
HEAD OF PRIMARY: MR MILLS

Class have loved
exploring the
text 'The Fish
Who Could Wish'

by John Bush. We have worked really hard writing letters to ask a magical genie for three wishes using persuasive language. We have loved learning how to use persuasive language by trying our best to persuade our teachers to give us extra playtime and let us eat sweets for lunch (this was easier said than done!) In Maths this term, we have worked on learning how to solve subtraction independently. We have really enjoyed using different resources to help us, such as the magnetic answer boards, cubes and wiggly worms. We also used dice to help us create our own number sentences! Our theme in History this term was Ancient Egypt, which we all loved learning about in lots of fun ways such as exploring sand, turning each other into mummies, creating Ancient Egyptian headwear and writing our names in hieroglyphics. We have also loved exploring Italian cuisine in Cultural Studies. Our favourite lesson was making traditional Neapolitan Pizza to share with a friend. It was delicious!

HOME LEARNING

Next term we will continue engaging with the theme 'Materials' and exploring the text 'Boogie Bear' by David Walliams. We will use the story to develop our recount and writing skills through combining role-play and writing recounts of personal experiences. This term in Maths, we will be focusing on money, with the last two

weeks of term exploring weight and volume. It would be great if you could start engaging with the concept of money ready for next term. There are lots of songs you can listen to introduce this concept such as, 'The Money Song' and 'The Coins Song'. Perhaps you could have a look at some of the prices of your favourite items in the supermarket, or even have a go at paying for something and counting the change in your local shop. If it's a rainy day and you can't get to the shops, maybe you could spend some time looking at coins and notes at home and use the coins to make prints in playdough or trace over the coins using paper and crayons to see their value. Next term we'll be doing Geography, in which we will explore the European country of France and its capital city Paris. We will do this in lots of fun and engaging ways, but to get us thinking about Paris perhaps you could look at some pictures of the Eiffel Tower if you have access to an ipad or computer, or even have a croissant or crepe for breakfast to start thinking about the Parisian Culture!

We hope you have a wonderful break and look forward to more fun and learning next term!

CLASS NEWS

City class has had a great start to 2023! We have started our new term of

'materials', exploring and learning about a lot of new concepts whilst also revisiting some previously learnt. This half term we also embarked on our first class trip! Linked to both our literacy and performing arts lessons, pupils visited 'Little Angel Theatre' to see 'We're going on a Bear Hunt. As a team, we are all so proud of how City class settled back into their routines after the Christmas break, continuing with their fantastic engagement and enthusiasm.

In English this half term, we have been focusing on both 'We're going on a bear hunt' and 'Walking through the jungle'. We have focused on the sensory side of these stories, aiming to make them as engaging and motivating as possible for our learners. Pupils have developed their communication skills, requesting which parts of the story they would like to be read again. We have been developing our understanding of 'more' and how we can use this to achieve something we would like to experience again. Pupils have been fantastic learners and engaged so well in both of their stories, with the 'snow' aspect of both stories being a clear winner for most requests. This half term, pupils began a weekly OT led handwriting group to develop their fine motor skills using a range of activities. Pupils have adapted well to their change of schedule and love to get involved with the range of activities presented to them. We have also been exploring different mark making tools and use these to trace and imitate different pre-writing and letter shapes.

In maths, City class has been developing their understanding of 'take away'. We have been engaging in exciting activities and experiments, to practise counting down from 5 for the 'pop', 'bang' or 'whizz'. In geometry, pupils have learnt to identify and match a range of 2D shapes.

We have been learning to sort 'real life' 2D shapes and began learning about 3D shapes also.

During our themed learning, we have explored a range of different concepts including cause and effect of digital devices in computing, Sikhism in Religious Education and Italian cuisine and culture in Cultural studies. In history, pupils loved learning about Ancient Egypt, trying foods that the Egyptians would have had and even making their own sarcophagus and mummies. In science, we have been learning ourselves, our bodies and our senses. We loved exploring our senses with different sensory trays aimed at each sense. City class also learnt about their body parts and facial features.

HOMF I FARNING

Next term we'll continue with our theme of 'materials'. We will continue to explore a range of different sensory stories and develop our ability to reorder and retell these using different props and symbols. In maths, we will begin our half term learning about money, before moving onto measuring weight and volume. In science we will learn about light, sound and electricity. In Geography we are exploring different European countries and their capital cities.

