Prayer Focus – The Season of Easter

The Season of Easter: The liturgical colour for this season is white and gold, the colours used by the Church to celebrate its most joyous times. The prayer focus should be at its most colourful and vibrant. The 'Alleluia', our song of joy, should have a prominent place alongside signs, symbols and images of the Resurrection which are reminders of the new life given by Jesus. These can include, Resurrection crucifixes where Jesus is portrayed in robes, flowers, Easter Gardens, the empty tomb, decorated eggs, chicks and lambs. On the Solemnity of the Ascension (May 29), which is 40 days after Easter Sunday, the Church celebrate Jesus' ascension into heaven and so images of this event could be displayed.

May: This is the month devoted to Our Lady, (please note that it does not take precedence over Easter). It can be reflected through images and icons of Mary. Traditionally, May prayer areas are filled with flowers surrounding a statue or image of Our Lady. Different cultural images and statues of Mary can be used to remind the children of the devotion to Our Lady throughout the world.

What is the Rosary?

The Rosary is an important form of Christian Prayer. It is prayed using Rosary beads (see picture). The current form probably originates from St. Dominic. The beads are set out in five groups of ten and each is called a decade. Each circuit (5 decades) is known as a Mystery. The word Mystery comes from a Greek route meaning 'the telling'. Each Mystery has a theme which retells the key events in the life of Jesus and his mother Mary. The Rosary consists of The Joyful Mysteries, The Sorrowful Mysteries, The Glorious Mysteries and he Mysteries of Light.

As the Rosary is prayed, people reflect and mediate on the five important events in each Mystery. A good guide for the structure of the Rosary can be found here:

In school, you may see a Missionary Rosary. This is a colourful rosary made up of 5 different colours. Each colour represents a different continent in the world and helps us to pray for the people living on those continents and particularly those living in poverty and adversity. Easter traditions from around the world

There are many different ways that Catholics celebrate Easter around the word. This would be a great project to investigate a range of traditions. e.g.

Poland

The day before Easter, families prepare a "blessing basket." It's filled with coloured eggs, sausages, bread, and other important food and taken to church to be blessed. In Polish culture, Lent isn't over until a priest blesses this basket.

France

According to Catholic teaching, no church bells can ring between Holy Thursday and the Easter Vigil, on account of the solemnity of the days around Jesus's death. Eventually, a legend evolved that said the church bells weren't rung because they grew wings and flew to Rome to be blessed by the Pope. Then they returned on Easter day with chocolate and presents for local children.


