## All through news

I am sure that someone in your household is either counting the number of school days left or the number of sleeps until Christmas. Next week is our last full week; finishing on Wednesday 21st December (a half day) seems late but it does mean that our annual Christmas festivities are spaced out. Whilst the mocks continue for Y11, we can not use the school hall, but our new "Jubilee Suite" next year will allow greater opportunities. Our Christmas season starts with our very popular and amazing "Frost Fair" held on Saturday 10th December from 12pm - 4pm. This is a wonderful event for everyone - with craft stalls, tombolas, games, food and performances from our Larch musicians and dancers. Do come along; we need your support and contributions!

Next week we shall be at our local parish church "All Saints" on four occasions for secondary and primary carol services. The "day" services are for our children and young people but we invite you all to the evening services. Less than an hour long, with our own students playing and singing, you will be amazed by the quality and reverence of the event; a true way to start your Christmas traditions. Please note, the retiring collection is for the upkeep of the church; we value so much being able to use this special space so we do need to ensure that they too can pay their bills.

The secondary carol service is on Monday 12 December at 19.00; the Larch carols on Tuesday at 18.00hr. The posters are below on this newsletter.

Over the past few years, the school "Christmas Lunch" has become very much part of our Christmas celebrations. It is a huge task to feed so many children at one time and also to decorate the halls to create a spirit of festivity. On those days no other food will be served, and Christmas meals must be ordered. I am aware that information has already been sent out but this is just a reminder that those students not eating a Christmas meal will need to bring in their own food. The Larch Christmas lunch is on Monday 19

December and the secondary Christmas lunch on Tuesday 20th December. In lieu of Christmas crackers (given our ongoing focus on sustainability and the environment) all children eating a Christmas lunch will receive a candy cane (primary) or chocolate coins (secondary)!

Next week we shall be sending home a briefing about the way in which the gates/ barriers will work from January 5th, to ensure that we control how cars come onto our school site. Securing the site is just one example of how we keep students safe and we shall in future newsletters inform you of all of the many other things we are doing.

Our next newsletter will be sent out towards the end of term but I am sure that you can see that the community continues to focus upon teaching and learning, as well as providing a safe environment where students can flourish both academically and in terms of a wide menu of enrichment activities.

## Year 9 Preferences

After Christmas Year 9 students will be starting their preference journey and thinking seriously about their subject combinations for study at GCSE level. We will run two student sessions during school time, where Heads of Department will relay information regarding the GCSE course in their particular subject area. They will talk about the content of the GCSE syllabus and the types of examinations and assessments that the students will undertake in that subject. They may point out any links to careers or to the skills set that the subject lends itself to and tell the students exactly what is expected of them to complete that GCSE to their best ability. This will be delivered alongside any other relevant information. The students will be able to ask questions there and then or take more considered questions back to their subject specialist teachers over a short period of time. This information will also be available on the website in the form of a booklet. We will send you the link after Christmas so that you can sit down with your child and have a look at each course together.

During some form periods, students will be looking at Unifrog and researching any interested pathways in terms of careers and post-16 studies, to help guide them to making the right choices for themselves.

The Senior Leadership Team will also be conducting interviews with students to guide and support them through the process.

Parents and students will be invited to a Preference evening on **Tuesday 24th January 2023**, so please keep that date free. More details will follow.

### Increase in Scarlet Fever and Group A Streptococcus (GAS) cases

I am writing to update you of a recent national increase in notifications of scarlet fever to the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA), which is above expected levels for the time of year. I have also previously written to all schools and early years settings across Hertfordshire regarding this matter and will be writing again with advice and guidance.

I would like to take this opportunity to remind you of the signs and symptoms of scarlet fever. Scarlet fever is usually a mild illness, but it is highly infectious. Therefore, look out for symptoms in your child, which include

- a sore throat, headache, and fever, along with
- a fine, pinkish or red body rash with a sandpapery feel which is rough to the touch
- On darker skin, the rash can be more difficult to detect visually but will still have a rough, sandpapery feel.

Please Contact NHS 111 or your GP if you suspect your child has scarlet fever, because early treatment of scarlet fever with antibiotics is important to reduce the risk of complications such as pneumonia or a bloodstream infection. If your child has scarlet fever, keep them at home until at least 24 hours after the start of antibiotic treatment to avoid spreading the infection to others.

Scarlet fever is caused by bacteria called group A streptococci. These bacteria also cause other respiratory and skin infections such as strep throat and impetigo.

In very rare occasions, the bacteria can get into the bloodstream and cause an illness called invasive Group A strep (iGAS). While still uncommon, there has been an increase in invasive Group A strep cases this year, particularly in children under 10 and you will have seen the recent media reports of some tragic deaths as a result of iGAS. Sadly, Deaths do occur each year due to iGAS however this year has seen a slight increase which could be related to the increase in scarlet fever cases.

Currently, there is no evidence that a new strain is circulating. The increase is most likely related to high amounts of circulating bacteria and social mixing.

There are lots of viruses that cause sore throats, colds and coughs circulating. These should resolve without medical intervention. However, children can on occasion develop a bacterial infection on top of a virus and that can make them more unwell.

As a parent, if you feel that your child seems seriously unwell, you should trust your own judgement. Contact NHS 111 or your GP if:

- your child is getting worse
- your child is feeding or eating much less than normal
- your child has had a dry nappy for 12 hours or more or shows other signs of dehydration
- your baby is under 3 months and has a temperature of 38°C, or is older than 3 months and has a temperature of 39°C or higher
- your baby feels hotter than usual when you touch their back or chest, or feels sweaty
- your child is very tired or irritable


Call 999 or go to A&E if:

- your child is having difficulty breathing – you may notice grunting noises or their tummy sucking under their ribs
- there are pauses when your child breathes
- your child's skin, tongue or lips are blue
- your child is floppy and will not wake up or stay awake

Good hand and respiratory hygiene (cough and sneeze into tissues and washing your hands regularly) are important for stopping the spread of many bugs. By teaching your child how to wash their hands properly with soap for 20 seconds, using a tissue to catch coughs and sneezes, and keeping away from others when feeling unwell, they will be able to reduce the risk of picking up or spreading infections.

We wrote to Schools and early years settings such as nurseries in September to advise them of Scarlet Fever and GAS, and advise on actions to take. I am writing to them again today with further information and advice.
