Dear Parents/Carers,

As we come to the end of the autumn term, I would like to thank everyone for their hard work and support. Having all of the students back in school and being able to come together as a community has been an absolute joy!

Let me start by congratulating last year's Year 11 students on their incredible achievements; for the fourth year in a row, our leavers broke all previous records achieving outstanding results in every subject. I would also like to thank our parents/carers and staff for their outstanding support and dedication in helping our leavers achieve such amazing outcomes.

It was wonderful to celebrate their achievements, as well as our current students' achievements, at our annual Prize Evening, which was held at the Pavilion Theatre in Worthing in November. We were delighted to welcome Dr. Julian Filowchowsi, a personal friend of St Oscar Romero, to be our guest speaker for the evening, who delivered an inspiring message about 'Aspiring to be more, rather than have more.' We also had the privilege of welcoming Sir Peter Bottomley MP, who presented prizes to our winners.

It has been an extremely busy term with learning moving on at a pace and a wide range of activities organised for students to develop their passions and interests, or simply try something new. There have been many clubs on offer including: Creative Writing, Cookery, STEM, Climbing, Debating, Art, Young Geographers, Gardening Club, Fingerprints, Duke of Edinburgh, Drama Club, Choir, Orchestra, not to mention the large number of sporting clubs and fixtures that run every week. Another highlight of the term was discovering that three of our students, Luke Bartram, William Clarke and Dominic Winton, had won a national science competition organised by the Institute of Acoustics. It was wonderful to attend their Awards Evening in Westminster Palace, where Sir Peter Bottomley met us and gave us a tour of parliament. My thanks to Mr Clarke who supported these students.

We have seen consistent sporting success in football, netball, basketball and rugby, with the U14 Rugby Team winning all of their matches including beating a leading private school. The Saints' Netball Academy continues to thrive and our girls are looking forward to when the area netball tournament begins. Huge congratulations to the Year 9 Football team, who won the Championship League Title, a first in the school's 60 year history!

During the summer break we were delighted to run our first ever summer school and welcomed over 150 of our new Year 7 students to Romero's for the first time. This included taster lessons in most subjects, opportunities to get to know their form tutor, and we even managed a trip to Goring Gap for an ice cream.

The summer was also spent building our outdoor amphitheatre and I am incredibly grateful to our site team, volunteer parents, students and staff, all of whom played their part to create an amazing outdoor learning space for our students. Other building work included the creation of a sixth science lab, various painting and decorating and school improvements.

Our Year 7 students have made an amazing start and are growing in confidence each day; it is clear they are a talented and hard working group of young people and have embraced the Romero ethos of giving their best at all times. As always, our Year 11 students have stepped up as the leaders of the school and are proving excellent role models for the younger students.

Teaching and Learning continues to be our core focus as a school and it has been wonderful to see the dedication and focus of our students, both in and out of lessons.

It seems quite extraordinary that this is only our second year as St Oscar Romero, but it is clear that we have found our true identity as 'Romero's, something that is reflected in the love and example we try to live out, each and every day. This has included: donating food items for families in need; raising money and awareness for the mental health charity, MIND, collecting over 1000 food items to support the work of the homeless charity, Turning Tides, who will be providing Christmas dinner and a safe place to sleep for homeless men and women in our local community, and supporting St Michael's SVP to build over 100 food hampers for families in need. Thank you to our parents and families who have supported these important causes.

Please can I draw your attention to the important information on school attendance in this newsletter. Our attendance has improved dramatically over the last four years, and for the first time ever, we ended last year by breaking our whole school target of 96%. This term has been more difficult and, although I appreciate there are times when absences are unavoidable, I would ask that you work with us to ensure that your child's attendance is at least 96%; anything below this will have an impact on their learning and likely GCSE outcomes.

As I have said many times, we are incredibly blessed at St Romero's for three main reasons: we have outstanding students; outstanding staff and outstanding parents/carers. Our staff have worked extremely hard this term and I have encouraged all of them to turn their emails off so that they can recharge their batteries and spend some quality time with their families. Finally, I would like to thank you for the high standard of uniform and appearance of the vast majority of students this term. However, we have seen a small minority of students pushing these boundaries, and arriving at school with inappropriate haircuts or clothing/shoes that break our uniform policy. Please can I ask for your full support in ensuring that this does not happen and that we do not have to start the spring term in a disrupted and negative manner by addressing these concerns. On behalf of the Governors, staff and students I would like to wish you and your families a very happy, peaceful and restful Christmas and a healthy, happy and prosperous New Year. **The new term begins on Wednesday, 5th January 2022**, when all students should return to school at 8.40am looking smart, refreshed and ready to pursue the opportunities and challenges of the new term and New Year.





