Parliament & Pride



James Edwards, head of modern foreign languages here at Shirebrook Academy, travelled to the Houses of Parliament to represent his school at a meeting held to discuss why fewer UK students are taking part in foreign exchange visits.

Mr Edwards was invited to speak about the school's plans to hold what is believed to be its first-ever foreign exchange visit at a meeting of the All-Party Parliamentary Group on Modern Languages, which took place on Monday, February 25.

The meeting, which was chaired by Baroness Coussins, was organised to look at the challenges teachers face in organising international exchanges, which are falling out of favour with schools across the country.

Only 30% of state schools currently take part in exchange visits, but the academy is bucking the trend by teaming up with a school in Toulon, in the South of France, which is sending 11 students to Shirebrook next month, with 10 Academy students set to make a reciprocal visit in May.

Mr Edwards, who travelled to London with principal Mark Cottingham, spent around 10 minutes talking about the school's plans, in amongst presentations from the British Council and Anglo-European School, a specialist foreign language academy in Essex which organises around 16 exchange trips every year.

Also attending the meeting were MPs, peers and representatives from other schools and universities, who were able to ask questions during the event.

He said: "The whole day was an incredible experience and we were both extremely proud that Shirebrook Academy had been invited to talk about such an

"I spoke about the hurdles schools have to overcome to organise trips, but also spoke about how fantastic our students and their parents have been in buying into the idea of taking part in our first trip and agreeing to host

"The opportunity to experience living with a family in another country can be life-changing, while hosting a visit can make you reflect on your culture and local area through different eyes.

"Several people told us how such visits had changed their lives, including someone who grew up in a disadvantaged community in Lancashire and is now a member of the European Commission."

While they were in London, Mr Edwards and Mr Cottingham also got a glimpse into the busy comings and goings of MPs working at the very heart of the UK's democracy.

He said: "It's an interesting time to visit Parliament and we saw a few demonstrators outside holding placards both for and against Brexit, while we passed the Labour MPs Diane Abbott and Yvette Cooper on our way to the meeting.

"It was not lost on us that we were discussing something that promoted a positive relationship with Europe while elsewhere in the same building, discussions were taking place about how we can sever our political ties.

"It's an extremely big and busy place and fascinating to think that next door, or in the next corridor, people were making huge decisions that will have an influence on the future of the whole country."

Ideas included 'Shirefest' (family music festival), a Boxing event, a Mental Health awareness event, a youth club run by services veterans to enable them to share their experiences with young people, after school clubs, and social events for different groups to get together. We hope that Academy students will be able to get involved in the planning for some of these events for real over the coming year. Thriving Communities 'Shirebrook App' Briefing Note - December 2018

How did the idea for an App come about?

- The idea for having a Shirebrook App has come from conversations with local people about how best they would like to share information with each other and receive updates on what activities are happening in the area.
- Young people who discussed the App were particularly interested in two things; help with
 'feeling safe' and finding out about 'fun stuff to do' in Shirebrook so together we are
 trying to see if we can build an App locally that can help to support delivering these
 things.

What have we done so far?


So far, we have:

- Spoken with young people at the Youth Forum and the people who provide local services in Shirebrook to get their views and to help co-design how the app might work, what information it would show and what features it should have.
- Produced 'paper prototypes' to imagine and describe how the App might practically function, how it might look and discuss what characteristics a 'genuine prototype' should have











 We have also sourced local developers and designers who can help to build a genuine 'prototype' of the App which we can test and improve.

What do we want to do next?

- Get more insights from young people in Shirebrook about how the App should work and how young people in particular might like to help build it or test it out.
- Find the best way to get information required for the App uploaded and kept up to date.
- Produce a functional 'prototype' of the app and get local people involved to test it out, improve it and eventually launch it for anyone to use!

On Friday 1st February the Mathematics department and its students participated in a variety of activities for NSPCC Number Day. It was a day of maths inspired fundraising fun.

We created Matherpillars and even solved a Mathematical Murder Mystery in lessons. During tutor period students were asked to participate in a Sponsored Times Table Challenge. The day was a great success, and I am pleased to announce we also raised a total of £345 in sponsorship money.



Heroes amongst us...

Five teenagers who helped rescue a man from a burning house in Shirebrook have been honoured for their bravery.

Shirebrook Academy Year 11 students Farren Walters, Archie Ashton, Josua Jope, Liam Gladwin and Brandon Butler were all given official commendations by Derbyshire Fire and Rescue Service for displaying heroism in the incident last month.

The students' selfless actions saw them help two off-duty police officers lift a bedridden pensioner to safety after he became trapped in his home when fire broke out. The boys had been walking to the train station when they spotted smoke billowing from the roof of a bungalow on Rockley Way. While they were standing outside the front door, they heard cries for help coming from the garden and they jumped over the fence. There they found a couple struggling to wheel the man, who was confined to his bed, out of the back door and so they helped to lift him out of the building and to safety. Firefighters arrived to extinguish the blaze, which had started in a tumble dryer and spread to the roof space of the building. Firefighters and representatives from Derbyshire Constabulary paid a visit to the academy to give the teenagers their commendations.

Mark Cottingham, principal of the academy, said: "We were very proud to welcome representatives from Derbyshire Fire and Rescue Service and the Derbyshire Constabulary to our school. "Farren, Archie, Josua, Liam and Brandon showed that they were not the type of people who stand back in someone else's hour of need and they all thoroughly deserve to be recognised for their bravery and compassion."
