Dear Parents/Carers,

I hope you and your families are well.

As we come to the end of our school year, let me start by thanking all of our families for the incredible support they have shown to our school. Once again, it has been a challenging year but one in which we have worked together to ensure that our students get a really great deal at St Oscar Romero.

Despite the restrictions of covid, we have tried, as much as possible, to maintain a sense of normality, and to give our students the fullest and broadest experience of our curriculum; I am extremely grateful for the way in which our staff have done this.

Although, covid infection rates are increasing, we have been lucky that we have only had to deal with a relatively small number of positive cases in our school.

On 19th July 2021, the Government updated its guidance for schools, including removing the need for year groups to be kept in distinct 'bubbles', as well as the requirement to wear face masks. Recognising that Government guidance does change on a regular basis, I will write to you nearer the start of term when I will outline exactly how our school routines will work but I am hopeful that our different year groups will be able to mix.

Nationally, all students and staff are being asked to take part in two lateral flow tests at school at the start of the autumn term. As was the case in March, this remains voluntary but I would ask for your support as this is one simple way we can all keep each other safe and avoid disruption and lost learning caused by asymptomatic covid infection. So that our students have an efficient start to the school year, we will be carrying out the first test before the students return on the following dates;

- Wednesday, 1st September Lateral Flow Testing for students in Year 7 (11am) & Year 11 (1.10pm)
- Thursday, 2nd September Lateral Flow Testing for students in Year 8 (9am), Year 9 (11am) and Year 10 (1.10pm).

From September we are extending lunch break by 10 minutes, meaning our school day will finish at 3pm instead of 2.50pm. This will enable five year groups to use the canteen and prevents the need for a split lunch, in which two year groups would have a disrupted lesson 5.

Many of the annual fundraising events, such as the Fireworks display and Summer Fair, were not able to take place this past year. However, they still managed to raise over £5000, all of which will be spent on our students. I invite all parents to join our first Friends of Romero meeting, which takes place Tuesday, 7th September 6pm at school.

Finally, I would like to thank our outstanding staff who have worked tirelessly this year. I do not believe they could have done any more to support our students and we are blessed to have such a team. I have encouraged all of them to switch their emails off and take a proper break, so that they can recharge their batteries and come back in September refreshed. 


Art students in Year 7's and 8's have just finished their personal wooden crosses, based on the crosses and art work by the El Salvadorian artist Fernando LLort. Llort was a spiritual man and a great friend of St Oscar Romero. The cross project was to mark the name change of the school. Every student in year 7 and 8 has designed and made their own cross which they can take home. The most impressive designs will feature at our annual Art exhibition in mid-July. Year 7's are now moving onto the 'Fantastic Birds and Beasts' unit, where they will learn important skills for drawing. Year 8's are moving on to the 'Day of the Dead' unit, looking at pattern and Mexican culture.






Year 7 students have been working with Ms Langley, the textiles specialist, to create their 'Textile Rock Pools', out of real fabric, for the DT rotation. The rock pools will come alive with; dyed starfish, embroidered anemone, stencilled sea creatures and embossed aluminium can fish. Students have really enjoyed dying the cotton and seeing real cotton plants and learning about the science behind the technique.



Year 7 Graphics have been working on their 'Circus 'unit, drawing a variety of circus themed illustrations, including the 'Madame' style font and tarot cards, before moving onto creating a 3D circus tent using a variety of techniques and media with Miss Longman.




Year 8 Textiles have been working on the 'Native Americans' unit, looking at Native American culture including; totem poles, animal symbols, feathers and eagles. In class the students are making Native American wall hangings using the techniques; weaving, feather painting and making dream catchers.



Year 8 Graphics have been working with Miss Longman on the unit 'India', making a 3D point of sale advertisement for Indian tourism. Students have been studying Indian style references such as rangoli, mehndi and mandala patterns. The India sketch book front cover is a double layered Taj Mahal illustration filled with poly tile printing.



Year 9 Art students have finished their German Expressionism unit making their final monochrome, one or two point, perspective relief compositions. A crack squad of year 9 students are currently designing the 18 stained glass windows for the chapel based on our tutor houses, St Oscar Romero, Mary and Jesus. In class the students have moved onto the Expressive Portrait unit and have been scaling up a self-portrait to A2 size.



Year 9 Graphics students have finished their typography project, the results will be displayed at the exhibition. Students have now moved on to their Stop motion unit based on time, using the new ipads which were brought this year for the department.




