I hope that all families had a restful Christmas. Despite the additional restriction that have since been put in place, I am very hopeful that 2021 will eventually see a return to some sort of normality for us all.

On Friday 18 December we hosted an incredible event in school and were joined virtually by eight other Secondary Schools. The Girls' Empowerment afternoon was absolutely inspirational, to hear from CBE, BAFTA and Olivier award winning actor, Fiona

Shaw and athlete Denise Lewis OBE about their journey's, was fantastic. Two very successful women in their own field who have not forgotten the struggles they went through, or the hard work that went into their outstanding achievements.

As a school, we tried incredibly hard last term to improve communication to parents. This not only included the introductions of the Bulletin, but also a determination to try to respond quickly to any announcements where necessary. To have to respond not once, but three times in quick succession to Government directives was at times extremely challenging, but at least we now know where we stand until February half term. The school is not the same without all the students here. Many of the staff have commented how they really miss the noise.

Students in Years 8-13 have had previous experience of virtual learning at times during this Academic year and are used to how things work. It is amazing that already just under one thousand students have taken part in virtual lessons this week. Hopefully next week, following the training we have provided, the Year 7 students will also be actively engaged with virtual lessons as well as the work that has been set on Google Classrooms.


The children that have been in school this week have joined in with the virtual lessons alongside children at home. I have personally joined some of the lessons as well and have really enjoyed the learning experiences. If you are experiencing any issues, please can I remind you to contact your child's Form Tutor in the first instance. The school website also has a section on virtual learning that should help. I was disappointed that National Express cancelled their school bus services, due to schools being closed to most students. Public bus services are still running, however, students who have Free School Meals can still receive support vouchers, as has previously been the case.

I am aware that for Year 11 & 13 students (and parents) this week's announcements regarding Public Examinations may have caused some anxiety. We purposely have avoided making too many statements on this issue so far, in order not to add to this. Our stance is as follows, and it is taken from the perspective of developing students for their future, whilst also giving them the best chances that we can to have glittering prospects ahead.

Now that examination grades will be based on Teacher assessed work, we will have to hold several more assessments and tests with students from both year groups, in order to ensure that submitted are accurate and that they stand up to external scrutiny. I also think that we have a duty to prepare students for Further Education, where they will have to sit examinations regularly. If we do not do this we would effectively be letting our students down.

Our Year 11 & 13 students have not finished school. There is still a lot of time in which progress can be made between now and the end of their courses. Coursework should be finished whenever necessary as it is very likely that this will be checked thoroughly and we need to work closely with students in order to be able to predict grades that are both optimistic and realistic.

REMOTE LEARNING STARTS - Miss Wheatcroft & Mr Walker

he school is currently a very strange place. What makes the school have that buzz is the students that attend it, unfortunately at the moment our students are not with us due to the National lockdown but the schools intent is to still educate our students and help them make progress and attain in their areas of learning while at the same time enjoying their lessons.

The school's aim is to implement a programme of online learning. From Period 3 on Monday 5th January, Virtual lessons have been delivered to Years 8 to 11 and from next week Year 7 students will also have many of their lessons delivered virtually, this will continue to provide a high quality education provision for students, some may also have work set, but this will last for the duration of a normal lesson.

The staff at S. Peter's are committed to our students' education and realise the importance of face to face learning and have developed their skills of teaching online lessons. Over the coming weeks, students will be set on line assignments and it is important that they complete these. This is essential for our Year 11 and Year 13 to submit work set students following recent announcements about exams. The school is also developing its provision so that students can be set and undertake their assessments online, and more information will be given to pupils via email and google classroom.


We are using the Google Classroom tool to deliver the lessons and it is amazing how quickly the students have adapted to this form of learning, logging on and taking an active role in their education. Attendance in on line lessons has been very high and students are already submitting work to staff. Staff have spoken about the positive approach students have shown and their engagement in work.

