In Key Stage Three our overall theme is "What's the matter?" We have also been exploring the Search value of resilience in our lessons. In Key Stage Four, Jubilee class have continued to make progress towards their AQA awards and have recently started a new module around Forest School which involves off site visits to local forests.

This term Piccadilly and Bakerloo class have continued to enjoy going to Rugby Works sessions and Northern, Jubilee and Piccadilly have continued to enjoy dance lessons through Step into Dance. All classes in Secondary West continued to engage with forest school sessions and look forward to their weekly sessions.

#### Maths:

With our continuous theme around *'number'* pupils began the

*Spring* term learning about coins and identifying each one.

Pupils showed confidence with this and are able to know coin values ranging from 1p-£2, and for some, ranging up to £20. Pupils took their knowledge out into the community and experienced making an exchange with a shopkeeper. Pupils read the price in the shop and with adult support would generate the required amount to give over the counter.

It is always great to take skills learnt within the 4 walls of the classroom into a real life, practical environment.

#### English:

Bakerloo pupils have adjusted well to their twice weekly, structured guiding reading. The adapted groups allow some to have a phonics input to support their blending and reading whilst others to develop more control over their reading, assist with decoding the text and answer comprehensively.

Pupils continued with their reading of a pre 19th century text and started learning about the story of *Alice In Wonderland*. Pupils responded to questions about what they have read, wrote two or three part sentences (Alice-is-eating-cake) as well as writing and creating their own potions.

As part of **independence and life skills**, the Food Technology room is accessed weekly in order to follow recipes. This term we have closely followed recipes linked with Polish culture and have followed step-by-step instructions to cook dishes such as: Polish pancakes, cheesy mushroom baguettes, donuts and

Throughout the term we have been exploring the SEARCH value of 'Resilience' through both play and trying out new things. Central pupils have explored new foods as we venture through a range of Polish recipes inspired by our fantastic LSA Maggie, to deepen our understanding of Polish culture.

We continued our learning around pre-1914 literature in English by engaging with the story Alice in Wonderland, which brought many smiles to the faces of Central class as we dressed up and had a rabbit of a time with sensory props. Pupils developed their sentence building skills and showed their mastery in using vocabulary boards to both comment on and construct sentences to retell the story.

In Maths this half term we focussed on 'Money' as well as 'Mass and Volume'. Identifying, sorting and counting were all key skills that Central class revisited and continued to master as we continued to develop our understanding of money in the real world. Volume was a highlight of the term as we used water to explore filling and emptying vessels as well as measuring accurately, a great transferable skill!

Finally, this half term saw the exploration of Thailand as our focus for Geography. Thai culture and folklore were touched on as pupils had many opportunities to broaden their understanding and engage with the vibrant music, food and history of Thailand.

### **HOME LEARNING**

Next term we will carry out an author study and explore a range of texts rather than focussing on one individual novel for the term, this will be a great opportunity for pupils to gain an understanding of key features in writing and literature. During Maths we will be identifying early fractions through practical experiences, once again utilising daily opportunities to discuss fractions such as half and whole around the home and throughout the holidays will help pupils develop some understanding as they come into the summer term. Easter eggs provide a great opportunity to explore breaking in half and eating an egg whole!



#### **CLASS NEWS**

Here we are at the end of another term. It has been a short term but a very busy one with

lots to fit in. In English, we have now completed this term's focus on reading and will be moving on to another writing focus in the summer term. In Maths we have just completed a term working on counting and number facts and all pupils have now attempted their Entry Level 1 exam papers. We will be sending these off in the coming weeks and look forward to celebrating those who achieve their qualifications. Our focus in Maths next term will be measure. In Science we have just completed half a term investigating light and sound in which pupils particularly enjoyed exploring shadows and how these are made. We will be moving on to learning about states of matter and forces after Easter.