Year 10 Art students have finished their Still Life unit and their final pieces to great accomplishment. Students have now moved onto Portrait which is the second genre in art historically. Students have started historically looking at the portraits of Leonardo da Vinci and asking themselves 'What is the purpose of a portrait?

Year 10 Graphics students have finished their 'Portrait/Identity' unit and their final pieces with a range of 2D and 3D works. Students have based their ideas on three different photographers; John Stezaker, Sean Williams and Marcelo Monreal, to create their own digitally manipulated portraits.



Year 11 Art students have finished their GCSE with incredible results, the best the department and school has ever had. Ms Langley is extremely proud of her two year 11 classes and wishes them joy and happiness for the future. The two classes were the first Ms Langley has seen through the whole GCSE from year 9-11.

Child Development

The Year 11s completed their portfolio of work ready for submission for their final qualification. They worked incredibly hard and independently to produce a high standard of work, as well as sit final assessments. They should all feel very proud of the way they have approached this year and the commitment they've shown to achieve the very best of themselves. I am so proud of them all and wish them every success in their future.

In Year 10, the students have completed the first of two portfolios and are already planning the child study for their second portfolio of coursework. Dance

We believe in our Dance department that it is vital for our students to motivate and engage through the arts as a key contributor of mental & health wellbeing, encouraging deeper understanding of the art form and working on a professional level.

Above previously stated in all previous newsletters and we still continue with that ethos and vision at our core.

Wow what a term we have had in the Dance Department! After every term I love to reflect on how far we have come and this term has been such an achievement! From Dance on Sports Day to James Wilton Dance Company Workshop, the students have so much to be proud of.

Two of our amazing dance students Jack Elliott (Yr 10) and Ellena Meakins (Yr 11) gained a place on the Laban CAT scheme - centre of advanced training. They had endured two rounds of auditions and have gained a place for September, the company will rehearse and train every weekend and both will meet their Laban tutors very soon, a massive congratulations to them both!

We started the term with The Romero Dance Company auditions, over 80 applicants that come to dance club weekly across the school took part in this, with only 16 places up for grabs. The students did brilliantly and worked so hard.

The Company students, along with the GCSE Dancers, took part in a Dance Workshop with Ollie from the James Wilton Dance Company. James Wilton rehearses locally in Eastbourne & works on athletic dance using the preservation of energy to create a seamless performances. He uses religious stories & chronicles as stimuli for his work. The Romero Dance Company performed a work dedicated to the workshop in the Dance Showcase entitled 'Storm.'



Sports day was a huge success championing Dance. We started the week with The Deanery sports day which included Dance. This set Dance in the highest regard amongst the year 5 students. All of them gave a tremendous amount of effort, aided by our fantastic Dance leaders, and this was a great success.

Leading on nicely to our St Romeros Sports Day. The energy and enthusiasm from all students was phenomenal. The creativity demonstrated by the students was brilliant, they got their form tutors involved, and there was safe contact lifts and choreographic devices.





Our Curriculum

Having started new KS3 units all students have lapped up the opportunities to get involved.

The year 7 groups have taken a journey to both the Desert & the City through contrasting actions and dynamics. Year 8 have been using the 'Political Summit' and conversational gestures to generate movement. Year 9 performed using a professional work 'Swansong' by Christopher Bruce who is on the current GCSE specification for Dance, this allows the students to have direct correlation with their qualification if they have chosen to do so.

We have now finished our rotation of Dance with our all PE sets. All students study the same units until year 10 where the girls set start to look at spoken word poetic stimulus and the boys perform a piece by The Balletboyz called 'Young Men' choreographed by Ivan Mason.

We said Goodbye to our wonderful year 11's and will say a final farewell to the brilliant dancers in that year with our Dance Showcase in the Autumn Term.



Extra-Curricular

We offer Dance club to all students at St Oscar Romero.

The year 7 & 8's with the help of our Dance Leaders have been working on 'Jungle' by Tash Sultana, it is just an instrumental piece and we have been experimenting with a group contact work creating a human mountain. This piece will be performed in our Dance Showcase.

Year 9 & The Romero Dance Company have, as stated above, created a piece with our guest dancer from James Wilton Dance Company entitled 'Storm'

Rehearsals are continuous until the end of term for our Dance Showcase. The Showcase will incorporate solos from the GCSE Dancers who choreographed a 3 minute solo for a mock exam. The GCSE Dancers will be performing their exam trios as a whole group titled 'Aftermath', this piece 8 to 'Theatre in education' as they begin year 9.

Drama

Year 7

It has been just wonderful to welcome our students back to lessons for the term and see them thrive once again in a practical way.

