Last summer, when our GCSE students left school without sitting an exam, I told them that no matter what their results would look like, their grades are only part of the overall story. Their character and personal qualities alongside the skills and the knowledge they have gained at school are their real qualifications. Almost a year later I am preparing to say the same thing to all of our students, no matter what year they're in.

According to recent news, today's students will, on average, lose £40,000 worth of earning power over the course of their careers because they are "falling behind" on their learning during lockdown.

I'm sure that any student who isn't already feeling anxious might well do so on hearing this message which, to me, is highly unfair and totally unnecessary.

Apart from disregarding the fantastic hard work and learning that most of our students have been doing during the recent lockdown, it also ignores some of the benefits that have come from remote learning. I believe this cohort are learning skills that will stand them in good stead in the future – we need to balance the negative impact with the many ways that lockdown has helped our young people to learn and grow.

They have learned self-discipline and about being a self-starter. They have borne witness to a unique period in our country's modern history and have probably done many activities they might not have otherwise have engaged in, like cooking or playing an instrument.

As our newsletter shows, whilst things are very different at the moment, learning and life of our school community continue to flourish.

In Design and Technology, students were challenged to put on their thinking caps to come up with possible solutions to these problems.


Some excellent creative work was submitted from 9NH in their design challenge lesson.

Our first ever Virtual Personal Development day took place on 13 January, and it was great to see the vast majority of students joining the day on Google Classroom. We had the usual mix of Careers, Health and Citizenship topics, including visiting speakers from Derby University, Derbyshire Sexual Health promotion service, DCC Road Safety team, and CGL (drug support service). A second day in March offered even more visiting speakers, including Serin Kasif from the Really Useful Group (Andrew Lloydd Webber's company) who spoke about career opportunities in the performing arts, and a motivational talk for Y11 from Jared Patel, former international table tennis player. Y9 students took part in a Talk the Talk workshop and had the courage to unmute their microphones to give some great presentations. We hope these days continue to support students in developing key knowledge, skills and understanding to be successful in school and into adult life.

The C Card

The C Card Scheme is run by Derbyshire Sexual Health Promotion service, and offers access to condoms for 13-24 year olds. The scheme helps to promote safe sex and encourages longer term sexual health awareness in young people, providing advice and information alongside access to condoms. Our school nurse already offers a C Card service in school but we have now registered additional members of our pastoral team to offer the service, making it more accessible to students who need it. We recognise that students become ready for this kind of service at different stages, and will ensure that the service is offered appropriately as part of our wider pastoral support.

This year we are working towards the 'Coriell Award' which recognises quality in Drug and Alcohol education.

Our drug education programme needs to be constantly reviewed to ensure it meets the needs of students – by responding to trends and events in the local community. Students played a board game which encourages discussion about risky behaviours, and suggested situations that would be relevant to their peer group or younger students.

Music Lessons

Does your child have an interest in learning to play a musical instrument?

Here at the Academy we have an excellent team of specialist musicians who visit us weekly to provide lessons in brass (trumpet, cornet, horn, trombone, euphonium and tuba), woodwind (flute, clarinet and saxophone), strings (violin and viola), guitar (electric, acoustic and bass) and drum kit.

Learning an instrument is an excellent way to develop self-esteem, resilience, organisation, coordination, thinking skills and problem solving as well presenting the opportunity to make new friends and gain confidence. Once your child has made progress on their instrument they will be invited to join one of the Academy's musical ensembles such as Wind Band, Funky Jazz Band, String Orchestra or Choir. They may also have the opportunity to take part in concerts and showcases throughout the year.

All lessons take place during the school day on a rotating timetable to avoid disruption to students' learning.

Lessons are offered at an introductory price for the first six weeks, following this time prices may vary but subsidies are available subject to circimstances.

If your child is interested, have them collect a letter from Mr Case in the music department.

Information for Year 11

My Son/Daughter has applied for College or 6th Form, what happens next?

If your child has applied for a place at College or 6th Form they should check their emails and online College accounts regularly. They should be invited to attend a virtual interview and will be sent details and links via email. Further additional information such as open days, taster sessions or requests for references will also be communicated in this way, so it is important you encourage your child to check their emails weekly.

Once they have been offered a conditional place, your child will receive more information over the Summer with details of how to apply for any bursaries the College/School may offer and also dates for enrolment on to the course. These dates for enrolment will be after GCSE results day. Your Son/Daughter will then be offered a place on the level of course they applied for if they achieve their predicted grades. Do not panic if your child gets below the grades needed for the level they have applied for. They should be offered a place on the level below if available or the next most suitable course which will help them to achieve their career goals. This will all be discussed at the time of enrolment.

My Son/Daughter has still not decided what they would like to do Post 16, what should they do?

Each student is being contacted to make sure they have applied for a course/apprenticeship. If they have yet to apply, they will be getting a careers appointment with Jenna Kennedy our Careers Advisor to go through their options and will be offered support with their applications. You or your child can also request a careers appointment through their form tutor.

What if my Son/Daughter changes their mind about what they want to study?

If your child changes their mind whilst they are still attending Shirebrook Academy they will be able to access the Careers Advisor to go through other options. Please get in touch with their form tutor to book an appointment. If they change their mind once they have finished Year 11, each College has their own Careers Team which they will be able to discuss alternative options with. These Career Teams are impartial so will help your child to look at all options at all providers. There will also be a Careers Advisor available on GCSE results day at school.

My Son/Daughter really wants an apprenticeship, where do they start looking for one?

Firstly, it is really important that your child applies for a College course in the area they are interested in as a back up option. Apprenticeships are competitive so there is no guarantee they will find one ready for September.

Searching and Applying for Apprenticeships

Step 1

They need to identify what type of apprenticeship they are interested in, for example, Business Administration, Mechanical Engineering, IT or Childcare. If they are unsure they can arrange a careers appointment with the Careers Advisor. The National Careers Service website nationalcareers.service.gov.uk/ can also be used for careers research.

Step 2

Go to www.apprenticeships.org.uk and register an account. This is a National Apprenticeship website so most training providers will upload their vacancies on to this website. Click on Find an Apprenticeship and complete the relevant details. This will search for all relevant apprenticeships within a 5-10 mile radius of their postcode.

Step 3

Register with your local College's Apprenticeship teams as they can help to find placements.

For West Notts College go to www.wnc.ac.uk/naw and click on 'Register Your Interest'.

For Chesterfield College go to www.learningunlimiteduk.com/startanapprenticeship/ and register details.

The apprenticeship teams will get back in touch around Easter time to start the full registration process and to start supporting your child in finding an apprenticeship. Keep an eye out on the College websites for virtual Apprenticeship Advice Evenings:




