



September Newsletter

Welcome to the first newsletter of this academic year. We hope you find it informative and useful.

Based on the feedback we received last academic year about our newsletters, we have decided that this academic year, a monthly one, filled with lots of information about what your children have been learning as well as updates about everything that has been taking place within school will be issued.

As I am sure most of you are aware, this Summer our Nursery classroom, now known as Room 1, has undergone a complete refurbishment. This included a significant redesign, total redecoration and new floor and the installation of all new furniture.

Since September we are now operating as an Early Years Foundation Stage Unit and are thrilled with how things are going!

We would therefore like to invite you into school to come and see for yourself just how amazing things are looking in EYFS! If you have young children this is a great opportunity to see the provision that they may experience. However, it also provides the parents of our older children with the chance to see our first designed classroom as our long term plan for the school includes the redevelopment of all classrooms and learning environments. We are thrilled to be joined by Dean Jackson, Director of Education and Skills and John Beynon, local councillor for Stobhill on Monday 21st October who will officially open the room. Parents are invited to come and have a look around from 14:30. We look forward to seeing you there!

This is not the only change to have taken place within EYFS. We are now offering 30 hours free childcare to parents who are eligible. Spaces are filling up so if you are interested, please contact our school office for more information.

There has been a lot of other building work taking place to the cabin at the front of our school. This building was originally built as a Sure Start Centre, bringing together early education, childcare, health and family support. However, at Easter this year, Action for Children made the decision to no longer operate from this building. The Local Authority made the decision that our neighbor's, Collingwood School and Media Arts College will now use the facility and it will be predominantly used for their 6th Form pupils. As part of the development work a fence and gate has been installed between the two schools. This gate will be programmed to open in the morning to enable children to access breakfast club and soft opening as well as in the evening to enable class 3/4HO to leave and parents access for after school club. It does however mean that the gate will be closed during the school day and will stop people walking through the school site.

During September's training day we were joined by Sharron Johnson from Action for Children who provided staff with information of how to signpost parents to support in the local area. If you require any information about how you can access support from Action for Children please feel free to call in and ask. Don't forget, every Thursday morning Action for Children host Learning Together Through Play sessions in our school hall for children aged o to 5 years. What Learning Has Been Taking Place?

Handwriting

Our children and staff have been working extremely hard to improve our schools handwriting. Last year we invested in the 'Letter Join' handwriting scheme. The children are now receiving daily handwriting lessons and it has had an incredible impact on handwriting across school. Just look at this example:

Home School Reading

Children reading at home is hugely important for all of our children in order for them to practise and develop the skills they are learning in school. It's also a lovely time to share a book with your child and chat about what they are reading. All children from Reception to Year 4 should have a home/school reading book and a reading record book. Whilst children are on the Read Write Inc programme, which begins in Reception, they will bring home a RWI Book Bag Book each week for the level of RWI they are working on. This is an important book for them to read as it helps them to develop their phonic skills. They should read this book daily to develop their understanding of the book and their fluency. They will also bring home another reading book from our reading scheme which should be of a similar level. They can read this book in addition to their RWI Book Bag Book.

Once children are no longer on the RWI programme it is still expected that they will read regularly at home. It is important that children read to an adult and talk about what they are reading even when they become fluent readers. For children to become fluent readers they may need to read a book several times.

We would appreciate it if parents/carers could comment in the reading record books at least 3 times a week. Books can be changed on a Tuesday and Thursday.

Please encourage your child to put their reading book in the box in the classroom if they are ready to change their book.

Information about our new online reading programme will be coming very soon and this will provide children with another way to engage with reading.

A Polite Reminder about Parking

We would like to take this opportunity to remind all our parents about parking safely and legally when collecting and dropping off the children, both at the start and end of the day. It is also important that we park safely in ways that do not restrict clear views of safe places to cross the road.
