All through news

This has indeed been a busy half term when we arrived still with the "taste of summer" on our lips and we end feeling that the seasons are changing and winter drawing in. Please remember that we put our clocks back one hour on SUNDAY 30 OCTOBER (at 02.00am) so we have lighter mornings and darker evenings.

A few reminders and observations as we end this first half term.

Thank you and well done to those students who have attended school for 100% of this term. Excellent attendance is a life skill and is one of the threads of being "a flourishing citizen". From time to time, most people get ill and a sick day occasionally is understandable. However, a reminder that we in schools take attendance very seriously and we do chase all absentees, with consequences for those who choose not to attend.

School uniform- the new PE kit worn by our students is very smart. A reminder to parents that we always have on site "well loved uniform for sale" at low prices. Do call or email our office teams for further help.

We are very aware of the consequences of recent price increases and that for some families, difficult decisions are being made. This is the same in school, both personally for staff and also as an organisation. Mr Ayres, as part of our Y7 and Y8 "rotation" is leading our students to carry out research and understand how we can individually address environmental issues, such as recycling and energy use. Schools too are facing incredible hikes to their gas and electricity bills. We too must address lowering consumption and a more efficient use of all of our resources. We shall be sharing more about this in later newsletters.

Our "ECO" clubs have recently been awarded the "Green Flag" award and we look forward to more students joining with us to tackle some of the big issues.

The Government has recently published guidance to schools sharing their expectations of good behaviour. To this end we have revised our "Behaviour" policy in

line with expectations. Whilst there is little new (a few tweaks, for example a temporary exclusion of say, 1 or 2 days is now called a suspension) it is good to remind parents, staff and students of our stance and high expectations. To this end, we will be rolling out a series of workshops to explain our "curriculum for behaviour" to all students over the coming weeks. And finally, as a Senior Leadership Team, we belong to many national networks. The recruitment of staff at every level-teachers-teaching assistants-administrators- site staff is reaching a serious crisis with no applicants. Pay traditionally in schools is poor and in particular a job that is often for term time only and not a full year.

We are interested in hearing from you or anyone you know in your community- Teachers- Teaching Assistants- Administrators - in fact anyone who might be interested to work here in our school. We may not have a specific job at the moment but things change rapidly.

We are currently interested to hear from anyone who can teach science- maths- computer sciences-sociology- good teachers who enjoy teaching Y6 or would love to teach Y7!

Also science technicians- teaching assistants. We look forward to hearing from you.

All that is left to say is wishing everyone a good rest over half term so we can all come back refreshed and ready to continue to learn well in this second part of the Autumn Term.

Green Flag

As previously shared earlier this term, Simon Balle has achieved the Eco Schools Green Flag thanks to the students in our school, led by Ziva, Lily, Lucia and Edith.

They took part in environmental reviews of the school to evaluate what the school is doing well and what needs to be improved, they spoke to staff and students, created action plans for targets for the school, led an assembly to raise awareness and even led a stall at last year's Frost Fair to raise money!

Our new Year 6 Eco leaders Daisy, Josh, Seraphina and Samuel have taken over and have started

working with secondary peers to continue our student leaders' vision to reduce the impact the school makes on the environment and to make a positive impact.



Cleaning at Simon Balle

We have begun a regime of night time cleaning and you therefore might notice activity on the site and lights on out of hours. As a school, we are going to great lengths to reduce our energy consumption and carbon footprint and we would like to briefly explain why the decision has been made and what we are doing to mitigate any increase in energy consumption.

Firstly, there is a nationwide shortage of cleaning staff and this is particularly acute in Hertford. By implementing night shifts, we are able to offer longer shifts to fewer staff, making recruitment and retention easier whilst also improving quality of service. By reducing the number of cleaning staff on site, we are able to reduce the area being cleaned at any one time, meaning fewer areas requiring lighting. In 2020 we replaced all of our fluorescent lights in the school with efficient LED lighting to minimise the energy consumption of our lighting. In addition, by cleaning at night, any electricity is charged at our night rate, meaning a saving of around 30% in electricity costs.

Sports hall consultation

Last week we were very excited to share initial design proposals for a new sports hall with our staff, students and parents, details of which can be found here.

We have since received an overwhelmingly positive response to our online questionnaire. If you have not already submitted a response, the questionnaire will remain open until the 31st October and your thoughts and views will be very warmly welcomed. As part of our public consultation, we have been keen to speak with our students to ensure that their voice and opinion is heard. From the 31st October, we will be launching a consultation week throughout the school from Early Years to Sixth Form. We will be

working with students in lessons, linking the sports hall design and planning process to their curriculum lessons. We can't wait to see what the students come up with and share it with our architects and design team.

