High levels of attendance are important, right until the end to ensure that pupils do not miss out on key learning.


STUDY SKILL TIPS - Using Flashcards to support revision

The Leitner system is an effective way of using cue cards to increase memory and recall

Flashcards are a simple, yet valuable revision tool and can be used across most subjects. Questions or titles should be written on one side of the card and answers on the other. Students can test themselves, test one another or be tested by friends and family.

Congratulations to our Yr 12 students who successfully completed Stage 1 of the CityZen Award run by the Institute of Civil Engineers





Athletics and Tennis clubs have started well this term with great attendance. Our Year 10 athletes, in particular, are keen to do well and have been working hard on their relay change overs.





SAFEGUARDING SNIPPET

Category A (the most severe) child sexual abuse material discovered online, has doubled in recent years.





Category A: Images involving penetrative sexual activity; images involving sexual activity with an animal, or sadism.

Recent news and media have highlighted an Internet Watch Foundation (IWF) article about 'Extreme' Category A child sexual abuse in which they discover that there has been more Category A child sexual abuse material online than ever before (Webpages containing this have doubled since 2020). They provide warnings over public safety with people "only one click away" from extreme abuse imagery. The IWF says more companies are now signing up to take services to 'clean up' the internet.
