Solemnity of the Ascension and St Peter and St Paul

On 26 May 2021, we celebrated the Solemnity of the Ascension, normally a Holy Day of Obligation, where Year 8 represented the entire school for their year group Mass celebrated by Fr Jean-Claude Selvini from Hainault. Students across the rest of the school were able to follow the Mass in their classrooms via live streaming.



On 29 June 2021, we celebrated the Solemnity of St Peter and St Paul, also normally a Holy Day of Obligation, where Year 10 represented the entire school for their year group Mass, celebrated by Canon John Harvey from Loughton.

We have also celebrated Leavers' Masses for our Year 11 and 13 students as we bid them a prayerful farewell and thanked God for all they have brought to our community, with each of our students being gifted with a blessed Miraculous Medal and prayer card.



Looking Ahead

We are excited for the year ahead and plans are already underway for our pilgrimage and retreat programme in 2021/22, where each student will have the opportunity to go on retreat with our Diocesan Youth Service, in addition to our school pilgrimage in the summer term. As always, we are incredibly grateful to our clergy for their support throughout the year, and to the parents and members of our parishes, for continuing to support us in prayer.



Study Skills Seminars



During the summer term, students in Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 took part in an Elevate Study Skills Seminar on Memory and Mnemonics in preparation for their mock examinations and end of year assessments. For Year 10, guest speakers delivered the sessions whereas the sessions were hosted virtually for KS3 students.

The sessions covered techniques on how to overcome reliance upon rote

learning, the role of attention in memory, managing distractions and semantic learning techniques for higher level memorisation. The workshops were highly beneficial for all of our students.

99% of Year 10 students said they would recommend

99% of Year 10 students said they would recommend the programme to other students and 97% said they believe the time was well spent.

Please see below a selection of student feedback on these sessions.

- From the memory mnemonic presentation, I learnt to memorise notes by using the substitute word method, peg words and 'the mental journey'." (Year 7 student)
- From the Memory Mnemonic presentation I learnt how to stay focused whilst completing homestudy and ways to remember key information for exams." (Year 7 student)
- "I learnt about how your environment affects your ability to retain information, and techniques I can use to memorise information for upcoming exams." (Year 8 student)
- ➤ "I learnt how the brain stores things in both short term and long term memory and ways to improve your memory." (Year 9 student)
- "I learnt how to manage my time better so I do not become stressed with lots of work. Also, I learnt that to do short bursts of revision is more effective than to study for hours without taking a break." (Year 9 student)
- ➤ "During this seminar I learnt about the top three points for fully remembering key facts. Attention, storage and retrieval. I learnt that creating stories using what you are trying to revise and making them fun and strange can help you to remember. Since then I have been using this technique to revise. I have recently created one story which involves a lawyer ('avocat' in French) who is in a murder case, defending an innocent Avocado. I am sure I will not forget that." (Year 10 student)
- > "The Elevate seminar was extremely interactive and engaging, making it fun and useful." (Year 10 student)
- ➤ "I found the seminar very useful as I am able to remember more things and can now get prepared more easily for any upcoming tests." (Year 10 student)
- "I learnt that even the simplest of change to my revision means I can memorise material more efficiently and do it even when walking to and from school." (Year 10 student)



Reading at Trinity



50 Books a Year Challenge Almost 30 KS3 students have done particularly well in this year's '50 Books a Year Challenge'. 17 students have read 25 or more books and 12 students have exceeded 50 books! These students will be rewarded with certificates and Amazon vouchers at the end of term.

Despite the restrictions we have faced this year, ensuring our students have access to our library books is priority. Our library has been restocked over the past year and we have a fantastic range of award-winning books exploring a variety of genres and societal issues. Although library visits have not been possible at times this year, our librarian has brought pop-up libraries to students; these have proven very popular. Our librarian also created a video demonstrating how students could use our 'click and collect' service to reserve books from our library catalogue. This was shared during English lessons. Recommended read lists for KS3 have also been shared with students; these books are all in stock in our school library.



Competitions We have read some fantastic competition entries this term. 14 students submitted entries to the Redbridge Short Story and Poetry Competition. Congratulations to those who were shortlisted: Violet (7A), Julianna (9A), John (9E) and Yasmin (9B).