Year 7 are working on a wonderful script called 'The Terrible fate of Humpty Dumpty', discovering how drama scripts can be a means for change and education whilst considering themes of bullying. They are developing characterisation through techniques such as; hot seating, role on the wall and conscience corridors. They have written their own monologues and performed these to their class whilst using peer assessment to block, shape and direct the work of others.



Year 8

Year 8 are developing their improvisation skills having explored a range of stimuli. They are focusing on the story of 'Stephen' a young boy struggling with the impact of peer pressure who has challenging relationships. They have worked in pairs, small groups and as a whole class and considered the importance of healthy relationships during adolescence. By looking at the theatre practitioner 'Stanislavsky' students have directly used 'magic if', 'emotion memory' and the 'given circumstances' to improve their acting skills and become better analysers of the work of others.

Year 9

Wow!!!!! is all I can say. What a term the year 9 GCSE drama students have had. A very small idea discussed in our little drama office before Christmas has flourished into a 'Covid safe' bubbled 'School production 2021' entitled 'Blue Remembered Hills'. We couldn't be more proud of the year 9 drama students and what they have achieved. They have become a 'production company' and auditioned for roles such as actors, set designers, costume designers, stage managers and lighting and sound designers all over zoom from home. They have attended workshops online to understand the cultural, historical and social context of the play, learnt lines, designed extensive set to list just a few of their responsibilities. Watching the group grow from a class of students to a hardworking, mature and dedicated team of young people has been a pleasure. Year 10

How incredibly hard the year 10 GCSE students worked under some challenging circumstances to produce such high quality devised pieces of theatre for their first practical exam! Well done to all our year 10 students. They were given a range of stimuli to explore in workshop styled lessons as well as working alongside the practical style of 'Frantic Assembly' which included chair duets, lifts and close contact. Having chosen their discipline from; acting, sound, set, costume or lighting design students have developed improvisation to create an abstract piece of theatre using a linear narrative of their own choice. Stimuli included; the song Rehab by Amy Winehouse, A photography entitled 'The Beautiful Suicide' and an historical event: The war of Sarajevo. Once again we have seen commitment, dedication and maturity with so many of our students attending several evenings' afterschool to rehearse and come together as a team to prepare for their filming days. Year 10 will also be the first year group to see some live theatre kicking off with trips such as 'South Pacific' at Chichester's festival theatre in July followed by 'Blood Brothers' the national tour at the Mayflower in Southampton in September. Good luck to all our year 10s as they embark on their final year in the drama department.



Year 11




Enterprise

We have also been learning a new topic this term on market research. Students have been learning about the importance of market research when planning a new product or starting up a new business.

English

A message from Ms Norman:

We have had a busy and productive summer term. Our students' positive attitude throughout these very different school times has consistently impressed the whole English team. We proudly said goodbye to our wonderful Year 11 cohort, who worked incredibly hard up until their final day.

Our Year 7 and Year 8 students have impressed the whole English team by rising to the challenge of studying Shakespeare and engaging with his beautiful and complex language. Year 7 enjoyed exploring the themes of 'Romeo and Juliet', writing modern monologues to explore characters' feelings and using the lovely summer weather for some outdoor drama. In Year 8 we engaged with the character of 'Richard III' and explored how Shakespeare may have written it as propaganda for Elizabeth I; this culminated in a trial of the king. We would like to encourage all our Key Stage 3 students to complete the reading challenge we have set them for their summer homework (see Edulink for details). Prizes for book reviews will be awarded in September. Students should continue to use Accessit next year to browse the library for book titles and books can be reserved in advance.



Reading has remained a key focus for us as a whole school and we would like to thank Mrs Shanley for her tireless work on setting up the new library and engaging our students with reading throughout the year. We recommend that students read every day, for pleasure and challenge; please ask your child's teacher for recommended books if you need support with reading at home. We were excited to take part in the Amazing Book Awards this year (which is organised for schools across Sussex) and to have some prizes awarded to our students for competition entries. Mrs Shanley and the Book Club organised a

celebration event in the library and listened to presentations by the competition entrants. Well done Book Club team – we hope to hear more from you next year!

We have now completed a large part of our GCSE Literature curriculum and we encourage our students to complete the online revision we have set up for you, so that you will return with your knowledge more securely embedded. 


