After careful consideration, we have chosen cocker spaniels named Monty and George. Monty is 6 years old and George is 2. Both dogs are owned by Mr Henderson and are very well trained.

Some of the many benefits of having a school dog include both cognitive and social development as well as helping to improve emotional and social skills. We will also use our dogs to help children with their reading as they can read aloud to Monty and George to build their confidence. Also, having school dogs can help to build our school community through togetherness and the sense of a family environment.

Seesaw

Over the last few years we have worked extremely hard in school to develop an exciting, aspirational and engaging curriculum for our children to ensure they can be the best they can be, no matter what their starting points are.

As parents, you are the first educators of our children and as a team, we need to work together to ensure they reach their potential and develop a love of learning. There has been no greater emphasis on this than now as we recover from the impact Covid-19 has had on education.

It was wonderful to see in our most recent parent survey that 92% of you either agree, or strongly agree that we have high expectations for your children. Parts of this, is how we engage and encourage you to work alongside your children at home using Seesaw so you can track what we have been working on in school, but also help your child to progress their learning even more by completing the work set by class teachers every week.

In some classes, there has been a 50% increase in the amount of parents who are now joining in with their child's learning at home. This has had a positive impact on their learning in the classroom. If you cannot access Seesaw and need help to support you child at home, please speak to their class teacher.

EYFS

In the Early Years we continue to develop our learning environment and this term's focus has been the Reception classroom. Our new creative area has been welcomed with bright eyes and messy hands as the children have taken on the role of artists. It has been a joy to watch them explore different mediums independently and develop their creative

skills. Nursery have been keen to get involved, with a focus on mark marking in a variety of ways. A highlight was using mud, water and sticks to create pictures of owls from their core book, 'Owl Babies'.

Our core books have been a great success with 'Owl Babies' and 'Kipper's Toybox' becoming fast favourites. Nursery have enjoyed making nests for the owl babies in the outdoor provision and using props to retell the story. Reception have been retelling the story through story maps and sequencing pictures from the story. We noticed Kipper's shadow in the dark, so we developed our understanding of shadows and how they are made. We went outside to look at our own shadows and created shadows on the wall with torches. This led to stories being created using their hands as puppets and shadows being drawn around to make pictures on the wall.

We are now reading 'The Gingerbread Man' in Nursery, and 'How to Catch a Star' in Reception. Look out for all the fun we have planned on our twitter and Facebook pages!

Year 1

Year 1 have had some fun additions to our curriculum this half term. This started with a visit from the Fire Brigade to talk to us about equipment used in modern day fire fighting. This allowed us to make clear comparisons between life today and that of 1666, during the Great Fire of London. Graeme the fire fighter was keen to know what we had learned about in our Great Fire of London unit of work...and we certainly impressed him with the pupil's knowledge!

Our new geography unit for this half term has been a real hit with the children. They have been so engaged in the practical, hands on approach, where we are learning to research, think and evaluate like geographers. This began by mapping the school building and measuring rooms. Then this week we carried out fieldwork around Stobhill estate, conducting traffic surveys, gathering evidence by speaking with the public and by listing buildings and businesses which we have in our locality.

In Art, Year 1 have been turning the clock back to The Stone Age, to learn about cave art. The tranquillity on Monday afternoon in the classroom, during our Art lesson this week was incredible. Using pastels, pens and charcoal, the children were just so enthused and eager to achieve perfection in their sketch books.



Year 2

Year 2 have settled into the new half term so well and have shown huge improvements all round! In Maths, we have been adding and subtracting numbers, using lots of concrete materials to help us.

We are learning about losing tales in English, and our class text is based on the famous book *Room on the Broom* by Julia Donaldson. The witch loses her hat, then her broom and bumps into a dangerous, disgusting dragon...Year 2 will be using everything they have learnt to write their very own losing tale.

In Science, it's all about living things in their habitats. We know all about different habitats within the UK and that all living things depend on each other to survive. We have drawn our school garden habitat and discovered that while animals eat nuts and fruit from trees, the trees also rely on animals to spread their seeds!

Our trip to Beamish was a complete success and children thoroughly enjoyed themselves. They pretended to be Victorians for the day, performing daily duties around the houses to keep them clean and tidy; polishing, emptying bed pans, ironing, lacing shoes and drying clothes in a mangle!

We have been learning all about the United Kingdom in Geography and have been using atlases to locate capital cities in all four countries. With endless singing, helping us to remember the countries, we have had so much fun.



Year 3

A lot has happened in year 3 since our last newsletter: we have been learning all about writing an instruction text (as our model text, we followed RHS instructions on 'forcing indoor bulbs' – the children will be bring theirs home in early December for some Christmas/New Year colour), we have just finished our addition and subtraction unit and have now moved onto multiplication and division. Please encourage TTRS as much as possible!

Across the broader curriculum, we have been investigating soil permeability and rocks classification as well as beginning a unit on South America and the Amazon rainforest which lends itself nicely to address the extremely important and topical global issue of climate change.

In Physical Education, we are currently putting our fundamental movement skills to good use through net/wall games and dance. Children have been developing their skills in both tennis and badminton as well as practising their Christmas performance line dance. As you can see opposite, we also made time for some fun, Halloween-themed PE games!



Year 4

It has continued to be a busy half term in Year 4! It was so lovely to speak to parents in our first parents evening of the

year and let them know about how well Year 4 have settled in and how they are already setting such an amazing example as the oldest children in our school.

What's been happening in class?

Before half term, we had lots of Spooktacular fun on our Halloween day.

We have been working hard in Writing lessons and have now completed a fiction and a non-fiction writing unit; children have absolutely blown me away with the outstanding extended pieces of writing that have been produced.

We thoroughly enjoyed our Ancient Greek topic but have now switched to a Geography focus, learning about map skills. We look forward to putting our newly developed skills into practice when we will plan and follow a route in our local area. We have now also hung up our Ukulele's and are learning about exploring Monet in Art lessons.

What's been happening outside of school?

Miss Owens recently enjoyed a Saturday evening at Whitley Bay Playhouse, watching Mae and Ava in the Morpeth CAST production of Joseph and his Technicolour Dreamcoat. Great show girls- A standing ovation!

What's coming up?



Climate Change Initiatives

Hi. My name is Sharon Mungall and I'm the new School Business Manager and Climate Change Ambassador for Stobhillgate, I would like to let you know of some of the initiatives we are hoping to implement over the coming weeks/months in school which is in response to the Three Rivers Learning Trust's direction on climate change.

It has been well documented in the media that if we continue on our current trajectory, the biggest impact of climate change will be on our children's futures, therefore I feel that it is important that the children of Stobhillgate have a 'voice' and are involved in the initiatives, and to even make suggestions of their own. I plan to meet with the UNICEF Ambassadors of Stobhillgate before Christmas to listen to their views and suggestions so that they can have an input into changes they would like to see happen.

Some of the initiatives we hopefully plan to implement are:

- Reducing single use plastic in school
- Removing the use of tetrapak milk cartons which are currently not recyclable in our area
- Have recycling bins in every classroom
- Setting up an allotment where the children can plant seeds, care for them, watch them grow, and then potentially help prepare the vegetables to be used for school lunches
- Composting fruit/veg waste
- Create 'Turn Off Light' signs to be placed next to light switches to encourage lights to be switched off when a room is not in use
- Register with <u>SAS: Plastic Free Schools</u>

The above ideas will be shared with our UNICEF Ambassadors and I'm sure they'll come up with ideas of their own, which I will share with you in our monthly newsletters.