Year 7 Art have started their unit 'Fantastic Birds and Beasts', the students have drawn a bird specimen from the Booth museum in Hove where they concentrated on; simplifying shapes, proportion and tonal variation. First hand drawing of a 3D object is much harder but it is really important for students to draw something real and not be working from a 2D image. The student drawing outcomes have been fantastic and the department is looking forward to displaying the most impressive drawings in our annual Art exhibition in mid-July.



Year 7 students also made large scale poppies for Remembrance day which they were able to take home.

Year 7 Textiles have been making their 'Textile Rock Pools' out of real fabric, for the DT rotation. The rock pools will come alive with; dyed starfish, embroidered anemone, stencilled sea creatures and embossed aluminium can fish with Ms Langley, the textiles specialist. Students have really enjoyed dying cotton and seeing real cotton plants and learning about the science behind the technique of dying natural fibres.



Year 7 Graphics have been constructing 3D carousel souvenirs for the Circus themed project using technical drawing, precision cutting and paper manipulation. Students have experimented with oil bar, oil pastel, printing ink and mixed media drawing.



Year 8 Art are working on their 'Day of the Dead' unit, looking at Mexican culture and other contextual influences like Day of the Dead festival make up, the Disney film 'Coco' and the artist Ben Brown. Students will be making 3D painted masks from their choice of inspiration.



Year 8 Textiles have been working on the 'Native Americans' unit looking at Native American culture including; totem poles, animal symbols, feathers and eagles. In class the students are making Native American wall hangings using the techniques; weaving, feather painting and making dream catchers, with Ms Langley.



Year 8 Graphics have been producing 'Point of Sale' display boxes, to advertise the tourism of India and presenting their research, experiments and designs in a Taj Mahal shaped concertina. Pupils have developed their skill and knowledge in colour theory, frottage, block printing and drawing.



Year 9 Art students are working on the unit German Expressionism and have just started working towards making their final monochrome one or two point perspective relief compositions. Students have learnt about 'Art Movements' and how some artists and art movements make art linked to world events and personal experience like the German Expressionists who made art to make sense of and express their feelings after World War one.




This year, year 9 have not already taken their GCSE's and have more time to try all the DT rotations therefore informing their GCSE option choice. Year 9 in Textiles are working on the unit 'Kimono' looking at ancient Japanese culture, cultural figures for example Geisha and Samurai. Student will be trying more complex textile techniques and using the new computerised sewing machines to produce a Japanese wall hanging.



Students in Year 9 Graphics have been designing and creating their individual search engine logos, and presenting these as 3D models. It has been exciting for students to use a range of techniques and media, such as painting, tetra pak etching with the new print press, lino printing, textiles and collage.



Year 10 Art students have finished their Still Life unit and their final pieces to great accomplishment. Students have now moved onto Portrait which is the second genre in art historically. Students have started historically looking at the portraits of Leonardo da Vinci and asking themselves 'What is the purpose of a portrait?



Year 10 Graphics have been learning how to use photography to represent messages on identity. They have been using Procreate on the departmental iPads to edit and change their own photographs. Having studied three different photographers, pupils will soon move onto developing and implementing their own ideas for their final pieces.



Year 11 Art are working on their mock exam individual project which they will work on until Easter as there is no art exam this year in line with the Department for Education and the exam board AQA. Students will therefore have more time to make coursework portfolio improvements to get the best grades. The work is fantastic and Ms Langley is extremely proud of the students.



In Year 11 Graphics, students have been creating individual and bespoke responses to their chosen mock exam questions. Students are using a range of media, techniques and working in various mediums including, illustration, photography, stop motion, design, signage and mixed media collage. They have been studying a plethora of artists, graphics designers and craftspeople to influence their ideas and outcomes.

The annual art exhibition and private view took place last summer term to great acclaimed, a gallery like experience was created to display the GCSE work of years 9-11 in art and graphics as well as the best of year 7 and 8 Art, textiles and graphics. The private view was attended by local artists, students, parents and carers

as well as the school governor's. All students in KS3 were given the opportunity to visit the exhibition and were in awe at the incredible work.



The art department put on two A level workshops for the year 11 leavers, Ms Langley offered 'life drawing with model' where the students looked at body proportions and draw large scale charcoal figures on the new easels. Miss Longman put on 'trompe l'oeil' Renaissance painting techniques where students did studies of various woods, marble and architecture with the new specialist equipment. The workshops were well received by our year 11 artists. The art department results now put St Oscar Romero's art department in the top 5% in the country.

The student of the term is Maisy Banks in year 11 Art, for her incredible dedication to her work and her determination to get the grade she wants.

Child Development

What a busy and exciting start to the new academic year. This term has flown by and our students in Child Development have been working very hard on portfolio work and exam content as well.

