CAMHS stands for *Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services*. CAMHS are the NHS services that assesses and treat young people with emotional, behavioural or mental health difficulties.

An apprenticeship sounded like the perfect fit for me as I would be able to earn money as well continue learning valuable skills and gain higher qualifications.

After completing my level 2 Apprenticeship I decided to take a slightly different route and progress onto a level 3 IT apprenticeship. My first year as an administration assistant was very enjoyable and I feel as though the whole apprenticeship was worthwhile and helped kick-start my progression. Due to my progression through the apprenticeship programmes and the higher qualifications that I've achieved I have recently secured full time employment in a well-paid job that I thoroughly enjoy.

I was very sceptical about if it would be the correct decision for me. I am now glad that I decided to make the choices that I did and I am very proud of what I have managed to achieve by progressing through the apprenticeship scheme.

A day in the life of Adam Booth (Behaviour Support Assistant)

I originally started working at the Academy in 2013 after a very short stint at Derby University. I went there entirely optimistic (and scared) but it didn't take long for me to realise that I was a bit of a home bird and the city environment didn't



suit me. Everything I had done up until this point was close to home. I lived in Langwith, I went to primary school in Langwith, and I went to secondary school in Shirebrook and then finished with 6th form at the Academy. This is why it was so hard for me in an unfamiliar city. Despite this I knew that I had the qualifications and dedication to make a go of anything I could put my mind to, so I began volunteering.

I visited the Academy and spoke initially to Mr Gilbert and Mrs Ward, they were incredibly empathetic to my situation and offered me a voluntary position as a teaching assistant. It wasn't long before I had my first interview for a permanent position and thankfully I was successful. Since then my role has progressed and I am now a behaviour support assistant working in BASE, the academy's specialist inclusion and social development area. A typical day will see me work 1:1 and in small groups with academy students to improve their behaviour and social skills to give them the best possible opportunities for success. This is something that I am very passionate about and the students benefit greatly from. I am also currently studying a forest schools leader qualification which sees me become Bear Grylls for the day as I take the students out into the forest for all sorts of bush craft and practical skill development activities. Overall my role is challenging but greatly varied as I may be working to prevent the exclusion of one student in the morning and building a campfire in the afternoon.

I have been very committed to personal development whilst working here and I think it has always been down to the hard work instilled in me from the start of Y7 from the staff here. The vision of striving for excellence is very real and I for one have nothing but praise for everyone that worked so hard to give me every opportunity to progress. Because of this vision I have since completed the first year of a psychology degree with the Open University and am now a qualified personal trainer. My message is just to follow your own path, sometimes you will face hurdles but it's the decisions you make when faced with adversity that will determine what type person you will become.

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BARCELONA

Day 1 – Sunday 8th April

It was a tiring but exciting early start as students gathered together half-asleep, excited for the adventure ahead. 41 students and 5 staff members headed to London Heathrow airport for our early morning departure to Barcelona. Anticipation lay ahead for some students, this being their first experience at an airport. We arrived in Barcelona on time to meet our coach to take us to our accommodation. i Perfecto! With the luggage dropped off we headed out to explore beautiful Barca.

First stop was the beautiful cathedral "La Sagrada Familia", one of Barcelona's most popular tourist attractions and Antoni Gaudí's unfinished masterpiece. We toured round the spectacular building having an individual hand held guide to fill us all with lots of interesting information about this wonderful on-going creation. The sun was even shining through the spectacular stained glass windows of the cathedral.

We then headed to El Fresco for our first taste of Spanish culture and food. We sampled a variety of tasty foods and it was a great atmosphere as we shared our excitement for the forthcoming trips.

To finish off the evening we headed out to the famous shopping street called "La Rambla". Students got to experience the crazy life of the Spanish street with a variety of street statues. This was a little insight of what was to come later on in the trip. After a long first day, it was time to return to the hotel and get some much needed sleep to prepare us for the few days ahead.

Day 2 – Monday 9th April

After breakfast we gathered together to run through the daily plan. There was a big buzz in the air this morning as many students (and staff) were very excited to visit Barcelona Football Club's Stadium "Camp Nou". An incredible tour was the highlight of the football fans' day as they got to experience: life in the changing rooms, looking at the winning trophies and the main highlight had to be walking out and viewing the outstanding pitch, seeing how huge the stadium was in person. Students posed as celebrities and visited the shop to buy souvenirs to take back to England. Many students purchased footballs and even got to kick the ball around at the start of the tour.

The sun shone as we then headed down to the port to visit the Aquarium. En-route we saw the beautiful marina, hosting grand yachts and boats, but no sign of any celebs. We managed to see a lot of peculiar looking fish, including Nemo and of course we even had some time to buy an ice-cream, play football and soak up the sunshine.

Our next visit of the day was to one of the most famous places in Barcelona, constructed by Antoni Gaudi himself: Park Guell. The famous mosaic tiles are a special feature to this city and seeing them up close was fabulous, especially in the sunshine.

