MILES FOR REFUGEES

Our very own Miss Lord (head of Year 9) is never one for shying away from a challenge and this one will be no different! "At a time when 1 in every 95 people on earth has fled their home as a result of conflict and persecution, the work of the British Red Cross is increasingly important. This is why she is taking part in Miles for Refugees in support of this fantastic charity. During September she is running 72 miles, the distance from Damascus to Beruit, which is a journey that many refugees are forced to take in order to escape persecution and violence. This is roughly 2.4 miles a day, every day for 30 days. Miss Lord will be completing her challenge by running an additional half marathon at the start of October. Earlier this year she was unable to



walk unaided and spent months recovering from illness, and so this will be a big challenge for her. Miss Lord said "I know that, however difficult, it will be worth it knowing that the money raised will help to support the lives of those who need it most".

Enhancement and Enrichment Programme

READING WIDELY AND OFTEN

Research shows that reading widely and often is one of the most important factors in determining future academic success. Beyond this, it also plays a pivotal role in widening our young people's understanding of the wider world, developing their sense of empathy and opening their eyes to a range of moral issues and debates. This is why we are on a mission to make St. Peter's an outstanding reading school.

This Year we are offering increased access to accelerated reader a product that puts students in the driver's seat designed to guide and support students in their reading journeys.

Accelerated Reader is proven to improve students' ability to **read independently** and enthuse a **love of reading** through its use of motivational quizzes, competitions such as 'one million words' and its signposting of appropriate and challenging next reads. All students in Years 7 to 9 are now enrolled in Accelerated Reader and will spend time in English lessons focussing on making **progress** with their reading. Our new library space will also allow students to reading more **widely and often** before and after school as well as at break times and lunch.




We believe that homework plays an important part in education and builds vital skills for future success, including in the world of work. We are also aware that pupils have opportunities and experiences outside of school that are equally important in developing and enriching their lives. With this in mind, we would like to share expectations and key information with you. There will be a link to the updated Homework Policy in next week's bulletin.

The table below shows examples of common homework activities. Tasks may be set in addition to or instead of the activities below, and variety of task and content is encouraged in order to cater for a range of learning styles. Homework is set at least twice per half term in each subject.

As we move increasingly towards online platforms for students' learning outside of lessons, there will be no planners issued this academic year. Instructions and deadlines will be clearly communicated with pupils by their class teacher in one of the following ways: copied into books by pupils, on handouts or booklets, posted on Google Classroom, or set on another online platform as appropriate to the subject. We will be adding some short tutorial videos to the website over the coming week to help you and your child in accessing the most common areas of Google Drive.

In order to support students in developing independent learning and time management skills, we have produced a homework timetable. This indicates on which day pupils should aim to dedicate time to homework tasks in each subject. Homework may not be set on this particular day and depends on each pupils' individual timetable. https://speters.org.uk/homework-timetable-2021-22/

If your child is unsure about their homework, they should check on Google classroom and in their exercise book (if used for the subject) in the first instance. Your child's class teachers will be happy to discuss homework if necessary.

Our extensive Enrichment and Enhancement program, including Homework Club for all year groups, offers additional opportunities for your child to reinforce and extend their learning outside of lesson time. We look forward to seeing as many students as possible make the most of these sessions which begin on Monday 13th September.