Year 10's have been working very hard indeed on the first of two portfolios they need to complete for their final qualification. The portfolio is all about essential equipment needed for a nursery for babies from 0-1 year and from children from 1-5 years of age. The students have worked independently and showed great maturity in their approach to their work.

Alongside this, we have managed to have fun revising the exam content too. Recently the students had been learning all about common childhood diseases, which culminated in a game of 'Childhood Illnesses Monopoly'. The students had so much fun trying to win the game but were also able to consolidate their knowledge at the same time. I think the prize of chocolate for the winners helped too!



In year 11 students have completed their first portfolio in readiness for final marking and moderation and have begun their 'child study' unit. They are looking forward to sharing their planned activities with their little ones and evaluating their success. They have worked hard to consider how children play under key headings of development such as; physical, intellectual and social. They have deepened their knowledge of types of play to inform their choices and taken part themselves in several activities such as puzzles, board games and role play to remind themselves of all the benefits from 'playing'. This initiated many classroom discussions such as the Finnish schools 'learning through play' until the age of 7!

We have focused our lessons mostly on examination recall and demonstrated our knowledge by consistently linking this to 'learning through play'. Students solidified their 'menstrual cycle' knowledge by making bracelets to ensure they know what is happening in the female cycle. Pictures of this success can be seen below. We were also very lucky to have Fiona Churchill visit us this half term who has 10 years' experience as a hospital midwife. The students were so engaged and able to consolidate their knowledge of the stages of labour, pain relief and methods of delivery as well as ask several questions and dispel many myths about childcare. Students have made several flashcards this year and enjoy Mrs Gray's 'fun relay races' for chocolate treats based on quick recall.



We are also delighted that we have been able to create our student work classroom board to support the learners.





Computing

Key Stage 4 Computing - Computer Science

Pupils continue to demonstrate an excellent attitude towards their learning and are continuing to develop their programming skills. Year 10 pupils have just finished the topic of Algorithms and they will be starting Boolean logic soon. Year 11 pupils have just finished their first set of mocks and we will start looking at each of the different topics for the exams in much more detail.

Creative iMedia - Year 11 pupils are continuing to work on their coursework units and preparing for the mandatory exam unit that they will be taken in January. They have learned the mini key topics for the exam and now they are practising their exam techniques in preparation for the assessment.

Key Stage 3 Computing

Year 7 - E-Safety Unit: Pupils have been learning how to keep themselves safe online. They have been taught how to create strong passwords and they understand the dangers of online grooming, cyberbullying, internet scams, oversharing of information and Internet Trolls.

Year 7 - Input, output and memory of computers: students are now looking at how computers work, including hardware and software, input and output devices, and memory. They will also look at how computers process information and instructions.

Year 8 - Website Creation: Pupils have been acquiring different skills to design their own website around the topic of Footprint. In the process, they have also learnt how to create different questionnaires using Google forms and how to analyse the data they gathered. They have been brilliant at creating their own logos and have demonstrated a good work ethic.

Year 9 - Boolean Logic: During this term, students looked at Boolean Logic and Processing. They constructed truth tables for logic gates, looked further into the fetch-decode-execute cycle, and explored how computers are able to translate high-level code (Python) into machine code (binary).

Cryptography: Students are now studying Cryptography - the art of ciphers and encryption in global communication. In it, they are going to be introduced to

some common ciphers (Caesar and Vignere) alongside looking at the wider impact of Cryptography, and whether it protects privacy, or allows people too much freedom without oversight.



E-Safety Tip: WhatsApp

WhatsApp is the world's most popular messaging service with around 2 billion users exchanging messages, photos, videos and documents.

The app offers end-to-end encryption, meaning messages can only be read by the sender and receiver

Advice for Parents and Carers: Leave a Group

If your child is part of a group chat that makes them feel uncomfortable, show them how to use the group's settings to leave. If someone exits a group, the admin can let them back in, once; if they leave a second time, it is permanent.

Report Potential Scams

Advise your child not to engage with any message that looks suspicious or too good to be true. When your child receives a message from an unknown number for the first time, they will be given the option to report that number as spam. They can also report a contact or group as spam by tapping on the contact or group name to open their profile and scrolling down to "report spam".

Create a Safe Profile

Set the profile settings to "my contacts' or 'nobody' to restrict who can see their photo and status.

Explain about Blocking

If your child receives spam or offensive messages, calls or files from a contact, they should block them.

Use Location Features Sparingly

If your child needs to use 'live location' to show you or their friends where they are, advise them to share their location only for as long as they need to.

Delete Accidental Messages

If your child has posted a message in the wrong chat or sent a message they immediately regret, they can delete it.