Maths: Pupils could listen to this <u>2D shape</u> <u>song</u>. They could also play this <u>shape</u> <u>game</u> to recap their learning from this half term. In preparation for the next half term, pupils could listen to <u>this money</u> <u>song</u> or play <u>this game</u>.

English: Children could listen 'We're going on a bear hunt' or 'Walking through the

<u>jungle'</u> to recap their learning. Some of the sensory elements could be recreated at home, using foam or flour for snow, dry pasta for sticks in 'we're going on a bear hunt' or spraying water for any aquatic elements in both stories.

Theme: In science next half term, we are learning about light, sound and electricity. Pupils could listen to this song about light sources. They could also test their listening skills with this game about sounds. In cultural studies, we will begin learning about Polish cuisine and culture. Pupils could listen to this familiar counting song in Polish or try a Polish recipe found here.



CLASS NEWS

We have had a very busy and productive half term in Elizabeth

class. The pupils tried a lot of new activities and they showed a lot of acceptance, especially when it came to changes in their daily routine.

Our theme this term has been 'Materials'. In English, the pupils started looking at different books and they focused on sequencing the events of a story. The pupils continued practising their reading skills through phonics and guided reading sessions, and their writing skills through various sensory and paper based activities. In Maths, we focused on numbers and shapes. Elizabeth class learners used their skills to take away amounts using different methods, and they started reading and writing simple number sentences. Also, they explored 2D shapes and properties of 2D shapes

through various class based and outdoor activities.

In Science, the pupils explored Animals including humans, evolution and inheritance. They looked at how animals can be grouped in classes and what physical features they might have. In Art, Elizabeth class explored the art work of Chris Haughton, and they manipulated different materials to make a collage. In History, we explored practices and beliefs in Ancient Egypt times, such as pyramids, pharaohs, mummification and the use of makeup. In RE, we explored the school's SEARCH value of Acceptance and ways to accept changes, and we looked at Sikhism and Sikh celebrations. In ICT, the pupils continued to explore different devices and were introduced to algorithms. In Cultural studies, we travelled to Italy speaking, ate local snacks and listened to and danced to Italian music. Finally, in PSHE, we learnt about emotions, relationships, staying safe at school, and we continued following our hygiene routines. In Performing Arts, the pupils had a very successful trip to Little Angel Theatre to see We're going on a bear hunt.

Next half term we will continue to learn about materials. In English we will continue to work on reading and writing, and we will explore the stories of Neon Leon by Jane Clarke, and Boogie Bear by David Walliams. In Maths, we will focus on money, and measuring weight and volume. In Science we will explore Light, Sound and Electricity.

HOME LEARNING

This half term the Theme has been 'Materials'. In

English lessons, Victoria Class have been exploring the book 'We are going on a Bear Hunt'. Pupils have been learning to act out the story using props and answer comprehension questions using colourful semantics. Pupils have been sequencing the story and making requests using PEC'S. Victoria Class pupils have been working hard to continue to build on their fine motor skills and pencil control.

In Maths lessons, we have been learning to match quantity to numeral. We have been learning to distinguish between the different numerals and make the correct quantity. Some pupils have also been learning how to accurately count up to 15 and find the correct numeral. In addition, we have been learning about 2D shapes. Pupils have been learning to distinguish between different shapes, match and sort them.

In Science lessons, we have been building on our previous knowledge and learning more in depth about our body. We have been learning about the different parts of our face and body. We have also been building on our knowledge of animals and animal movements.

In PHSE lessons, we have been learning about self awareness and playing together with our peers. Pupils have been learning how to wait for their turn, play and share with their peers within structured lessons. We have also been learning what qualities we need to have in order to be a good friend and how to successfully interact with our adults and peers.

HOME LEARNING

Next Half Term we will continue with the theme 'Materials'. We will be exploring the story

'Walking through the Jungle' by Julie Lacome. In Maths we will be learning about Money as well as weight. In English, we will continue to learn how to answer simple comprehensive questions and continue working on our fine motor and gross motor skills in order to improve our handwriting.

Here are some activities that you can do at home with the pupils.

- 1. Listen to the story here.
- 2. Play a money game with support here.
- 3. Tracing here.

This half term has seen a lot of changes. Our horse riding and swimming

sessions have unfortunately come to an end now, but this has opened up the opportunity to introduce a second science session each week. This gives us more time to focus on experiments and engagement to encourage curiosity. We also now have time for a mid-week 'check-in' where pupils are encouraged to reflect on their progress through the week and take part in a debate topic. The aim of these sessions is to promote mature interaction, and the idea that the Waterloo pupils are role models to the other pupils in the school. So far they have been very successful, and will definitely continue after the break. There have been other changes: This half term we welcomed some new LSAs to our class, who have quickly become well established and already built strong working relationships with the class. We have also welcomed a new pupil to Waterloo. It has been a busy time, but Waterloo class have adapted well to these changes and continue to make good progress from a secure base.

