Religious Life

The religious life and ethos of our school community remain at the centre of all aspects of school life and provide the foundation of our mission and vision as an outstanding Catholic school within the Diocese of Brentwood.



We are now within the season of Advent, a time of waiting and preparation for the Birth of Jesus Christ. The first part of Advent directs our thoughts and desires to the Second Coming of Jesus Christ. This will happen at the end of time when He will gather everyone to Him for the final judgement. We profess this truth every week at Mass when we pray the Creed: 'He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead;

and His kingdom will have no end'. As we hasten towards the celebration of the Nativity at the end of Advent, it is wise for us to remember that the Christian is called to live in joyful hope for the coming of our Saviour, Jesus Christ. All of these words we hear weekly at Mass, but like so much that is overfamiliar, they cease to make an impact on our lives. Advent is the call — made from the heart of the wilderness — for us to change our lives; to be ready and vigilant; and to live always in hope of the moment when God will come to judge the world and our lives. The first Christians would pray: 'Come, Lord Jesus with great expectation'. Let these days not distract us from the things of God, but serve to call us, and focus our gaze, on Jesus.

May God help each of us to prepare, by inner purification, to celebrate His coming again, and His birth in time.



Celebration of the Eucharist

We remain first and foremost a Eucharistic community. The celebration of the Eucharist, as the 'Source and Summit of our lives as Christians', remains of paramount importance. We have sought to develop our Eucharistic tradition through the daily celebration of Holy Mass each morning before school at 8:20am in addition to weekly Eucharistic Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.

Month of the Holy Rosary in October

Each lesson continues to begin with prayer and acclamation. Every student and class in the school have received formation on the importance of popular piety and in particular, the Holy Rosary during the month of October. Following this formation during Theology curriculum time, each class has spent time in the Chapel or at one of the nearby Marian Shrines, and prayed the Holy Rosary together, praying in particular for our school community, with students encouraged to bring their own Rosary to school during the month of October. The praying of the Angelus and 3 o'clock Mercy prayers continue to remain part of our tradition.



November Remembrance

During the month of November, the month of the Holy Souls, all students had time in Theology lessons to focus on the importance of praying for the repose of those gone before us. Students and staff were encouraged to write the names of deceased loved ones in the Remembrance box in each Chapel. These intentions were prayed for every single day in November.



Armistice Day was also marked on 11 November with a special live streamed Liturgy, with the entire school community marking a 2-minute silence. Year 11 students took part in a moving liturgy of Remembrance in the Padua playground with our Headmaster, Head Boy, Head Girl and sixth form student leadership team leading us in the time of prayer and liturgy, laying our wreath and marking the national 2-minute silence.

Annual Remembrance Mass

On Tuesday 30 November 2021, we celebrated our Annual Remembrance Mass for all of our deceased loved ones, including former staff and students. The liturgy was an incredibly moving opportunity to remember those gone before us, where each name was prayerfully read out and



remembered, whilst we sang together "May the choirs of angels come to greet you, may they speed you to paradise. May the Lord enfold you in His mercy, may you find eternal life".








The inaugural meeting of Trinity Law Society took place on Friday 3 December. Year 13 students will take an initial lead on the



We are very proud of the programmes in place and the advice and guidance at Trinity that supports students in the sixth form to progress to the next stage of education, training or employment. For the cohort who completed their education at Trinity in June 2021, 81% have now progressed to Higher Education, of which 42% are reading their subject at a Russell Group university. unifrog

The current Year 13 students are using the online platform Unifrog to help them with UCAS applications and other destinations. Trinity has invested in this

platform to help our students make decisions with regard what they wish to do after leaving us. The purpose of Unifrog is to support students to progress into the best opportunity for them. Unifrog do this by providing a one-stop-shop where students can explore their

interests, then find and successfully apply for their best next-step after school. The platform has also really helped students with their UCAS applications in particular. Students can use the platform to help them design their personal statements and information that they provide on Unifrog is being used to enhance their overall UCAS references.

The UCAS Process at Trinity

Throughout the autumn term, the majority of our Year 13 students have been engaged with the UCAS process. Our early applicants to Oxbridge/ Medicine/ Veterinary Science/ Dentistry sent their applications by the October 15 deadline. The rest of the year group that wish to apply have been sending their applications on an ongoing basis, which will continue to the end of term. Students have been given expert guidance through the PSD programme and through presentations from their Year Leader, Mr. McGrory. Students have also received a great deal of guidance with regard their personal statements from the sixth form team. Hopefully, the majority of our students will have sent their applications by the time the term ends.

Trinity was delighted to welcome the Rotary Club into school during November. The Rotary Club forms part of the interview support students receive in the Sixth Form in support of their job and university applications.