Fact-Check Messages

You can now fact-check messages that have been forwarded at least five times in WhatsApp by double tapping the magnifying glass icon to the right of the message. From there, your children can launch a Google search and decide for themselves whether the message was accurate or not. It's a good way to encourage young people to question things they see online. WhatsApp is

The Romero Dance Company

After each term I like to reflect on what has been happening in the Dance department and this term has been amazing as ever. September saw us finally being able to perform our amazing Dance Showcase to friends and families which included our new year 7s- all 35 of them!! They learnt and performed the choreography within two weeks of joining the school, created over a lunch time and their afterschool club time they performed with professionalism and maturity.

Following on from our triumphant show the dancers performed again on our beautiful new Amphitheatre at the Autumn Fair, showcasing the Romero Dance Company and the Year 7 dance club and some very talented soloists who compete around the country.

Within our dance curriculum students take ownership of key leadership rules – ensuring safe practice and leading warm ups. It is something we have worked on this term to enhance our confidence. Isla Parker gained a place at Laban conservatoire for the CAT scheme in London (Yr 8) we are very proud of her as she gained a place after a very successful audition process.

With this new emphasis on leadership Jack Elliott Dance leader (yr11) helped lead a creative task within our Company Masterclass at Open Evening. It was such a lovely inclusive session with an outside performance of 'Storm' by The Romero Dance Company on the Amphitheatre.



Showing great resilience through everything this term were our amazing GCSE Dance cohort who, with grit and Determination, performed their practical assessment part of their GCSE. With 2 set phrases and the Trios completed this leaves us with the theoretical exam in June and their own choreographies. This will be performed in our spring showcase highlighting just how fantastic they are as budding choreographers. Using our professional works within the dance GCSE the students created intimate duets using string to distort and displace classical ballet positions like choreographer Wayne McGregor ('INFRA'). They have also used influence from James Cousins and created duets in the Site-sensitive environment (outside) using Dance for Camera to accentuate key moments of contact and motif development. Concentrating on the themes and emotional connection behind the choreographic intent of 'Within Her Eyes.' This has direct correlation to the scheme of work taught in KS4 core PE where the Year 10's study 'Young Men' by Ivan Perez and perform their assessment outside using Perez's dance film as initial stimuli for duet work.





In line with the NHS Mental health and well-being week, the dancers and I (Miss Standing) performed in flash mobs all over the school to promote how being active and physical can look after and better your mental wellbeing. We had so much fun and created quite a crowd!



Rehearsals are well underway for Dance Live- a regional competition happening in Portsmouth. We are performing in the heats in February. Everyone is dedicated to rehearsals and concentrating on making a brilliant piece. Jack Elliott (Year 11) has been assisting with choreography for Dance Live.




Drama

Year 7 - What a fantastic start our wonderful year 7s have made in Drama. They have embarked on their story telling scheme of work focusing on the epic tale of 'Beowulf'. They have learnt about tableau, slow motion, sound effects and analysing text to incorporate suitable dialogue all whilst developing their team skills and evaluating their own and the work of others. They have improvised and built characters through skills such as 'role on the wall' and 'hot-seating'. They are thoroughly looking forward to learning about 'stage combat' and becoming characters such as Beowulf and Grendel. Well done to all our year 7s.



Year 8 - Drama in year 8 has started with a laugh as students have begun their comedy scheme of work, focusing on slapstick, status, clocking and the work of Laurel and Hardy. They have studied the history of comedy and learnt about Commedia Dell Arte and the stock characters whilst considering the importance of mask work in Drama. Students have all taken part in mask workshops and thoroughly enjoyed exaggerating gestures and body language to suit the character's facial expression. Students are really looking forward to making their own Commedia Dell Arte masks and performing in role as a stock character.





Year 9 - Year 9 have astounded us with their maturity and sensitivity as we have embarked upon two cross curricular play scripts supporting their PSHE learning at St Romero. Mark Wheller's plays; Too much Punch for Judy, and I Love you Mum I promise I won't die, have been at the heart of the learning as they have explored key issues and tackled deep discussions raising awareness of drugs or drink driving. Students have studied both texts practically and theoretically and enjoyed directing their peers and learning new theatrical techniques inspired by the work of 'Frantic Assembly'; an innovative movement based company bringing all plays into the 21st century.



Year 10 - Year 10 have begun their set text for the AQA GCSE exam this term and thoroughly enjoyed unravelling the context of Blood Brothers as well as the social, historical and cultural context of this superb piece of musical theatre. They have undertaken key revision technique and prepared fully for the layout and demands of the drama written paper which also includes design elements such as; set, costume, lighting and sound effects. They had the most wonderful experience of some much awaited live theatre earlier in the term with 'The long Song' in Chichester, not only as audience members but on stage too!