In English our class text this half term was *The True Story of the Three Little Pigs* by Jon Scieszka. When reading the text the emphasis in lessons has been point of view, with the end goal being to write a story from a different perspective. Our class text has given us an accessible way of entering into this potentially tricky area and has allowed the pupils to make good progress. One area in particular that has

been very strong this half term has been reading aloud. Every pupil in the class has done excellent work with their reading, and I have been very impressed by the confidence and understanding that they have shown. We have also focused on punctuating direct speech by using kinesthetic activities to help develop written tasks, which has been both successful and enjoyable. After the break we will continue to develop these areas, but our class text will be *The Dragon Sitter* by Josh Lacey.

In maths our focus has been addition and subtraction (with an emphasis subtraction) as well as 2D and 3D shapes. With number, as well as developing core skills, we have spent time looking at worded questions, and how to use our English skills in maths. This has been effective so far, and we will continue to develop this going forward. geometry, we have spent time using rulers to measure and draw accurate lines and shapes. We have also worked with 2D nets and plasticine to make our own 3D shapes. Although there has been some good progress here we will continue to focus on these practical aspects of maths after the break.

In science we have been looking at animals (including humans) evolution and inheritance. This built on our work on habitats last term, but with more of a focus on how what we learn in class relates to us as humans. As I mentioned earlier, because we are no longer horse riding or swimming, there has been time for additional science sessions to boost pupils' engagement with the subject and promote 'thinking like a scientist'. This half term Waterloo ran an experiment to monitor the effect of different exercises

on their heart rate. It was great to see them approach this task so responsibly, and then apply what they learned in later lessons.

A particular highlight of the half-term has been our ICT lessons where the pupils have learned about sequencing, problem solving and the fundamentals programming by working with Bee-Bots. It has been lovely to see everyone so engaged and taking charge of their own learning in such a practical way. It has also been great to see them so enthused about their cultural studies. They regularly use a set of key Italian words and have explored Italian food as part of their food technology lessons. Waterloo pupils have spent time exploring technique in their art sessions, which has resulted in some excellent pieces of work being created. As well as developing fine motor skills, they have had regular opportunities to express themselves creatively. Additionally, the class has been exploring Ancient Egypt in sessions with Ms. Huseyin and learning about Sikhism and the school value of acceptance in religious education.

As always, I have really enjoyed teaching Waterloo class this term. A lot has happened in a short period of time, but the pupils have dealt with this well and are making good progress. More than anything, I have been impressed with the friendly and encouraging atmosphere of the class. The pupils regularly go out of their way to encourage and support their peers, which is lovely to see. I look forward to resuming our lessons after the break.

HOME LEARNING

In English, pupils should complete some of the activities that you can find HERE to consolidate their work on writing direct speech. This half-term the pupils have been focusing on this in their punctuation lessons, so they should have a good foundation. However, as always, practice will be very helpful to fully embed these skills.

In maths, it would be great if pupils spent some time continuing their work on shapes. There are activities for 2D shapes HERE, and ones for 3D shapes HERE. It would also be good if pupils continued to top up their addition and subtraction skills by attempting some of the games available HERE.

In Science, after the break we will be looking at light, sound and electricity. To prepare for this pupils should try some of the activities available **HERE** and **HERE**.

Finally, for ICT, if you have access to a device that can run apps from the Apple Store then there is a free educational Bee-Bot app that you can find HERE that could be used to consolidate our recent ICT lessons. If you ask them to show you what they can do they may well impress you!

PE News with Mr Proctor

Primary classes have enjoyed a mixture of indoor and outdoor PE activities consisting of dance, table tennis, boccia and obstacle courses. Primary pupils are developing their teamwork skills by understanding the importance of positive communication, taking turns and sharing.

Four pupils from Elizabeth class have been attending horse riding lessons at Chigwell Riding Centre and pupils are showing a caring attitude towards the horses. pupils are now confidently attending these sessions and it is a highlight of their week.

Rugby Works continues to work with classes across the school every Thursday developing their teamwork and communication skills. A large number of pupils from Post 16 and Secondary East now support Rugby Works sessions every Thursday and they will be working towards completing their Sports Leaders Qualification during the summer term.