On Monday 29 November, members of the Woodford Rotary Club came into school to carry out practice interviews with our Year 13 students. Some of our Oxbridge candidates and students planning to gain apprenticeships took part in this opportunity. Feedback from students was very positive indeed and the Rotary Club members were full of praise for our students whom they found to be both eloquent and well prepared.

Enrichment Opportunities

Trinity Catholic High School Year 12 **Luminaries Programme**




Aspiring Oxbridge Scholars - The Luminaries Programme

The Luminaries programme has now been launched with Year 12 for this academic year. The group is for students who wish to apply for Medicine/ Dentistry/ Veterinary Sciences, Oxbridge or Russell Group universities. The students have been asked to complete the form to join the group for which they have been sent a link. The purpose of the group is to help the students enhance their applications in autumn 2022. Members of The Luminaries will be sent opportunities that they

can engage with over the course of the academic year. They should certainly undertake our Marathon Reading Challenge to develop academically and to provide materials to enrich their personal statements. They will receive advice from top universities with regard their applications. If possible, we very much hope that we will be able to organise a visit to Oxford next summer.

Marathon Reading Challenge

The Marathon Reading Challenge has been launched with our Year 12 students. The idea of the challenge is that our Year 12 students read 26 non-fiction books to add depth and breadth to their studies and to explore the subject that they are thinking of reading at university. Our students have been directed to a Marathon Reading Challenge website where there are examples



of books to read and even the ability to purchase books! Students can also use the template on there to keep a record of their reading to later showcase within personal statements. Alternatively, they can complete a blog of their reading journey. Students are being provided with advice on how to complete their blogs in a specially arranged blog school that meets regularly. We would encourage all our students to undertake the challenge but it could be particularly important to our Luminaries group who wish to apply for Oxbridge, Medicine/ Dentistry/ Veterinary Sciences or Russell Group universities.



Guardian Angel Programme

Trinity Sixth Form students have a long standing tradition of school support of which we are rightly very proud. One of our students describes her experiences of the Guardian Angel Programme as follows:

'During our time in the sixth form, as students we have the opportunity to participate in a programme called Guardian Angel. Guardian Angel is all about helping and contributing to the school's community, through helping those students who might need

extra support during their classes. Through tasks such as helping the younger student keep on track, to helping them with their work, Guardian Angels are a helpful part of Trinity's community. I was aware of the Guardian Angel Programme when I started Trinity in Year 7. I observed how these sixth form students benefitted the classroom and how the students they helped benefitted too. They were role models to us as younger students. Students benefit in many ways such as a gain in confidence, as the sixth form student might encourage them to answer a question in class or just help them to realise that they do know the answer without the help of the textbook. Personally, I have loved the programme and in particular the opportunity to become a Guardian Angel this year. Even after we were told we didn't have to attend these lessons anymore, I have continued to go. As someone who would like to go into teaching, it gives me first-hand experience of working with people one on one or in little groups. It has helped to develop my confidence when interacting with large groups and understanding how you can help someone to progress in their learning.'



Qualification in Lowland Expedition Leadership

This new course is now running as an enrichment course in curriculum time. We currently have 7 Year 12 students enrolled on this award. They will earn a vocational qualification that will enable them to assist in the running of Duke of Edinburgh

Expeditions. They can also use this award for the skills section for their Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award.



Wellbeing and Sports...

Mindfulness - Sixth Form Yoga

In response to the sixth form wellbeing survey we are delighted to announce that Yoga classes will now be facilitated for students in the sixth form. These will be led by Mrs. Duffy who is a qualified Yoga teacher. Yoga is a type of exercise in which you move your body



into various positions in order to become more fit or flexible, to improve your breathing, and to relax your mind. It is extremely beneficial if you are feeling anxious or low and it helps with all round wellbeing. Whilst practised in a class, yoga is an individual form of exercise, which you take at your own pace. There is no winning or losing, just simple exercise that can be as easy or difficult as you like.

Students are advised that they do not need previous experience to attend. Just bring yourself along wearing some comfortable clothing i.e. leggings/ shorts/ tracksuit bottoms and a T Shirt. You don't need any fancy trainers as yoga is practised without footwear.



The sessions will be held in the Victoria Theatre after school on a Monday, starting on 6 December from 4:05pm to 5:00pm.

Mental Health and Wellbeing

Children and Young People's Mental Health has never been so high on the public agenda. **One in six school aged children has a mental health problem**. This is an alarming rise from one in ten in 2004 and one in nine in 2017 (Source: NHS Digital). It is vital that we have the basic facts if we are to see better mental health for all children, wherever they live, whatever their background or class.

At any one time, a child or young person may be somewhere on a spectrum between healthy and unwell. Many children move along the spectrum at different times. If you have any concerns about your child's mental health,



please contact a member of our Pastoral Team so that we can work with you to support your child. You may also want to seek advice from your local General Practitioner (GP).