Year 9 battlefield trip

The Year 9 Belgium trips to the First World War battlefields took place once again this month after a three year hiatus, with over 120 students exploring sites related to the conflict in and around Ypres. The

trips were a resounding success and students were able to deepen their understanding of the First World War, which they study in history lessons and through war poetry in English, as well as enjoying the novel experience of a residential trip with their peers after so long without the opportunity to do so. The students were given the chance to explore a number of sites related to their study of the First World War, such as the solemn Commonwealth military cemeteries at Tyne Cot and Essex Farm, the fiercely-contested site at Hill 60, the reconstructed trench at Sanctuary Wood and the poignant Last Post ceremony at the Menin Gate, at which students on each trip were selected to lay a wreath on behalf of the school community.

Sixth form parliament visit

Our A level politics students visited Westminster this week and were given a guided tour of the Houses of Parliament, as well as taking part in a workshop to learn more about government and the legislative process. Twenty-five students from Year 12 and 13 went on the trip and were guided around the Palace of Westminster, including inside the Lords and Commons chambers, learning about the building's long history and the parliamentary procedure that takes place inside it. The subsequent workshop gave students a chance to deepen their understanding of democracy, laws and debating, dividing into two sides in order to debate and carry a motion to see how legislation is created and refined. All the students were fascinated by the inner workings of government and the grandeur of the palace, with Emma in Year 13 commenting that she "loved the interactive session and the stories about the historic events that have affected parliament over time". Overall, the trip was a great success and an opportunity for our A level politics students to become more engaged and informed citizens.



To our Autumn edition of the Schools Stay Safe Newsletter. Read on for advice on ways to stay safe for you and your family.

Chimney Safety in your home

As the colder months approach, we look to heating our homes with a cosy fire. But have you had your chimney swept lately?

Chimney sweeping is recommended in October and February due to frequency of use during the winter period and build-up of soot in the chimney breast.

To keep your family safe, follow these guidelines:

- Keep chimneys and flues clean and well maintained.
- · Make sure embers are properly put out before you go to bed.
- Always use a fire guard to protect against flying sparks from hot embers.
- Be aware that chimneys that have been lined still require regular sweeping.

How often should you clean your chimney?

- · Oil Once a year.
- · Gas Once a year.
- · Bituminous coal Twice a year.
- · Wood Up to four times a year.
- · Smokeless coals At least once a year.

Halloween and Fancy Dress

Do you know the dangers around Halloween costumes catching alight? It is good to know the likelihood can be avoided with a few simple steps.



Advice for parents

- Check that all Halloween and fancy-dress costumes you buy carry a CE or UKCA mark on the label.
- All Halloween and fancy-dress outfits should always be kept away from fire, lit candles, and all
 other naked flames.
- Do not carry pumpkins with lit candles inside, consider using battery-operated candles instead.
- Children should always be supervised by a suitable adult.
- Homemade fancy dress costumes or those not tested to the same flammability standards may ignite easily and burn quicker.
- Ensure children can be seen in the dark. Think about wearing something reflective such as a reflective strip, and carry a torch.

Fireworks

Firework displays at home can be great fun, but it is important they are used safely. Children tend to get hurt rather than adults so you must keep them safe!

Sparklers can get almost 5 times hotter than cooking oil and should not be given to a child under 5.



- Always buy fireworks from a reputable shop and ensure they conform to British Standards check they have BS7114 written on the box.
- · Do not buy them from an unlicenced market stall or anywhere you are not sure about.
- The public can buy and set off most fireworks that fall under categories 1 to 3.
- · Always read the instructions carefully.
- Ensure you have plenty of room to set them off.
- Make sure there is only one person in charge of the fireworks.
- Don't drink any alcohol until they have all been set off.
- Never return to an unlit firework, it could still be live.
- Make sure you extinguish all embers before going to bed.
- Consider going to an organised event instead.

As we approach the colder months, we all look to putting the heating on again. It is vital that you service and maintain your boiler once a year. It will prolong the life of your boiler and may protect you from harmful carbon monoxide gases.

If you have a carbon monoxide detector installed at home, it will alert you to a leak immediately.

You should test it once a week where possible. If your detector sounds you should:

- Stop using all appliances and evacuate the property immediately (try to stay calm and avoid raising your heart rate.)
- Call the National Gas Emergency Service number on 0800 111 999 to report the incident or the Health and Safety Executive (HSE) Gas Safety Advice Line on 0800 300 363.
- Not go back into the property (wait for advice from the emergency services.
- · Get immediate medical help.

Did you know?

- Carbon monoxide does not have a smell.
- It is known as a silent killer.
- It is highly poisonous and is a flammable gas.
- Home boilers that are installed incorrectly, and the use of BBQs and portable generators inside homes can produce carbon monoxide.
- A brief exposure to small amounts of carbon monoxide may cause headache, flushing, nausea, dizziness, vertigo, muscle pain or personality changes.
- Exposure to higher amounts may cause movement problems, weakness, confusion, lung and heart problems, loss of consciousness and death.