Tips for encouraging reading at home:






STUDENTS OF EXCELLENCE

Changes in the RE department

This year brings a lot of change for the RE department. After many years of teaching RE, SENCO, and even school chaplain, **Mrs Martin** has moved onto a new role. Mrs Martin writes;

"On Friday 28th May 2021 I left St. Oscar Romero Catholic School, I started in February 2007 as the schools first chaplain. In 2010 I began teaching RE. My last day began with Mass in the new Chapel, as a person of faith this for me was a privilege, not only to be able to go to Mass but to receive communion. For us to have Jesus, as Father Terry said, not only 'at the centre of our school' but in our hearts to take to the young people we teach, guide and care for. Our Chapel is beautiful and is already a refuge for so many of us and the students.

Teaching RE allows us to broaden the minds of the young people in our classrooms, enabling them to think about and discuss the 'big questions'. To explore different faiths, breakdown the barriers erected by the media and understand each other.

Creating a space where young people feel confident enough to question, and discuss Faith, belief and teaching. Explore philosophers, moral teaching and God. To understand the connections in Abrahamic religions. Enabling them to see the world as one creation and develop a sense of justice for all. To learn and live a faith" – Mrs Martin

Also, the amazing Mr Ramasami is leaving us:

"It is a little poignant for me to be writing this because I am moving on from teaching this summer. I started as a baby teacher in 1994 and have been doing it pretty much full time ever since. I have had loads of adventures across what has been almost three decades in education. It is particularly sweet that this last school has felt like the best. Working with Pete Byrne (and critically - John Watts as Head of Department) has been a very positive experience. department like that our has excellent standards, while also embracing a diverse crowd of teachers. One of the key things that makes Christian communities stronger is when they value differences within the body of Christ. I have been looked after and nurtured in lots of situations in my time at Romeros - thankyou to everyone who treated me kindly and encouraged me so effectively to improve as a teacher.

Among the most moving things for me must surely include the section 48 inspection we had a year or so ago. The diocese inspection team was pretty thorough in their evaluation of the school - I think by the end everyone was feeling quite exhausted! I remember sitting in the library to listen to their judgement report. Every category was rated as outstanding - something that both Mr Watts and Mr Byrne can be credited with directly. I was glad to be a small part of that. It was so emotional!

One other thing that I have loved about being in the RE department at Romeros is the culture of spirituality. I have taught in other schools where this kind of thing is viewed with unhealthy suspicion. I have been impressed with the way Mr Byrne expects his teachers to embrace this. I have been much more open about my Christian faith since working here - previously I was quite guarded. Coming out as a Christian is something that has taken a while.

May God bless the work being done at this school and fill these classrooms with an authentic taste of grace.

"Over the last year I've had the privilege to complete my teacher training at St Romero's. It's been an amazing year, re-joining the community I was a member back when the school was Chatsmore. As I have written at the end of each term this year, there has been so much to give thanks for, and this summer term has been no different. Key Stage 4



Science

Like many schools up and down the country, this has yet again been a very tough year for both teachers and students. This year as a department, we have been able to respond and adapt our teaching to ensure all students received the best education from our dedicated science team. I cannot thank them enough for the truly outstanding work they have done over the past 18 months.

Biology Challenge

For the third year running, Year 9 and Year 10 students have shown their enthusiasm for Science by entering an international Biology competition hosted by the Royal Society of Biology: The Biology Challenge.

This is an annual online competition in which students sit two 25 minute papers in exam conditions. This year has seen St Romero's students do even better than in previous years.

26,828 students, from 348 schools worldwide entered this year. Evelyn Starbuck (Y10) achieved a Gold Award with a score putting her in the top 5% of all entries. This is a fantastic achievement and is the first time that one of our students has achieved the highest category award.

We also had 6 Silver awards (top 14%): Y10 students: Will Hudson, Joseph Finch, Miller Cole, William Armitage, Lluc Ambrose and Y9 student Innis Jefferies.

Coming in the top 23% of entries, the following students achieved Bronze awards: Bella Saunders, Luke John, Peter McGuire, Theo Williams and Emma Day.

The aim of the biology Challenge is to stimulate curiosity for the natural world, and encourage students to take an interest in biology outside of school. We are continually looking to provide our students with opportunities to extend their learning and enthusiasm for sciences beyond the classroom, and we are delighted that so many students took up this challenge and performed so well. In addition to the Gold, Silver and Bronze awards, a further 17 students were highly commended, and 9 students commended.

Year 8 STEM


During the last term a small group of Year 8's have been looking into new and innovative ways into making the energy we consume in a more sustainable way. So far the boys have been investigating ways to transfer sound into electricity with the goal of coming up with a useable prototype in the future.





Design Technology

This term has seen the completion of Year 11 coursework. An independent project to design, plan and manufacture a solution to solve a given problem from an exam board brief. A different array of products can be found and a few are shown here. Furniture design was popular this year with lots of interesting designs developed, including a number of space saving options.





