NEW ENRICHMENT PROGRAMME



- Author visits/interviews



Hospitals Trust virtual work experience on Saturday 17th October, those who took part have been offered a continued placement for the next six months. The event was very well received by our students.

Year 10 and 11 have now all been invited to sign up to unifrog a student destinations platform that allows students of all academic abilities to access careers and HE related material in order to make the best choices for their future. Years 7,8 and 9 will be receiving invites after half term.

YOUNG PROFESSIONALS

Year 9 Industry Day took place virtually on the morning of 6th November. A number

of local employees have very kindly given their time to inform Year 9 about their varying careers and opportunities that are available to them. Year 10 will be taking part in the Young Professionals Conference on Thursday 12th November with a number of major employers including Vodafone and BP will be providing guest speakers, talks and guidance for our students.



This week a group of Year 9 pupils started the first of their Premier League Inspires programme with Liam Turner and Harina Basra from Wolverhampton Wanderers FC.

The sessions will focus on participation in physical activity and effective communication skills, and will give the pupil's involved an insight into the wealth of skills and knowledge that the club is able to offer. Sessions will include opportunities for pupils to develop their language skills, in English and using other languages either learned in school or spoken at home.