In our non-core subjects, we are finishing off a Forest School module at the moment which has seen us take regular trips up to the Lordship Recreation Ground wooded area to learn about the wildlife and complete activities in nature such as bark rubbings and making 'bird helpers'. We have also been working on safety in the community as part of our life skills learning to ensure we are safe when we go outside of school. Some pupils have been working on these skills inside first and in the playground outdoor area. In PSHE we have been learning about healthy relationships and what these might look like as we get older and we will be moving on to learning about drugs, alcohol, tobacco and healthy eating. Next half term we will also be beginning a careers and work related learning focus in our thematic afternoons with some exciting experiences planned. We are wrapping up our focus on Polish culture and will be moving on to learning about Spain in summer term 1 which will be incorporated into our circle time each day and our cooking lessons. Our SEARCH value this half term has been 'resilience' and we have been celebrating how we can withstand adversity and bounce back from difficult situations. Next value will be 'compassion'.

Dear Families, we hope you are well? It has been such a short and very busy term, we are

looking forward to our much needed Easter holidays.

Our search value this term has been resilience and we have explored the theme through many ways such as taking on challenges and not giving up if we don't manage them first time.

In english we have continued to study pre-1914 literature, this term we focussed on the story Alice in Wonderland. Pupils enjoyed dressing up as different characters in the story and requesting different props; they also enjoyed having tea parties with the mad hatter.

In maths we have been learning about money. We were able to identify coins by different characteristics such as their colour or shape. Northern class enjoyed using the class shop to buy different items they were interested in, through this they were required to count out specific values of items to pay for them.

In science we have been exploring sources of light and also different sound sources.

Pupils enjoyed the hands on and sensory experiences from these sessions.

Pupils continued to enjoy weekly step into dance sessions and forest school sessions alongside their weekly RE, geography, D&T and PSHE sessions.

### **HOME LEARNING**

Home learning:

- Continue to explore the theme of money by taking pupils shopping regularly. It is important for pupils to recognise they need to give money in order to get an item they are interested in.
- Next term our literacy focus is the author Rob Hodgson, if you have any of his books at home then please read them to your child. Alternatively you can continue to read any book regularly with your child. Our focus with pupils is that they are able to follow along with the text using their fingers, moving left to right and from the top of the page to the bottom as an adult reads to them.

### **CLASS NEWS**

This term in maths, our main focus has been on money. Pupils have focused on lots of skills

including recognising coins and notes and

adding with coins and notes. We are now beginning to look at measuring mass and volume. In Summer 1, we will be focusing on fractions and statistics.

In English, Piccadilly class have been exploring the story of Alice in Wonderland. Pupils have been working hard on reading the text carefully and answering comprehension questions about the story. We have been working towards writing our own retelling of parts of the story, using correct punctuation. After the Easter break, we will be doing an author study which involves looking at multiple books by the same author.

In Geography, Piccadilly class have been learning about Thailand. As part of this, they have identified it on a map and explored the climate, landmarks and food.

In Science, the topic has been 'light, sound and electricity'. Piccadilly class have focused on light in particular, including exploring natural and artificial light sources and learning about the effects of the sun. Next term, we will move to materials and states of matter.

Piccadilly class have coped really well with lots of changes this term and have made lots of progress with their learning. Well done on another wonderful half term Piccadilly Class. Have a great break.

Pupils across the school have been focusing on football and table tennis this half term. Football has always been a firm favourite for many of our pupils and table tennis is a new sport that we have added to the PE Curriculum this year. Table tennis helps improve hand eye coordination and there are many game variations that pupils can play.

Primary and Secondary West pupils have focused on taking turns and working with a partner this half term. Pupils have been learning to dribble a football, pass to a partner and how to score a goal. Pupils understand that it is important to celebrate everyone's participation in various activities. Elizabeth class have had the opportunity to explore table tennis and have enjoyed taking turns to hit the ball to each other.

Also, a group of pupils have been attending weekly athletics sessions at Lee Valley Athletics Centre. They have had the opportunity to attempt all athletics events and this has been a highlight of the term. Pupils have shown great determination when completing certain events and have really enjoyed this exciting weekly trip.

#### Secondary West

#### Piccadilly, Bakerloo & Jubilee

In music, pupils have been learning how to play the ukulele. They have learnt how to hold the ukulele correctly, how to strum the strings and how to pluck individual strings. We've also been singing songs together and learning about how different instruments sound.

In drama, we've been exploring '*The Three Little Pigs*', re-telling the story and creating masks for some of the characters. In addition, we have been practising essential drama skills - stopping, starting, sharing, taking turns and engaging in role play.