Student Surveys

Throughout the last academic year, we conducted **Student Wellbeing Surveys** with all students. These surveys give us invaluable feedback from the students in terms of their own wellbeing. We have reviewed the student responses and have taken action on a number of areas which are highlighted below:

Counselling

For a number of years, the Brentwood Catholic Children's Society (BCCS) has provided counselling for our students in school. We would like to thank the BCCS for their support over the years.

However, from January 2022, we are employing our own full time **School Counsellor**. Mrs Benoit will provide full time support for students within the school. This role will provide 1-2-1 support for students, small group work and in time, working with parents and delivering workshops to support the whole school community.

Notice / Information Boards

We now have dedicated Notice / Information Boards on both sites focused on student wellbeing. These displays allow us to signpost all students to appropriate support for a variety of topics i.e. Counselling both in school and online, The School Nurse, Safer Schools Officer (Metropolitan Police), Bullying and askforhelp@tchs.org.uk.

Emotional Literacy Support Assistants

This year has seen the inception of our **Emotional Literacy Support Assistants** or **ELSA's**. Mrs Mudie and Mrs Francescotti are accessing significant training from the Redbridge Educational Wellbeing Team (REWT) throughout this academic year. The training covers the following areas: Emotional Literacy and Awareness, Active Listening and Communication, Managing Uncomfortable Feelings, Social Skills, Friendship Skills and Bereavement and Loss. As the training rolls out, our ELSA's will begin working with students on a 1-2-1 basis and in small groups.



Anti-Bullying Week

We supported National Anti-Bullying Week 2021 which took place between Monday 15 November and Friday 19 November. This year's theme was 'One Kind Word'. It is coordinated by the Anti-Bullying Alliance, which is based at the leading children's charity 'National Children's Bureau'. They have worked with over 300

children and young people to decide the theme for this year. We talked about different types of bullying and how these are not acceptable. The school adopts a zero tolerance on bullying and has improved ways of reporting bullying for all students. Students are encouraged to report any bullying to their Trusted Adult, or a member of the Pastoral Team. They can also report this via the school website and more recently via our new email address: askforhelp@tchs.org.uk.

Children's Mental Health Week 2022

We are working with Place2Be who are the key delivery partner for Children's Mental Health Week which takes place on 7 -13 February 2022. The theme of this week will be 'Growing Together'. We will be encouraging the students and adults to consider how they grown and how they can help others to grow. Look out for additional information nearer the time.



Personal Development: Extra-curricular

At Trinity there is a vast array of extra-curricular activities happening each and every day available to all students from Year 7 to Year 13.

The Physical Education department have a variety of clubs on each and every day with a high

uptake for all activities. The year started off with clubs such as **football**, **netball** and **rugby** moving to indoor sports during the winter months such as **basketball**, **badminton**, **futsal**, **table tennis**, and **trampolining**. For further details, students should look at the PE notice board or speak to a member of the PE department. The school has participated in many fixtures for both the District and Essex Cup already this year and will continue to do so over the winter months, no more so than the **girls' football team** which has really taken off this year, with the girls competing regularly and performing extremely well.





A staple of extra-curricular activities within the school is the Music department, who are currently busy preparing for the Christmas Carol Concert on Monday 20 December. The **Choir**, **Glee club**, **Orchestra** and **Windband** have been rehearsing weekly since the beginning of term, with **Rock and Pop** rehearsals also starting recently. These groups are very well attended

and showcase an array of talent across all year groups.

Students involved said 'You form relationships with other people across different year groups.' and '(It's) a fun and therapeutic way of escaping a hectic workload that gives a sense of belonging to all students each week.' Finally 'You get to be part of something.'



Also going on at lunchtimes is our **Lego** and **Games clubs**, both of which give students a guiet indoor space to meet up with friends and meet new ones with similar interests. Students enjoy time being creative, enhancing their strategical play and developing social skills. These take place every Tuesday and Thursday lunchtime. One student says 'I love going to these clubs as it gives me somewhere quiet to go, meet with my friends and do a new activity in school with them. I also meet new friends who are in different year groups but have similar interests.'

As a Catholic school, Trinity also has faith groups like the **Tauists**, who meet every Friday lunchtime

in the Lower-Site chapel. This is a chance for students to meet with the Headmaster, talk to him about their day, reflect on those in their lives and the community who may be going through a hard time and to pray for them. One student says 'I love going to Tauists because it makes me feel much better about myself. Also, if someone close to you is

going through a hard time then you can pray for them to get better. It is a fantastic opportunity to talk to the Headmaster and also God. It is a very welcoming club to go to because they give you sweets after it and you can also go to lunch five minutes early. Everybody there is so nice and would do anything for you.' Another student says 'It helps calm you for the rest of the day, you also get a lovely rosary ring and to say a nice prayer.'