Year 11 - Having completed their first exam in July, students have been busy analysing and evaluating their devising performances and designs in the form of theoretical study which also counts towards the final grade. Students were delighted to be back on practical exam work very recently and have all chosen their script excerpts in readiness for the February 2022 final practical exam. Plays such as; The Early Bird, The lying Kind and 4:48 Psychosis have been chosen to showcase our students talents and exceptional abilities and we can't wait to see the outcomes.



Year 11 were also the first to get back to live theatre this year and watched 'Blood Brothers' in Southampton as an amazing way to recall characterisation for the GCSE written mock paper.



They have been working hard this term to prepare for their mock exams and we have focused on fun revision techniques to support them.

School Production, Dance Live and Theatre trips

The school production, 'Bugsy Malone', is well underway with rehearsals taking place every Tuesday after school. Students are thoroughly enjoying working through the music and blocking the scenes. After Christmas we will begin to recruit a production team to support with lighting, set, costumes and make up.

We are also very busy choreographing our piece for 'Dance Live' 2022. Students are busy dancing, creating drama, building puppets and working through the technical elements for the LED screen. It will be full speed ahead in January to prepare for the performance in February.

Two wonderful drama pieces of drama were performed in our new amphitheatre and the students, as always did us proud. Two year 10 students performed a duologue from last year's school production of 'Blue Remembered Hills' at our Summer Fair and a small group of year 11 students performed their exam piece on open evening.



It has been a delight this term to re-visit the theatre and many of our students have had some wonderful opportunities to see some fantastic performances. Year 10 including 'The Long Song' in Chichester, in which they took part in a workshop on stage with the actors. Finally a selection of our year 9 students watched 'Chicago' at Christ's hospital school in Horsham.



What's to come?

In January we take a group of year 9 students to see 'Curious Incident of the Dog' in the night-time and we are thoroughly looking forward to arranging trips for both year 7 and 8 next year. More information about tickets for 'Bugsy Malone' will be communicated in the New Year.





Enterprise

It has been a very busy start to the year in the Enterprise Department. Most importantly, the decision was made to change the course from BTEC Tech Award in Enterprise to OCR Cambridge National in Enterprise and Marketing Level 1/2. The courses are very similar in terms of content but we felt that the OCR course is more flexible in terms of the coursework element, whereas the BTEC course was a little more rigid. The OCR Cambridge National in Enterprise and Marketing gives students the practical skills and applied knowledge they will need in business. Practical elements build on theoretical knowledge so that students can put their learning into practice while also developing valuable transferable skills. There are three mandatory units

Unit R064: Enterprise and marketing concepts

Students explore the techniques businesses use to understand their market and develop products, investigate what makes a product viable and understand how businesses attract and retain customers.

Unit R065: Design a business proposal

Students are presented with a business challenge from which they create a researched and costed business proposal. They will carry out market research, present data, and use idea generation tools, seek and act on feedback, and cost their proposals. In their work on this unit they will develop their self-assessment, collaborative working, creativity, numeracy, research and evaluative skills.

Unit R066: Market and pitch a business proposal

Students prepare for and pitch the business proposal that they developed in the previous unit. They develop a brand identity and investigate how best to promote their product and then plan, practise and finally deliver their pitch. Afterwards they review both their performance and their business proposal. This will help develop their analysis and self-evaluative skills as well as those relating to self-presentation.

Last year's learning will certainly not have been lost as all previous taught content will form the basis of students' assessment which took place on 1st December.

Geography

Year 7 - Students have been developing and utilising all of their map skills to investigate their local area through using an OS Map. They were excited to add their spots to the amazing local area map we have near Lucy's garden. They were able to identify where they live and start to think about spatial patterns relating to where our students come from and the sphere of influence our school has in the local area.

Year 8 - The focus this term has been on developing literacy and statistical skills through studying population. Students have been investigating world population growth. Key topics covered have been the changing UK population structure and how this relates to the Demographic Transition Model. We have started to introduce population data and statistics leading onto data analysis and interpretation. Other interesting topics we have covered is the Chinese one child policy, students developed short essay writing skills "to what extent has the policy been successful" With the focus on justification and writing a well-balanced answer looking at different perspectives.

Year 9

We have started year 9 with a transition in preparation for GCSE. Our first topic of study is ecosystems and in particular focusing on cold environments. Key areas of focus have been on studying the characteristics and climate of polar and tundra environments. Students are developing their understanding and skills in a cold environment context in order to build on this procedural knowledge at a later date when we study hot deserts at GCSE in year 10.

Year 10

The focus for this autumn term has been on managing resources, with particular focus on food, energy and water. This ties in with a lot of recent local and global events such as Brexit and the impact on food resources in the UK and the recent energy crisis in the UK, where the price of energy has sky rocketed. This has allowed us to give our students a real world focus when discussing key themes and topics and investigate the cause and impacts and looking more specifically at management strategies to manage local and global resources.

