
• Step 2: Add a star on to each location on the map to show where your clothes come from Use the map on the next page to help if you need to.

Task One: Geography Fieldwork from inside your bedroom!

Do you want to challenge yourself? Follow these steps to create your clothes map using GIS. GIS means Geographical Information Systems. It is when we use computers to help us look at maps.

- Step 1: Open up an excel spreadsheet on the computer. Label the first column 'Country' and the second column 'Number of Items'. Then type in your country names and how many items came from each country. Take care to spell the country names correctly. Note You have to save this as a certain file type for the map to work. To do this go to 'Save As' and then underneath the file name, select CSV (MS-Dos) (*.csv)
- Step 2: Go to www.arcgis.com and click on 'map' towards the top of the screen.
- Step 3: Click on 'Basemap' and change to 'light grey canvas'. Then go to 'Modify Map'
- Step 4: Click on 'Add' and then select 'Add Layer from File' and browse your files to select your spreadsheet. Then select 'Import Layer' and then 'Add Layer'.

Congratulations- you should now have a GIS map to show where the clothes in your wardrobe come from!

What is the climate like in this place?


How far is this place from where you live now?

1. Complete the two compass roses below, one is a four point compass and the other is an eight point compass.