The evening arrived which meant two things: Flamenco and tapas. Time for the students to experience a traditional Spanish dancing show and to eat some of Spain's renowned delicacies. As the guitar was played, the Spanish singing and the dancing began. Mr Hand started the evening off by dancing brilliantly with the Flamenco Dancer and soon after, students enthusiastically volunteered to have a go creating a wonderful atmosphere. Harley, Angel, Ella, Owen and Isaac were amongst many students to have a go at dancing the flamenco – definitely dancers in the making. The food arrived consisting of Patatas Bravas (typical potato dish with garlic mayo), jamón serrano, paella con pescado (fish paella), ensalada (salad), tortilla Española (Spanish omelette). The Paella went down a treat. We returned to the hotel in the evening to prepare ourselves for the fun-filled day ahead.



Day 3 – Tuesday 10th April

Tuesday consisted of another exciting day ahead, not only being in the sunshine away from Shirebrook Academy, but time to go on one of the highest Rollercoaster's in Europe at the Theme Park "Portaventura". The bus journey there was a chance to catch up on missed sleep. The weather was perfect and excitement and laughter filled the air as students ventured out to ride the "Shambhala" and "Dragon Khan", two of the biggest rollercoasters in Europe. Many students returned back to Hard Rock Café to purchase some souvenirs to take back home. The staff sampled some of Spain's delicacies on La Rambla including churros and chocolate and taking a visit to Barcelona's huge market.

After collecting our luggage and saying a big 'Adiós' to the fabulous city of Barcelona, we headed to the airport, with very sad faces and began our journey back to the UK.

They spoke about the importance of education and languages and how languages can support you in future life. The students then eagerly split off in to four teams and went in to battle against each other – with Slovakia destroying Sweden 5-0 and Slovenia hammering France 7-2. The activity ended with a player of the match presentation and a signed football for the best player on each team - Jo Jope (Y8), Georgie Shaw (Y8) and Teegan Spizer (Y7) were the lucky winners. Students were incredible and it was amazing to see so many keen to perform with many choosing to sing in a foreign language. Josh Browne (Y8), Stevie Haynes (Y11), Ben Madeley (Y9) all sang songs in Spanish, with Ben, Cyprian Horbal and Daniel Windeatt (Y9) performing a Russian themed song complete with a memorable dance. Year 11 students Joe Fletcher and Owen Parsons stole the show with a moving tribute to the late, incredible Avicii – their performance of Hey Brother was a real crowd pleaser. Huge thanks again to all students for coming along to watch, especially those who sang, putting themselves out of their comfort zone. Massive thank you to PE for allowing us to take over PE facilities for three days running.

After-school the MFL department again took over the food room, this time to lead the popular pizza making session. 22 students attended this activity and the judges crowned Alicia Benger (Y7) as the winner, taking home a special trophy for her Languages themed pizza. Thursday 3rd May – We were so lucky this year to be able to stage a final Languages Week activity for 2018, one week later. Professional footballer Thierry Audel who has played for many English clubs, as well as clubs in Italy and France, gave up his own free time following the end of the football season, for the second year running to lead an activity with our students – Thierry was delighted to be able to come back to Shirebrook and left students with some fantastic memories at the end of the day.

The event, dubbed 'France v Spain', was attended by 40 students, some of whom met Thierry and remembered him from last year. We kicked off with Thierry speaking at length about his career, life and the importance of learning languages and appreciating different cultures, which was fantastic for our students to hear. It was also amazing to hear him talking about life after football, he has already started doing some work in translation and interpreting, and it was really beneficial for students to hear from a professional footballer about the importance of studying hard and having a plan for after a career in football is over. Thierry, most recently with AFC Barrow, spoke about how important learning languages have been for his career and in his life.

During a live Q&A session with students, Thierry gave some inspiring messages including:

'Languages have not only helped me in my football but also in life as well. Football is great but you also need to be educated. If you never open a book during your football career you will struggle to find something else to do after football. I am doing a lot of work currently in interpreting and translation using the languages I know

> (French, English and Italian).

Following the Q&A session, Thierry and Miss Wheeldon (Spain's manager) picked their own team of students to represent their country and managed from the side-lines – Thierry even played most of the game as Player-Manager for France. The game itself was wide open, a tense affair which ended 5-4 to Spain leading Miss Wheeldon to celebrate passionately with her team. The players of the match as selected by the two managers were Theo Gorrill and Cole Jarvis (both Y8).

At the end of the game, Thierry took more time out to chat with students, have photographs and sign autographs on a whole host of items – bags, journals, phone cases, boots and more. The MFL department would like to say a huge MERCI BEAUCOUP to Thierry for so kindly giving up his time to join us for this activity and for being such a great role-model and inspiration for students, doing it with such character, enthusiasm and passion. The MFL department would like to thank all students who attended activities, our special guests, staff for pushing the events with students, the departments around the Academy which helped to make our week a huge success and the amazing admin/site team who put so much effort in to making the building look amazing – including Chinese lanterns and huge flags draped in the Atrium.