Year 11

"Is Brighton thriving" was our human fieldwork question of investigation. Students worked in small groups collecting primary data through land use mapping, retail diversity calculations and questionnaires and surveys.



We focused on three main areas in Brighton, this allowed us to make a comparison with other shopping centers in the UK, whilst also looking at historical data from Brighton. It was great to see so many students engaged in their learning and developing their conceptual understanding in a real life context.



Students had the opportunity to ask questions to local businesses in the three different areas of Brighton in order to investigate the impact of the pandemic on their business and the future business prospects. This understanding gained of fieldwork skills will be integral to their success when tackling paper 3.



History

Year 7

Year 7 have taken a rapid journey through history, from Roman times to Medieval England. Students have been highly engaged with William's of Normandy's conquest of England, and this has come across in a vast array of vibrant classwork and




exceptional engagement with the assessment on why William won the Battle of Hastings. We've just started our journey onto the Crusades and will be moving onto King John and the Magna Carta, the Black Death and the Peasants' Revolt, towards the end of term. The engagement of isolating students has been exceptional, which really displays their dedication to the subject.

Year 8

Year 8 students began the term full of excitement and this reflected in the thought-provoking discussions throughout the history classrooms. They have looked at challenging established historical norms, considering the legacy of the British Empire, the Industrial Revolution, and the sensationalising of the Jack the Ripper victims.

Year 8 students managed to impress us with their receptivity to the topics, but also in their retention of information and historical skills. Some students are already considering taking history for GCSE, and their evident historical skills were evident in their first assessment on the British Empire.



Year 9

This has been an interesting year for the current year 9 students. With the move to a two-year GCSE, students have been given more time to engage with topics outside of the GCSE history curriculum, while still building on essential skills that will aide them should they take the subject for GCSE. The year began with a look at parallel histories, focusing specifically on the conflict between Israel and Palestine. This attempt to diversify the history curriculum was met with thought-provoking responses and some extremely sophisticated debates. Students are currently enjoying the crime and punishment unit, if their excited responses have been anything to go by.

Year 10

This is the first time we have run the 'Power and the People' GCSE course, which Year 10 have been studying since their return in September. This thematic study looks at challenges to authority over time, which seems to have resonated with many students. We began in the Middle Ages, looking at the Magna Carta and the Peasants' Revolt, and have journeyed through the English Civil War and Henry VIII's religious policies. We have just started on challenges to authority in the 1800s, beginning with the Great Reform Act. Students have shown no slacking in their commitment to the GCSE subject.

Year 11

Year 11 have had a tumultuous time, completing much of their GCSEs during lockdown, but their engagement and tenacity has been noted. Particularly in those students that have regularly attended intervention programmes aimed at supporting them to fully access their history GCSEs with all the skills needed. We have been recapping 'Medicine through Time' in preparation for students' mock exams, which they sat recently. We hope that their hard work and dedication pays off in their results



Mathematics

Lessons & Curriculum

Our students have had a very busy time in their maths lessons this Autumn, having covered a wide variety of mathematical topics in their first term. They have worked very hard.

Year 7

Our newest cohort began their term looking at working with data. This was an opportunity for them to put their maths skills to use in other subjects, using their knowledge of graphs and tables. They have since studied units on place value and geometry.



Year 8

Year 8 have studied two fundamental areas of mathematics this term, beginning with number properties and then moving on to the geometry of 2D and 3D shapes.

Year 9

Topics covered by Year 9 this term include Arithmetic, Algebraic Manipulation, and their latest unit, Coordinates and Graphs.

Year 10

Students in the Higher GCSE stream have studied a fundamental part of the Maths GCSE curriculum, learning different methods of solving quadratic equations, before beginning units on circle geometry. Students in the Foundation stream have studied ratio and proportion, another key part of the Maths curriculum, before going onto units on perimeter, area and volume.

Year 11

Our year 11 students have been tackling some of the most challenging topics on the GCSE curriculum, including solving equations, functions and advanced trigonometry. They have also been working hard in their

period 7 maths lessons on a Wednesday, with two classes working towards an additional GCSE in Further Maths.

All years are about to complete their first round of assessments – our hats go off to them for their hard work and dedication.

Hegarty Maths

Our students continue to use Hegarty maths to complete their homework, and for revision. In total, they have completed a massive **4619** hours of learning this term! The school currently sit in the top **5%** for hours spent learning, and **8%** for questions answered, on average per student.

Our year 7 & 8 students will be getting the chance to see first-hand what might be to come for the future of maths here at school. Over the next few weeks, the maths team will be working hard to get students logged on and navigated around the site, so that they can 'have a go' and get to grips with expectations over the break for Christmas.

Up Next...

