As some of you are aware we are now part of Cheviot Learning Trust which is a newly formed Multi Academy Trust following the merger of the Tyne Community Learning Trust and The Three Rivers Learning Trust in September 2023. We now comprise of 18 schools in total, including, 2 High Schools, 5 Middle Schools and 11 First Schools. We have a roll of approximately 6000 students and 750 employees. As a school, we are already greatly benefiting from wider opportunities for our pupils, more enhanced staff development and additional governance support.

EYFS

Nursery and Reception have made a great start to the school year with a busy half term. The children in Nursery have enjoyed exploring their new classroom, but especially our construction area. They have built many models together, showcasing their teamwork and collaboration skills.

It was also fantastic to welcome all of the families to Nursery Stay and Play. The Stay and Play session was an excellent opportunity for our families to come together and experience and connect with school and see the progress their children have made since the start of term. It was amazing to see so many families come and join us and play together. All of the children were so excited to see their parents in Nursery and were so excited to show off all that they have achieved so far.

We have had a great start to Forest Fridays this half term. The children have enjoyed looking at how nature changes throughout the Autumn season. We have explored how the trees and leaves change, how Mushrooms grow and how apples are harvested. We even used the apples to make apple crumble. It was delicious.

Reception have thoroughly enjoyed their core story Pumpkin Soup. They found a collection of different pumpkins in their classroom and used them to make pumpkin soup, following instructions they found in our core book. After chopping the pumpkin, pouring the water and stirring the soup we all got to taste it. Some of us thought it was delicious, others not so much!







In our final week of half term, we have also been completing our first Design technology project; structures. We have used junk modelling to create the cat from our core story. To begin with we practised our cutting skills before moving on to plan our design. We then used different materials to make a cat together with our friends.

Year 1

Year 1 have had a wonderful half term with so much exciting learning happening.

In English we have completed some wonderful story openings, for our own version of Little Red Roding Hood and have created instructions for a magical potion, inspired by the story 'Room on the Broom.' We are loving our new text 'The Rainbow Fish'. We made sparkly scales with sequins and glitter. We thought about how we could show kindness to friends and gave these away to someone else in the class, to help us to empathise with the character of the Rainbow Fish.

In Maths we have been learning how we can represent objects as number sentences. We have written these various ways around and are more recently becoming very speedy at recalling our number bonds to 10.

In geography we have been learning about our local area through lots of map work. We went for an autumn walk around Stobhill and carried out field work, comparing the number of pedestrians and vehicles on different streets. We have also enjoyed treasure hunting for a pirate in the school grounds and making our own maps to show how the land which Stobhill is built on has changed over time.

In Science we have been learning about the human body. We have learned some exciting new vocabulary and have used this to change the words of heads shoulders knees and toes each week. We have been exploring our 5 senses and carried out some wonderful data collecting as part of this. We love wearing our lab coats too, to make us feel like real scientists!!

What a busy but exciting half term. Well done for all working so so hard. You all deserve a well-earned rest over half term, ready for lots more to come in Year 1 next half term.



Year 2

I am very proud of all the children in Year 2, and how each child has started the year with such a positive attitude towards all of their learning.

In English, we began the term with an Australian classic by Mem Fox, called *Possum Magic*. This is a delightful tale about two possums who travel all around Australia in search of human food. In the lead up to writing our own version of the story, we enjoyed trying different foods from both Australia and England, and we loved creating our own settings and characters. Following this, we completed our non-fiction unit, where we wrote some instructions on how to make a Royal Cheese Scone. Again, we loved trying some delicious foods, and making our own Cheese Scones, before writing detailed and precise instructions.




In Maths, we have been working hard to master our understanding of place value, working in both tens and ones with numbers up to 100. We have represented these numbers in many different ways, using a variety of manipulatives.

For the wider curriculum, we have been studying the work of Beth Krommes in Art. The children have loved looking at her famous artwork 'Waves' and thinking about the skills needed to create a replica of this. Using different mediums, the children were able to use the skills learnt throughout the unit to create their own masterpieces.



In Science, we have been learning all about how animals, including humans. We have looked at how they change as they grow, what they need to survive and why a balanced diet and exercise are important. It was wonderful to see the children applying this knowledge to their homework projects. The children were able to speak clearly and with confidence about their chosen athlete, and made references to balanced diets and muscles throughout. Well done Year 2!

Year 3


It has been fantastic getting to know the children of Year 3 this term, and we have been very busy since September!

We have loved reading the stories 'The Diary of a Killer Cat' and especially 'The Queen's Nose'. The children have loved making predictions about characters and plot, and have shown off their excellent reading skills.

Maths lessons have covered a range of topics including place value, addition and subtraction, and the children are finding out how fun it can be to learn times tables with Times Tables Rock Stars. We have already seen some impressive performances!

Other highlights this term have included learning about coding and programming in computing, our word of the day challenge, exploring the painting technique of impasto and of course our Vincent Van Gogh homework. This week, the children have been talking to the class about their incredible projects, and it has been amazing to see such creative and inspiring work.

Year 4

In English lessons this half term, we have been exploring both fiction and non-fiction texts.

We have learned how to write 'Defeating the monster' stories, exploring the writing techniques that an author can use to create exciting plots.

Continuing the theme of monsters, we then learned how to write instructions; our model text was "How to Trap a Dragon". Through our learning hook, we understood that instructions needed to be incredibly specific!

We gave Miss Owens instructions on how to make a sandwich. She followed our instructions exactly and got into a real mess! We explored writing toolkit features we could use to improve our instructions.

We finished our first reciprocal reading book – The Butterfly Lion by Michael Morpurgo.

We are now enjoying reading Varjak Paw by SF Said, we have lots of brilliant predictions about the story and ask lots of questions while we are reading. Our library slot is every Thursday afternoon. We are enjoying the choice of different stories when reading for pleasure in our school library space.

In Maths, we have revisited place value and have been learning how to add and subtract 4-digit numbers using the column method. Next half term, we will be moving onto multiplication and division. In the summer term, our Year 4 children will complete the multiplication check, a statutory test, which assesses children's knowledge of times table facts up to 12 x 12. We have been practicing in school and have enjoyed tournaments against our teachers! Congratulations to Summer who is currently occupying the top of our leaderboard as a Rock Legend! This means Summer can recall her tables in less than 2 seconds!

In History this half term, we have been learning about the Ancient Greeks. This was the focus for our homework project this half term. I was blown away with the effort and enthusiasm of Year 4 students who have worked incredibly hard over the half term to produce really high-quality work based on their learning and further research at home.

This half term, our science focus across school has been Animals Including Humans. Animals Including Humans is the only Science topic which is revisited in every year group throughout the primary age range. Children progress from naming body parts in Year 1 to knowing about bones and muscles in Year 3 to describing the digestive system in Year 4, which lays the foundations for their move to middle school where they will go on to learn about the circulatory system in Year 6.

Year 4 have certainly been getting "hands on" with practical investigation this half term – some highlights were our model of the human digestive system, which we demonstrated to parents in our class assembly!

The final week of this half term was DT week, across school we are exploring Structures. Year 4 have been making pavilions to present at a class expo! We have designed, made and evaluated our structures throughout the week!


