Career and Enrichment News

It has already been a busy start to Careers and Enrichment this term across the school. We have welcomed Jackson Lane Circus skills which pupils in secondary are really enjoying. Pupils in year 10 and 11, as part of their STEM curriculum, are again going to Blackhorse Road which continues to develop their carpentry and building

skills. We have hosted the 'Communication Pod' for Primary and secondary pupils, had African Storytelling sessions for the whole school as part of Black History month and pupils in primary have attended 'Frameless' - an immersive art exhibition in central London. Sixth form have started their work placements at Kentish Town City Farm, Boots and Five Guys. We have continued with African Drumming sessions and are hopefully working towards a performance at the Royal Albert Hall! There are also Piano and guitar lessons for more pupils this year, horse riding and Young Enterprise.

In Addition to the Grove Sixth Form, we have also opened The Grove Pre-Supported Internship, in partnership with Haringey and Mencap, this year for pupils aged 16-19 with EHCPs. This is an employment pathway for young people who are ready to move into the world of work. It is developing their skills and allowing them to move onto a full Internship. This is open to young people in Haringey and based in Rising Green (A youth hub in Wood Green). You can find out more information on our website under **'Sixth** Form and Careers Pre-internship. It is a very exciting opportunity to get young people with SEND needs into the workplace.

HEAD OF SECONDARY WEST

What a great start to the term we have had! It has been a very busy term but I have been very impressed with how our pupils have settled into their new classes and routines alongside building relationships with new peers and adults. This year we welcome a new key stage 3 class to our department called Liberty class. It has been lovely getting to know the new pupils and staff members that have joined our department and I hope they continue to thrive with us.

In Key Stage 3 pupils are working on a poetry unit in English, place value and the number system in maths and plants or seasonal changes in Science. They have been learning about women's suffrage in history, symbols in Hinduism in RE and developing their self awareness in PSHE.

In Key Stage 4 pupils have begun work towards their AQA awards or Entry Level accreditations. In English they have been reading fictional texts about animals and in maths they have been consolidating and expanding their knowledge on numbers. This term their thematic afternoons have been based around being a "Global Citizen" therefore pupils are working towards AQA awards in History, Geography and RE.

I hope you all have a great half term break and I look forward to seeing pupils back for the joys of Autumn Term 2 in November.

CLASS NEWS

This half term, both the staff and pupils have enjoyed getting to

know each other. We have settled well into our routines and have developed some really positive relationships. The pupils have started working towards pre-entry level AQA awards across various subjects, and we're excited to share their progress with you!

English:

In class, we read the book *Rainbow Flamingo*. The pupils have developed their comprehension skills by answering "who, where, what" questions about the characters and plot. Using language boards to construct and write sentences, they have been practicing character descriptions and ordering events from the story. They have also had opportunities to dress up and reenact scenes, supporting their secure knowledge of the story.

Maths:

In maths, we have been consolidating our knowledge of numbers 1-50. Pupils focused on one-to-one correspondence, which is essential for counting and number recognition. We have been using number grids and number lines to help organise numbers, and practiced ordering

numbers as well as identifying missing numbers. Additionally, we have been counting in twos, fives and tens to strengthen numerical fluency.

Science:

Our science lessons were centered around the weather and seasons. We explored the differences in weather and temperatures using sensory materials and identified appropriate clothing for various weather conditions. Pupils explored how we might adapt our activities based on the weather, developing critical thinking and real-world connections.

Geography:

Pupils engaged in activities related to English and British culture by studying landmarks, traditional foods, and key elements such as the Royals, the national anthem, flags, and money. This encouraged them to show familiarity and identify with the country they live in and understand the diversity of the wider community.

History:

In history, we focused on World War II. Pupils studied examples of home protection, rationing, and various jobs in the military during this significant period. They explored relevant objects related to this period and were encouraged to role play different scenarios to show their understanding of this historical event.

Religious Education (RE):

In RE, we experienced the teachings of Buddhism, examining its history, their practices, diet and exploring important artifacts. This exploration helped support and show appreciation for different cultures and beliefs.

HOME LEARNING

- Our Little Wandle reading scheme books will be sent home with your child as well as a book of their choice. Read with/to them and practice comprehension questions throughout (who/what/where/when/why? questions)
- Practice counting, ordering and sequencing using the activities here.

A big welcome back to all families! This

friendships and showing great enthusiasm during circle time. It's been wonderful to see the pupils supporting each other, taking turns, and building a sense of community in the classroom.