After Christmas, students will take part in Maths week, which brings with it a multitude of opportunities; enriching activities, trips and visits, challenges and competitions. As part of this week, some year 9 and 10 classes have been entered into the UKMT Intermediate Challenge to compete against some of the sharpest minds in the nation.

We are also working hard as a department to give our primary feeder schools a taste of the expertise we have in the Maths department at St Romero. Mr Sloggett will be working very closely with some students over at English Martyrs, and Ms Roskams will be offering some drop in sessions to deliver some enriching activities to local primary schools.

We start this PE Newsletter with a section from an article written by the journalist Fiona Evans. Published on the Burnley Express website on the 12th November 2021, it sets the scene for why Physical Education, Physical Activity and School Sport are so important for our children:

Back in the early noughties Nelson Mandela delivered a speech – the words which would outlive their father.



"Sport has the power to change the world," he told the inaugural Laureus World Sports Awards.

"It has the power to inspire. It has the power to unite people in a way that little else does. It speaks to youth in a language they understand. Sport can create hope where once there was only despair. It is more powerful than governments in breaking down racial barriers. It laughs in the face of all types of discrimination."

More than two decades and a pandemic later, Mandela's message is no less relevant, especially to the legions of young people whose lives were railroaded by lockdowns. Arguably, there has never been a greater need and opportunity to place physical activity and well-being at the heart of education – for the benefit of the individual as well as the common good.

Yet children risk becoming increasingly disengaged from physical activity over the next decade unless more is done to champion the value of PE and school sport according to a recent report published by the Youth Sport Trust.

PE and school sport is at the heart of all we do at St Romero's. We hope you enjoy reading this section of the school newsletter, which will give you a flavour of the amazing things that have been happening during this first term.

Autumn PE Curriculum, Extra-Curricular and House Activities

Our first term has included a diverse range of activities and provided students with a broad and balanced PE

curriculum. Baseline assessments (Year 7 only), dance, football, fitness, leadership, netball, badminton and basketball have been delivered in lessons with high levels of engagement and progress.

PE house competitions have thus far included cross-country and table tennis. Whilst table tennis was an optional after school competition, almost all students from Year 7 to 10 took part in the cross-country and contributed points towards the house cup!

Extra-curricular provision and engagement has sharply increased following the relaxation of COVID restrictions. At the time of writing this PE newsletter, over 40 different clubs have been on offer since we returned in September. The first few KS3 boys' football training sessions was seeing almost 100 students in attendance, whilst over 40 girls have been consistently attending Year 7 netball and dance clubs!

The first half term focused on football, rugby and netball (in line with district fixtures). As we move towards Christmas, the focus has now shifted towards basketball.

Please check the PE club timetable for changes at the start of every new half-term. Everyone is welcome and encouraged to attend. All you need is a positive attitude and full Romero PE kit (appropriate for the activity).











Football - The Year 7 boy's football team have made a great start to life in secondary competition. Despite defeat in their opening game against Angmering, the team improved quickly as the league progressed. On their way to a very respectable third place finish, the team beat strong opposition in the form of Durrington and Worthing High.

The Year 7's entered into the National Cup and enjoyed impressive victories against Hove Park and Shoreham Academy. Unfortunately, we were eventually eliminated by a strong Warden Park team in what was a closely fought third round contest. Star performers of the season included Kian O'Reilly, Harvey Reid, Jack Banfield, Bradley Tshingoma, Finn Dzekawong and Hayden Hickey.



The Year 8 boy's football team put in a number of strong performances throughout the season without getting the result they wanted, or at times deserved. The season highlight was a fantastic win against TLA. Star performers include James Mugadza, Elliott Birchall, Luke Awde and Jack Beverton.



The Year 9 boy's football team had a fantastic season! After five league matches they finished top of the league, undefeated on 13 points with a goal difference of +13! Wins against Bohunt, TLA and Steyning secured our place in the finals where we faced St Andrews at Steyning Town Community FC.

The final was an epic encounter, with both sides regularly taking and losing the lead. With just three minutes left to play, Destiny scored the winner (his third of the game) and we were just about able to hold on for a dramatic 5-4 win! The boys have grown so much as a team during the season, and we could not be prouder of what they have achieved. Exciting times are certainly ahead, and we already planning for next season!

Stand out performers throughout the season were Deion Williams, Beau Cole, Destiny Omokaro, Henry Chandler, Jack Cox and Issac Smith.



Players on the fringes of the Year 9 first team squad took part in a tournament at St Andrews. We had enough players to create two teams, both of whom put in a series of brilliant performances. Both teams remained undefeated and should be incredibly proud of how they played and the attitude they showed.