Improving Reading Congratulations to the students who have taken part in Lexia Power Up



reading intervention this year. Some amazing progress has been made, with reading ages improving by as much as 4 years and 10 months! A parent of a Year 7 student recently commented that 'the

Lexia programme has transformed my daughter into a different person who now loves to read'.

Developing Vocabulary Year 7, 8 and 9 students have been learning how to use the Frayer Model in English this term. This graphic organiser is an excellent way to explore the meanings of key words and embed them in long-term memory.



National Tutoring Programme

Since January 2021, Trinity has participated in the National Tutoring Programme to provide additional small group tuition to targeted KS4 English, Maths and History students. Our carefully selected tutoring partner, Connex Education, has



a wealth of experience and their skilled teachers have maked with our own Heads of Departments to provide synergy with our own lessons and support the most important areas of the GCSE courses.

Over 50 Year 11 students, the majority of whom had never before had the opportunity for private tuition, attended weekly online sessions with 100% of them citing the experience as "enjoyable and beneficial" and saying they would recommend the opportunity to others. Students reported that they gained confidence and made progress in the subjects, which allowed them

to understand concepts they had previously found challenging and made it easier for them to complete classwork and homework.

"Being in a relaxed environment without distraction really helped my child concentrate and focus on some aspects that she was having difficulty with." Year 11 Parent Our own review of students' progress showed a notable increase in their attainment since their last assessments and staff have observed an improvement in students' motivation and engagement. Parents were also very enthusiastic about the success of the tutoring programme, highlighting the beneficial impact of the small group environment and the pace and clarity of the sessions.

In June, a targeted group of Year 10 students joined the tutoring programme and we intend to roll this out more widely in September.

Adding breadth and depth to UCAS applications and personal statements June 2021

Virtual Higher Education Evening

On Wednesday 30 June our Virtual Higher Education Evening was held. The intention of the evening was to help parents/guardians/carers to aid their children with the higher education application process. During the evening, there were a number of speakers with expertise in all aspects of the application process. They presented at various points throughout the evening. The presentations have been recorded if parents missed any sessions. A letter with links to the presentations and answers to FAQ has been sent to parents and is available on request.

Our Keynote Speaker: Mr. Mike Nicolson

Mr. Nicholson is Director of Student Recruitment and Admissions at the University of Bath and a member of the Governing Body of UCAS. He is the UK Chair of the Higher Education Liaison Officers' Association (HELOA), a member of the UCAS Council, and serves on the OCR Qualifications Committee. He was previously Director of Undergraduate Admissions at the University of Oxford and will be taking up a similar role at the University of Cambridge from September 2021. He is a highly regarded and very experienced university admissions tutor. Mr. Nicholson has worked closely with Trinity for 29 years. He gave an overview



of the university application process and spoke specifically about how to make the best UCAS application you can.

Miss Keegan, Director of Sixth Form at Trinity, spoke about a range of matters relating to higher education applications as well as student finance. Mr. McGrory, Head of Year 13 at Trinity, spoke about the higher education application process at Trinity, looking at key support, deadlines and Personal Statements. He also led a session on how these can be augmented to impress university admissions tutors who make decisions about the offer of places. He finally presented on the use of the platform Unifrog which has proved to be a real asset to our UCAS process.

Aiming Higher

Students in Year 12 are signposted to numerous opportunities that they can opt into to raise aspirations and to confirm their interest in higher education and in particular courses of study. Two students in Year 12, Elan and Pia, each describe the opportunities that they have engaged with, during this academic year, in preparation for higher education. Elan has engaged with the following opportunities: Step into Oxmed, KCL Medicine and Dentistry lectures and an Oxford University virtual open day.



Step into Oxmed: A fun and very informative virtual opportunity to learn more about the different specialties and areas in Medicine ranging from Genetics to Personal Medicine. All speakers are experts in their fields and are very keen and happy to answer any questions. A wonderful way to dedicate yourself to Medicine and gain wider knowledge, also a great

super curricular activity to mention in personal statement.

Oxford University virtual open day: A safe and interactive way to explore Oxford University with both live and pre-recorded events, which you can watch at your own leisure. Very informative and a fine way to discover colleges and subjects by hearing student and teacher experience.

