telephone or email if they suspect a friend is carrying a knife.

Hopefully by raising this serious issue we can help to reduce the number of serious knife crimes.

## **OPERATING THEATRE LIVE**



Theatre Live. During the session the students learned the technical terminology of the human anatomy, locating major organs and they had their own patient to cure!

Students were provided with patient notes and using what they were currently learning had to interpret and solve the problems their patients were having; preparing anaesthetics, making surgical incisions using real organs and using the patient simulators to inject the anaesthetic, all the while learning different ways to administer medicines to target sites around the body.

Following on from the administration of medicine came the real hands on part of the day. The students were given a real gastrointestinal tract to see, touch and feel to get to grips with the digestive system within the human body. They went on to secure an understanding of Crohn's disease, lactose intolerance and other diseases that could affect the GI tract.

Students then went on to expand their knowledge on the cardiovascular system by locating the heart and listening to the heartbeat using stethoscopes before performing an angioplasty, fitting a pacemaker and then conducting a heart transplant on their dummy patients using real thoracic anatomy!

After a busy day in the operating theatre, the students ended their day with a wider knowledge, new skills and an eye-opening account into careers within anatomy and medicine All taking part in the event were awarded with an Operating Theatre Live certificate to add to their personal development portfolio to show their hard work and positive captivated attitude

throughout the day.



### **Parental Information**

At Shirebrook Academy we know that one of the keys to success for our young people is if all of us – teachers, parents, carers, family and students – are pulling in the same direction. We all want to help them to be the best that they can be.

In order to give parents greater access to key information regarding your child/children we have recently purchased an online communication tool called SIMS Learning Gateway.

The Learning Gateway provides live, up to date information about how well each student is doing at school so you don't have to wait for a report, a Target Review Day or a parents evening to find out about behaviour, attendance, achievements and progress of your child. The Learning gateway will also allow you to update any information relating to your child, for example, a new telephone number, an allergy, etc. without sending in a letter or making a phone call.

The Learning Gateway will be shared with all parents at the upcoming Target Review Day on 6<sup>th</sup> July, where prior to your regular Progress Meeting with your child's form tutor, you will be given a quick overview of the Learning Gateway System and receive your individual log-in details and initial password to access the system at home on your laptop, mobile phone or tablet.

We anticipate that the Learning Gateway will give you a new level of access to the key information surrounding your child's education and keep you updated on their progress allowing us all, teachers and parents, to support them in their learning and welfare in a faster and more beneficial way.

"It is a step in a new direction for a better educational qualification" – History Student


"A great opportunity to give you an idea of what to do in the future, either higher education or an apprenticeship" – English Literature Student