In maths, we focused on functional instructions, using real-life contexts to practise skills. The pupils worked on following step-by-step instructions, such as preparing resources for lessons and life or building simple structures, which helped them understand sequencing and problem-solving in everyday tasks.

Our book in English was *The Rainbow Flamingo*, a meaningful story that

explored embracing our differences. We practised answering questions from the text and retelling the story, helping develop pupils comprehension skills and gain confidence in discussing what they've read.

History lessons took us back to World War II, explored through the senses to help the pupils connect with the past. Activities included listening to sounds from the era, smelling and eating foods that were commonly available, and touching materials like gas masks and air raid sirens, making the topic more accessible and engaging.

In Religious Education (RE), we learned about Buddhism through the senses, where pupils experienced aspects of Buddhist traditions. They listened to meditation sounds, smelled incense, and observed Buddhist artefacts, which fostered a deeper understanding of this world religion.

Science lessons were all about the weather and seasons. We observed changes in temperature, seasons, and how different types of weather feel. The class enjoyed making simple weather observations across the half-term, to help them understand weather patterns.

HOME LEARNING

To support learning at home, consider encouraging language use around the home through modelling and giving instructions and directions throughout the day. Use simple functional verbs including 'put, give, take and more". Cooking together is another great opportunity to begin our topic for next half-term in maths, measurement. Get your child

involved in preparing meals to reinforce maths skills (measuring ingredients), following instructions, and language development (naming items and actions).

These everyday activities can enrich your child's learning and keep the progress going outside the classroom. Looking forward to another great half-term ahead!



CLASS NEWS

Jubilee have made a fantastic start to the academic year. We have spent this half term reviewing

previous knowledge and introducing new skills and have been very impressed with what the pupils have achieved so far.

In English we have started reading fictional stories about animals including The Jungle Book and Black Beauty. We are preparing for our first Entry Level assessments in reading and writing and have already completed our first speaking and listening assessment.

In Maths we have been reviewing and building upon number skills using the four key operations: addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. Pupils have enjoyed practical activities that have encouraged them to explore their number skills more actively and this has informed their book work.

In Science we have explored the topic of plants through an AQA unit award on the topic of Woodlands. We have visited Railway Fields Nature Reserve as well as local parklands where pupils have learned about deciduous and coniferous trees as

well as completing some lovely artworks exploring different leaf shapes.

In Humanities pupils have been working on our Global Citizen topic, exploring maps of the British Isles, investigating the history of medicine and learning about rites of passage in a range of different religions. We have used a variety of different media to explore these topics including film, role play and internet research.

Finally in PSHE we have been exploring the skills for learning that underpin everything pupils do in class. We have looked at organisational skills, making mistakes, resilience, motivation and high expectations in order to help pupils to maximise their achievements in class and beyond.

HOME LEARNING

- Home learning in preparation for new topics:
- Maths Measurements. Explore measurements around the home: investigate clothing measurements, weigh ingredients when cooking, read scales etc.
- English Fictional Animals. Enjoy stories and poems with animal characters together at home.
- Science Animals and their Habitats. Watch documentaries together about animals around the world. Read non-fiction texts and play with, draw and talk about different kinds of animals.
- Humanities Global Citizen. Watch Newsround together and talk about events happening around the world. Try to find the places on a map and explore places that

your family has connections to. Try foods from different cultures and notice religious buildings in the community.



Our Search value this term has been support, our pupils have demonstrated their ability to ask for support from others and also to offer support to their peers when needed. We also have focussed on teamwork and learning how to participate in activities together and share taking turns with each other.

English:

This term we have been learning about poetry. We have experienced reading a range of different poems and developed our skills around sharing our thoughts and feelings regarding the poems to others. We've also studied performance poetry and the pupils really enjoyed the work of Joseph Coalho, Benjamin Zephanaiah and Michael Rosen.

Maths:

This term we have been consolidating our understanding of place value. Pupils were able to recognise, name and partition numbers up to ten million. We worked on recognising which numbers were greater or less than other numbers and rounding numbers up to the nearest hundred thousand.

Science:

We have focussed on plants, naming their different parts including their reproductive system and thinking about the ideal conditions for plant growth and pollination.

Foundation subjects:

In history we have been learning about women's suffrage and the important role of the suffragettes and suffragists. We also took time to reflect on our own personal strengths and weaknesses, setting long and short term goals to help us improve ourselves in PSHE. In RE we were learning about hinduism and the importance and meaning of hindu symbols. In Art we have been learning about and creating artwork inspired by Frida Kahlo and in Food Tech we have been learning to use peelers safely.