KCL Medicine and Dentistry lectures: A very interactive and informative virtual lecture series covering medical students' experience, doctors' experience in a wide variety of specialties and great application tips. It is a great way to make yourself aware of different routes to medicine, what is required and the pathways into different specialties after graduation. Very good opportunity to reflect College LONDON on what you learnt in lectures.

Pia has a particular focus on Medicine and writes about her role in setting up and leading Trinity's Medical Society in addition to her experience of attending a university taster day.

Trinity Medical Society - The aim is to assist students like myself who are interested in pursuing a career in Medicine. In this society, we meet every fortnight to discuss a variety of topics ranging from how each course structure

differs in each university, to more controversial topics such as euthanasia. So far, we have had debates on: medical ethical dilemmas, euthanasia and current affairs; each student in the society has the opportunity to lead a presentation on a topic of their choice, this not only helps them develop

transferrable skills that they can apply in the future, but also emphasises their passion for the course. All PowerPoints and resources used are later uploaded onto a shared google drive for those who were unable to attend. In the future, we aim to

progress further and do more inclusive events i.e. setting up fundraisers, which will hopefully get more students involved. If you



University College London Medical Science Taster Lecture - Through attending UCL's medical science taster lectures on "Cardiovascular and Respiratory Function in Health and Disease", I learnt about the role of the autonomic nervous system in great depth. throughout. However, as soon as the lecturer arrived, he put me at ease and reminded me that everyone attending was in the same position. We are extremely proud of Lorenzo, Year 12, whose amazing presentation secured him a place as a grand final finalist in the Linklaters competition. As such, he won a £1,000 prize money for our school.

The competition is designed to give Year 12 state-school students currently completing A-Levels the edge they need to become the commercial lawyers of the future, presenting and arguing their unique view on a business situation.

When interviewed, Lorenzo said of the Challenge: "It was a very exciting experience, in which I was able to represent the school. I

was motivated by the chance to interact with people in the law industry and to explore a possible career path for the future. I hope the earnings will be able to help enhance the school's business links and give a chance for students to get an insight into the working world through figures of successful businesses."

The prize money has indeed been put to good use by our "Careers Department" and it will be invaluable to develop further external links with businesses, which will benefit the whole school community, fueling our students' ambitions and success.

Ford I Accelerator Course in conjunction with EDI

Creating opportunities for diverse talent Learn. Grow. Excel.

Trinity Sixth Form has worked in partnership with EDI for a number of years. EDI enables employers to communicate and engage with students from diverse backgrounds with a focus on students from African, Caribbean and Asian heritage including those from lower socio-economic groups and first generation into Higher Education. EDI provides a bridge between companies and diverse talent. During April 2021, Ford Plc partnered with EDI to create the Ford I Accelerator. Year 12 and Year 13 students had the opportunity to apply to participate in the programme for 5 days, learn about Ford, work on a live business challenge and gain valuable skills transferable to the workplace. Rebecca, Year 12, summarises the experience below:



The Ford accelerator course was a really fun experience, it went better than I expected! There were lots of team projects and we also learnt a lot about product desirability and customer satisfaction. We were given a brief on how to make transport more accessible for those who are impaired. We thought of helping those who have hearing impairments and thought of how we could design an automotive vehicle. As well as the team projects, we were able to

hear from the top workers at Ford who shared their career journeys, gave us lots of information on interview and applying for apprenticeships. We learnt a lot of interviewing skills such as STARL, how to manage stress and that stress is actually a good thing. We also learnt a lot about how to manage time and how to work well as a team. Each day was different and each day I thankfully learnt something new and insightful. It was nice to see that everyone's career journey was very different but they all ended up happy and content with the jobs and careers they were doing and emphasised how important it is to work hard and most importantly do what makes you happy. I am grateful to have taken part in this experience and I am happy that I applied and learnt a lot of valuable skills that will help me not only in school but also in my future careers. I highly recommend it for anyone who is interested in a degree apprenticeship or just wants to develop and pick up new skills.

Bridging Curriculum and Transition

11-12 Curriculum

Current Year 11 students have access to the 11-12 transition curriculum on Office 365. This is an important process, which is designed to ensure that Year 11 students are prepared for the rigour of A-Level learning as well as developing skills to enhance their independence. Regardless of students' next steps, we advise the completion of this programme to ensure the best possible start for their learning journey.