The under-14 girl's football season was full of success stories. A dramatic season opening victory against Davison came after a VERY late Hattie Knight goal. A comprehensive 3-1 victory against TLA followed, with goals coming from Milly Grim, Charlotte Kay and Chloe Read. The girls have one more match (against Angmering) to determine if they will make it into the finals – we wish them all the best!



The under-15 girl's football team won their first national cup fixture, beating Hove Park 4-3! After conceding a very early goal, the team fought back to win an epic battle! She was also part of the Sussex water polo team who won gold the annual London/South-east region Under 16 (mixed) tournament on Sunday 14th November at Whitgift school in South Croydon. Becky actually scored the first goal in the final! Becky has also represented the South East team (as vice-

captain) at the inter-regional championships in Walsall, where she will be playing against teams from across the country.





Sammy Smith (brother of Becky) has also been in exceptional form in the pool. Sammy is a regional level swimmer and regional level water polo player. He is on both Regional talent pathways, which include extra training sessions both in the pool and online. At the recent swimming County Championships Sammy qualified for every event! He won three medals including gold in the 400IM. The 400IM is one of the hardest events in swimming, and requires the competitor to swim sixteen continuous lengths (i.e. four lengths butterfly, backstroke, breaststroke and front crawl) without stopping as fast as they can. Sammy also won silver in the 200 Butterfly and bronze in the 200IM.

In water polo, Sammy represented Sussex in the intercounty championships where the team won a silver medal. Next month Sammy is playing in the Worthing u15 team at the National Age Group champs in Sheffield. He is the only 12 year old who has been chosen as part of the team. Well done Sammy – we are incredibly proud of you!

This term the RE department welcomed Mrs Taylor and Mr Verkade to the school and to the RE team, as well as Miss Saksena and Mr Noye who have both joined the teaching team in RE.

KS3 - This term Year 7 units have been 'Foundations of Christianity' and a unit mapping out the Old Testament. Year 8 have looked at the roots of Judaism and at Jesus of Nazareth. Year 9 have looked at the ancient roots of

Christianity and at different approached to ethical decision making.

Year 8 - In year 8, our first unit this year focused on Judaism. For the first seven weeks of the school year, we learned all about the history of the Jewish people, and the modern day practices of this religion. At the end of this unit, year 8 students were given a very special piece of homework; over the course of two weeks, students researched either the historic tabernacle and temple, or modern-day synagogues. They then had to use the information they gathered to build a model of one of these three Jewish places of worship, complete with an interior, displaying all the key aspects of Jewish worship. Our year 8 students went above and beyond with this task, and showed off not only a solid understanding of the Jewish faith, but also their amazing creativity. Using a variety of materials in their work, from Lego bricks to cardboard, and from Styrofoam to real sand and tentcloth, they built some absolutely stunning projects!



To mark the Hindu festival of Diwali the RE department ran a competition for tutor groups to design a Diwali display, including colour and light, centred on the theme of 'Good triumphing over evil'. Below are some of our wonderful entries from Mr Price, Miss Standing and Mr Challinor.







Year 11 - It has been a busy term for year 11. They have embarked on their study of Islamic Beliefs and Practices which has included a detailed look at The Six Beliefs of Sunni Islam and The Five Roots of Usul al din. This has enabled them to be able to compare and contrast the beliefs and practices of the main Muslim groups. They are currently learning the Five Pillars and I am confident that they will be able to tell you what the Five Pillars are in both English and Arabic if you ask them!

They have worked hard in preparation for their mock exams and are now looking forward to a visit to the Worthing Masjid to further their understanding of Islam. This will give them the opportunity to deepen their learning through seeing the Muslim place of worship and by asking questions to the Imam. As we near the end of the term we are not slowing down, but are preparing to deliver RE intervention sessions to a small number of pupils across the year group to boost their knowledge and skills.




Thank you to all of our grandparents, godparents, and special people in our lives who play such a vital and immeasurable role in the lives of our young people.

Open evening









Design Technology

Lower down the school, students have been working on a number of projects. These include LED mood lights, puzzles, mobile phone stands and jewellery. A real highlight of the term has been the LED mood light. This involved students designing, planning and making the light from scratch. The pictures below show two working lights. As you can see the mood light cycles through a number of different soothing colours.





Two more projects that proved a hit were the door wedge and jewellery. The door wedge required carefully research and planning to produce a product that was safe and functional. Many of the parts were very intricate and small and required real skill and accuracy to complete.

The students in Year 9 going into Year 10 are just completing their Bronze level and the Year 11's that left in June 2021 have completed their Silver level. This year a Parent; Dave Mctighe joined the staff team as an expedition volunteer and found out first-hand what remote supervision involved!

Each team completes a series of expedition training culminating in an assessment on the South Downs (Bronze) and The New Forest (Silver). 'It's quite an achievement in itself without Covid restrictions so to see