HOME LEARNING

- Encourage your child to read as much as possible and in a variety of ways for example interpreting a recipe or reading the bus schedule to plan a trip alongside reading books for pleasure.
- Visit the local library
- Encourage your child to do some chores to build their resilience and independence skills.
- Visit a local community event or activity.
- Go on a nature walk and look at different flowers and their parts.

CLASS NEWS

Maths

This half term, pupils explored key mathematical concepts through a

variety of activities. Some pupils focused on recognising and writing numbers from 0 to 9. They also developed an understanding of the symbols for addition and subtraction. Pupils practiced solving number problems involving the addition and subtraction of single-digit numbers up to 10. Others worked on identifying numbers up to 5 by grouping objects accordingly and learned to copy and extend simple patterns using real-life materials, such as apples and oranges. These practical tasks were fun and motivating as well as helping them to

reinforce foundational numeracy skills.

English/Literacy

In English, pupils engaged with a selection of poems brought to life through sensory props. The focus for this term was writing acrostic poems centered on themes of weather and the changing seasons. This creative writing task encouraged pupils to think carefully about word choices and initial letter sounds. Props to identify the same letter sounds really helped make the writing process more engaging and fun as they played and explored some rather unique items e.g a squeaky donut or stretchy parsnips.

Science

This term in science, pupils focused on plant life. They followed instructions to plant seeds and began to understand how seeds and bulbs grow into plants. Pupils also learned to identify a variety of common plants, as well as describe the basic structures of a flowering plant. These hands-on activities allowed pupils to be curious and explore the natural world and see how plants grow and change in time.

Religious Education & PSHE

Pupils have been engaging with sensory stories about the Hindu festivals of Diwali Holi. Through these interactive lessons, they explored the vibrant colours associated with Holi and learned about key Hindu symbols. Pupils also began to explore different aspects of Hindu rituals ceremonies, gaining a deeper understanding of the importance of family and community in Hindu culture. These sensory and experiential activities helped to bring the themes of the lessons to life, accessible making them more and engaging for all pupils.

For PSHE, pupils sorted their likes and dislikes and explored ways to recognise their preferences and uniqueness. Additionally, lessons explored simple acts of kindness and unkindness, encouraging reflection on their actions as well as learning to identify trusted adults in the school.

HOME LEARNING

CLASS NFWS

This term in maths, our main focus has been on place value. Pupils have focused on lots of skills

including partitioning numbers into hundreds, tens and ones, finding 100, 10 and 1 more and less and ordering numbers in ascending and descending orders. Piccadilly class have demonstrated great knowledge of place value and have completed lots of challenging activities. Next half term, we will be focusing on addition.

In English, Piccadilly class have been focusing particularly on poems, performance poetry. They explored a range of performance poetry including poems by Michael Rosen. After that, pupils have been working hard on using features including similes, alliteration and rhyme and have written 3 different poems about autumn and performed them to their peers. Next half term, we will continue our work on poetry and focus on haikus.

In history, Piccadilly class have been learning about the suffragettes and their fight for women's rights to vote. They have learnt about important figures such as Emmeline Pankhurst and explored how the suffragettes used protest to demand change. Next half term we will be moving onto geography and exploring polar and

desert regions.

In science, Piccadilly class have focused on seasonal changes. They have explored key changes that take place in each season before moving on to explore how and why day length changes over a year. Next half term we will be moving on to living things and their habitats.

Well done on a super first half term Piccadilly Class. Have a great half term break.

PE News with Mr Proctor

Secondary West department pupils focus on specific gross motor skills every half term during PE lessons. This half term pupils have focused on developing their running technique, jumping with two feet, throwing and catching. Pupils have also

explored and enjoyed learning about hockey and basketball.

Pupils have learnt to hold a hockey stick with two hands, dribble using a hockey stick, pass to a partner, take part in hockey matches and the importance of keeping the hockey sticks low to prevent accidentally hitting another player.

Pupils have thoroughly enjoyed exploring basketball, learning how to dribble a basketball, how to perform various basketball passes, exploring techniques to shoot into the hoop and participating in basketball games!

Bakerloo and Jubilee Class have enjoyed weekly dance lessons every Thursday with our Step Into Dance Instructor. Piccadilly Class have started climbing lessons at Stronghold Climbing Centre which have started extremely well with the pupils showing great self confidence and engagement.