Lower down the school students have been working on a number of projects. These include spinning tops, puzzles, boats, traditional wooden games and jewellery. A real highlight of this term has been Year 7 homework. A number of students have been really adventurous in their choice of homework task by looking to model iconic products from the past in 3D. So far we have seen a Gameboy, watch and cassette tape – anyone remember those?

Two projects that have proved popular are the spinning tops and noughts and crosses game. Students had to carefully mark out and cut the spinning top before assembling. After a few trial runs and considering the best way to set up the top they were ready to test fully. Students had four attempts to see how long the spinning top would spin for. The current record stand at over 2 minutes with many spinning tops achieving over a minute.

Another popular game from the past was noughts and crosses. Students spent time carefully measuring and marking out the game before using a range of skills to manufacture the board and parts needed. After many checks and lots of sanding the games were finished. Great fun was had by students trying to beat each other with their recently completed game.





Food & Nutrition


Year 11 Final practical assessment

Each student has their own developmental profile and can set their own aims and record the outcomes. When students apply for Sixth form they are asked what 'Shape their in?' which can be answered by the evidence shown on this profile. https://pillarsofpossibility.web.app/

He is instrumental in the development of the Pillars and has worked with coding experts to ensure the student users have the very experience. We are privileged to be supported by such a talented young man.

The journey continues when the New Year 7 students arrive in September. Other Year groups who have now achieved Bronze level in all Pillars equivalent to 25% completion and will move to Silver level. Of course 'Anything is Possible!' and some of the students have reached 50% completion and have been named the POP MASTERS.

Willmott Dixon - An Eco Design Building Project

'I can tell you that I have learnt so much from this experience and I can't wait to see how creative and wonderful the projects are when the year 7s make the gingerbread houses. I also loved working with people that showed their amazing creativity and what they can do and it just showed me how people are different and that we all have things that we are better at'. - Keona Colebran (Student)

'This work experience was a fantastic opportunity for students to explore the world of marketing & communications. Teams had to come together to create enticing presentations as well as really thinking about

The idea was to offer a range of options to entice creative thinking and to allow the students to build skills for their future. Once they had chosen their project the Scrum teams appointed their Scrum Master who helped the team by ensuring everyone managed their role and completed their tasks. Over the two days the teams were able to contact their Product Owners who set the tasks to ask questions and get more information. Alongside this work KPMG ran an employability skills development workshop for a member of each team to take back and enhance their journeys.

'Normally students in this year group would be out on a physical work placement but many did not have the opportunity so we decided to set these projects up with the amazing support of our dedicated Partners. After meeting every Friday on a Zoom



through the weeks leading up to the event, the projects and ideas came together to replicate a real World scenario and the process of working in sometimes remote and agile teams. I think we all have to be creative and flexible through these times to ensure all the students get the very best of opportunities' - Phil Dean - Extended Learning Leader and Event Coordinator.

THE MDT PROJECT

Work Experience 2021 Written by Scrum Master- Regan Taylor-Reid

FIRSTLY, WHY THE MDT PROJECT?

At the beginning of our work experience we were given several different projects we could choose from; some harder than others. Instantly, we were drawn to the MDT Project because we saw it as a challenge (being the hardest project) and we thought it would be a good opportunity to find out how many people are actually involved with a single cancer patient. Therefore - as scrum master- I finalised the decision to do the MDT project. We thoroughly enjoyed doing this project and were grateful to have been given this work experience opportunity.

OVERVIEW OF THE PROJECT

During the two days we had to complete the project we ensured that we were liaising with our Project Manager-Charlotte Smyrk from Brighton Medical School. Throughout the project progress Charlotte supported us with suggestions and possible improvements that proved to be extremely helpful. At the beginning of the project we got in touch with Charlotte to let her know we had chosen her project, Charlotte was "glad to hear you chose the

MDT Project". As we worked hard on the presentation and research we continued to stay in contact with Charlotte. She gave us some really helpful suggestions which helped us to make our presentation even better.

ONE STEP FURTHER...

Once we finished our presentation we took things one step further and used data from America to work out how valuable the NHS is to cancer patients. As we know the NHS is free to us in the UK and shockingly the highest total amount we reached is \$226,950.

How Valuable is the NHS?

During Mrs Beaton's journey she received lots of care and treatment including chemotherapy and radiation. Without the support of our free healthcare system - NHS, it would be very expensive and she wouldn't be able to afford the treatment.

Surgery- \$20,000-\$100,000