For Year 7 It is a very different way of learning and we do understand that it may take students some time to get used to this. We as a staff have been massively impressed by the way in which Year 7 students have engaged in their online work this week. On Friday 8th January the Year 7 students will have the opportunity to take part in an online webinar to help prepare them for next week's virtual lessons. This will be run by our ICT experts Mr Mclean and Mr Leek.

We are also aiming to support the students' well being. Heads of Year are posting information every day in order to support and help our students through these strange and difficult times and students are receiving worship sessions led by members of staff when they normally have

10 TOP TIPS REMOTE LEARNING FOR PARENTS

1) Take an active interest in your child's learning

As a parent or carer, remote learning will be a new concept for your child and there are bound to be a few teething problems to start with. Take an active interest in their learning and help support them whenever they need a helping hand.



2) Monitor your child's communication and online activity


It's important to remind your child that despite being at home, the same level of behaviour and conduct exists as if they were at school. Encourage them to remain polite, remember their manners and not to post or send any negative comments just because they are behind a computer.





Working from home and trying to learn in a more casual setting that children might associate more with play and a degree of freedom might take a bit of getting used to. Try to stick to a daily routine and use the timetable/schedule that schools have sent home to help children keep on top of their daily learning.







5) Ensure your learning device is in a public space in the home

It's important to consider where your PC or laptop is placed if live video is being used. Try to keep the background neutral with no personal information visible and move learning devices out of the bedroom as this could be deemed inappropriate.



6) Implement safety controls and privacy restrictions on apps and software

Dependant on how your school implements remote learning, your child may be required to download certain software or apps. Whilst these are likely to be relatively safe to use, like any other new app or platform, parents should still implement safety controls as a precaution.



7) Ensure your child only uses official school communication channels



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It's important that all communication with teachers and school staff is directed through approved school channels, whether that be through the school's online portal or the relevant secure messaging site.

8) Familiarise yourself with relevant school policies



Schools should have a policy on remote learning and direction that they can share with parents. Familiarise yourself with this and ensure you know what is expected of teachers and your child during lessons, both online and offline.





10) Monitor your child's wellbeing and mental health

Remote learning will likely mean that your child won't get the same level of social interaction and might not see their friends for a while. Keep a check on their wellbeing and try to encourage them to get out as much as you can. Whilst learning from home might seem fun and exciting to start with, missing out on seeing their friends everyday might take its toll.

Happy New Year to all! The last term was a very busy one for the Business department. Due to restrictions all curriculums at all stages have had to be adapted to ensure all students still gain the full 'Business Studies' experience without missing out.

KEY STAGE 4 UPDATE

Our Key Stage 4 students have been investigating small businesses and looking into how an idea can be made into a successful business. They have investigated market research techniques that include market segmentation.

They have also explored how businesses grow and are able to adapt in different cultures and countries around the world. Students will be moving onto looking at Business ethics in this ever changing world. Explore how key decisions are made by stakeholders which impact how if a business is a success or not.

KEY STAGE 5 UPDATE

Business Studies is very popular at Key Stage 5; students have been investigating functional areas of different businesses and have looked at how they work together in order to support the activities of the business. Students have regained skills in how to use financial information to be able to check the financial health of a business (an important skill to have under the current circumstances). Learnt how to probe and explore the complex relationships between businesses and their stakeholders.

Students will be moving on to understanding the different protocols that have to be followed when working in business and learn the importance of key skills such as good communication and the impact these skills have on the daily running of a business.



The advice I will give to year 8 students will be that think carefully if you want to choose this subject, it's not easy but it can help you in your life depending on what you may or may not want to do when you're older" *Key Stage 4 student*

I chose to study GCSE Business to learn more about what happens within different types of businesses, how they work, as well as the steps to starting up a successful business from scratch. While having a fundamental knowledge of skills that would help you in almost any career, you will also get a head start in learning essential life skills, which will make sure you're ready for your future after education at S.
