COMING NEXT WEEK







We are inviting our artists in school to participate in our Christmas card competition. Look out for the posters on the google classrooms and the year group zones for inspiration and briefs.











I've been studying at Bath University for almost two months now and I can honestly say I've never worked this much before; I really enjoy the work and find it rewarding. University has certainly made me rethink how I work- but most importantly, how I schedule my work for fit all in.

With COVID around of course I have not had the usual experience, studio time went from 4 hrs a week to now none at all. My work is all taking place online and in my room. Put simply my course consists of various lecture series (that are live online) alongside project work for which I'm part of a group of four.