This bridging curriculum contains tasks designed to help students understand the various demands of an A-Level curriculum, think about their futures beyond their time at Sixth Form and look at the developing of skills essential to succeeding in their studies, such as independence and resilience. Students can complete these daily tasks to facilitate the smoothest of transitions from KS4 to KS5. Students have been provided with a 'Don't Break the Chain' study mat. Careers Updates

Work Experience and Employability

The careers focus for this term has been work experience. Under normal circumstances students in Years 10 and 12 would have had the opportunity to spend time out of school within the workplace. As that could not happen this year, or last year for Year 11, due to the pandemic, our focus has been on virtual work experiences and bringing employers into the classroom.

During the Easter break a number of our Year 10, 11 and 12

students took part in virtual work experiences through Springpod and Speakers for Schools. Both platforms offer state school students the opportunity to take part in work experiences with industry-leading organisations such as Tesco, Spotify, Santander, RAF, NHS and L'Oreal. At the end of the experience students were awarded with a certificate which they

can use as evidence of work experience when applying for jobs or further education courses. The most popular courses with our

students were law, finance and film & TV.

In addition to the work experiences available during the school holidays, we also offered students the opportunity to complete assessed and certified work experiences through a newly created careers platform, VWES. The platform was created in response to the need for students to access work experience during the pandemic and allowed students to complete virtual work experiences in their own time. Oliver,

Lorenzo and Joseph from Year 10 completed VWES virtual work experiences in: working as a detective, astrophysics and working

on film sets.

Esther in Year 12 completed a number of VWES work experiences including cosmetic surgery, an area she is interested in going into in the future. This is what Esther had to say about the course.

I gained insight into what it would be like to work as a cosmetic surgeon, the environment I would be working in, the type of people I would meet and the reasons why people would want cosmetic surgery. I also found out that being a surgeon is more time consuming than I thought!



Haven House Enterprise Project

Next school year, from September- December 2021, the school will be taking part in an enterprise project for local schools. 10 local schools compete to raise money for Haven House Children's Hospice in Woodford.

Each team, which is made up of four Year 9 students and four Year 12 students, is tasked with creating an events start-up business and turning £50 seed capital into £1,500 over the course of the project. The project is sponsored by Galliard Homes which will provide mentors to support the teams and help them to develop project plans.

We are in the process of confirming the teams, more details on how you can help will follow early next school year!

Year 10 Careers Events

Year 10 have had access to a series of careers sessions during the summer term. The sessions included: an introduction to careers and work experience with Steph Easton, Trinity's Enterprise Advisor and VP of People at CHIP, a session on digital careers resources and a drop-down careers afternoon that focused on employability. The employability afternoon was sponsored and run by Frances Trought of Everything Diversity & Inclusion (EDI) and included careers, further education talks and an interactive session designed to help students build their communication skills.



During the afternoon students were given an introduction to employability by Frances and also heard from Carol Parillon, Chief Data Architect at Shell, about what employers are looking for. They also had the opportunity to listen to a panel of graduates, degree apprentices and undergraduates, including Jorrell Trought, a Trinity alumni student, who talked about the further education choices they had made and why.

The second part of the afternoon was an interactive session. Students were asked to prepare an elevator

pitch – a 30-second summary of who they are, their aspirations and to come up with a personal slogan. To accompany their pitch, they were asked to provide a PowerPoint slide of 3 images that represented them - the results were fantastic!

Students were then given the opportunity to present their pitch to a professional, sourced by EDI. We were lucky enough to have professionals from Santander, Charles Stanley, Converse, Network Rail, Amazon, Microsoft and EY. A huge thank you to EDI for running the truly inspirational event for us!

Trinity's Enterprise Advisor



I would like to take this opportunity to introduce you to Steph Easton. Steph is working with Trinity as Enterprise Advisor. She is passionate about helping bridge the gap between schools and

employers and is working closely with us on our careers programme across all year groups. She has worked in HR roles for over 15 years for a number of big brands like Estee Lauder, MAC Cosmetics, Harvey Nichols and London Marathon Events. She now works as VP of People for an app called CHIP and is a careers coach.