There are also dedicated extra-curricular activities for our Sixth Form students. These include basketball, the Medical Society, netball, rugby and yoga. For more detail please see the Sixth Form section of this newsletter.

> Trinity also runs a fully inclusive Duke of

Edinburgh (DofE) Award for Years 9 to 13 from Bronze to Gold level. Bronze was launched to Year 9 this half term, and we are expecting a take up of approximately 140 pupils. The Silver Award currently has 45 pupils from Years 10 and 11 enrolled, and the Gold Award currently has 16 pupils from Years 12 and 13 enrolled. Seven of the Gold Award pupils in Year 12 are also

enrolled onto the Lowland Expedition Assistant Leaders Award, which is a

vocational qualification that teaches them how to assist in leading expeditions. This award is also used for the skills section for the Gold DofE. One student said 'Doing DofE has taught me so much about myself. I have gone so far beyond my comfort zone on several occasions whilst participating in the award. The DofE has been a truly life-changing experience for me.'

Prior to the October half-term holiday, 34 Year 10 students embarked on their journey to Maes Y Lade Outdoor Education Centre in the foothills of

the Black Mountains and Brecon Beacons National Park. This involved students participating in **canoeing**, caving, mountain biking and walking as well as gorge walking. Students also engaged in evening activities such as team building challenges and laser tag. The students had an amazing time, building memories and learning valuable life skills throughout. One student said 'I enjoyed the interaction with the others from my year and in particular peers I rarely talk to. All the activities were a great way to do this and helped with making new friends.'

In the New Year we will be expanding our extra-curricular activity even further and circulating this information to all students and parents. Please see the school website for more details.

Knowledge and power in English

Students of English have been engaging in a wide range of literature texts along with honing their written expression this term. Our rich and varied English journey has started with Year 7 students embarking on an in-depth exploration of the Dystopian genre with the novel *The Hunger Games* where literary themes such as social inequality are discussed. Students have also discovered the timeless nature of good literature through the study of 'The History of English'. An extensive study of the history and evolution of our language has been complemented by the history of storytelling, with students studying - and translating - Beowulf, Chaucer and Shakespeare. This literary timeline provides the perfect foundation for their future studies of canonical and modern literature. *A Christmas Carol* along with a range of Victorian extracts from the literary canon has



brought the Victorian era to life for Year 8 students. Equally, students have studied the importance of social justice and the Catholic ideologies of forgiveness, charity and redemption in these texts by understanding the treatment of the working class, Victorian fears, and the role of the family and the iconic characters of Scrooge, Miss Havisham, Jane Eyre, Dracula and Oliver Twist.




The power of reading continues to be embedded into all aspects of the subject. In English, we want all our students to be able to enjoy the wonders of reading and to flourish in their ability to do so. KS3 students have been paired with sixth form prefects for a lunchtime reading fluency programme. Support and guidance is offered to boost confidence and accuracy when reading aloud. As we approach Christmas, to support our library's Advent Reading Challenge, the English department are gifting our students with a Book Advent Calendar. Every school day in December, KS3 students will be sent a recommended read. We are gifting parents also with some Christmas stocking filler book recommendations!

All the world is a stage again this term where students' study of drama is enhanced by experiencing live performances through Digital Theatre +. Year 9 students have enjoyed the genre of tragedy through Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet* as have Year 10 with *Macbeth* and A Level students with





Othello and modern tragedies such as Death of a Salesman and A Streetcar Named Desire. This wonderful partnership with Britain's leading theatres along with a range of academic reading ensures that diverse characters and themes continue to be brought to life in English classrooms. 
world's best academics.

The role of semantics in the debate of *global warming versus climate change* and the power of words has intrigued students at KS4, where they have been exploring the recent COP26 conference in Glasgow, and the environmental consequences of the decisions made there. Students have engaged in the emotional and intellectual debates engendered by this most urgent of issues, and have been using it to write their own

informed arguments on this topic.

Competitions

We eagerly await the outcome of the poetry competition 'About Us'. Some of our flourishing poets have submitted poems on the theme of connectivity and the universe. In addition to this, University College London are providing an exciting opportunity for our Year 9 students. *UCL Scholars* is a programme that improves students' literacy skills and confidence, and teaches them more about the next steps in their education. The students who have applied to this programme will interact with current UCL students as well as a range of students their own age from across the country.



Hot on the heels of Banned Books Week was National Poetry Day, which we celebrated by sharing some of our favourite poems. Pupils from all year groups volunteered to be filmed in the library for a Reading Period assembly, where they performed their favourite poems and told us why they liked them. We also ran a Book Spine Poetry Competition and were impressed by the many creative entries.
