MRS BRENNAN-SMITH'S KS4 PASTORAL UPDATE

What can Parents do to support their child's study habits at KS4?

With Year 11 mocks coming up soon and Year 10 making a fantastic start to the year, it is important that good study routines are put in place. Parents can:

- 1. Provide a suitable learning environment at home: No clutter , Good ventilation, No interruptions, quiet, comfortable, warm room, Books and files to hand, Comfortable chair, Spacious desk/table, Well lit.
- 2. Remove distractions TV, phone, email, music, social media.
- 3. Encourage your child to attend support sessions at lunchtime/after school regularly.
- 4. Ensure they are asking teachers for help if they have identified things of which they are unclear.
- 5. Make sure they have the correct equipment for both their lessons and the exams.
- 6. Check exercise books for targets set and comments on how to improve.
- 7. Provide encouragement and support when they are struggling to study. Break down their study into small chunks as this will be more manageable then feeling they have to learn everything at once.
- 8. Encourage the use of revision guides, workbooks and any other relevant revision material e.g. CDs, websites (<u>www.senecalearning.com</u> for example) at home when they get stuck.
- 9. Encourage a regular routine sleep times, eating etc.
- 10. Agree a timescale together revision timetable (Find time for fun and physical activity!)


EMBEDDING FORMATIVE ASSESSMENT

Our school is participating in a scheme to enhance student progress, supported by the Specialist Schools Academy Trust - centred on addressing misconceptions through the use of Formative Assessment. This project has been extensively trialled and researched in 140 schools with 250,000 students and is proven to increase students' attainment by 25%.

What is formative assessment and how does it work?

It is checking and correcting misconceptions as they occur through frequent questioning and other techniques such as the use of mini white boards during lessons. We follow a philosophy that "all students must participate" and through regular checks, we ascertain the areas which we need to revisit. Students may feel challenged by this - we use a "no hands up" approach to make sure that all contribute which means that we can assess each students' understanding and can tailor activities to best support their progress.

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Spotlight on: HUMANITIES - HISTORY & GEOGRAPH

KS3 History

We welcome the new **Year 7** to history and have started the year in 1066 learning about the death of Edward the Confessor and the contenders to the throne of England.

The students have made a great start writing their own accounts of the Battle of Stamford Bridge. Year 8 have returned to school, all ready to embark on their Year 8 learning journey! We begin the year in 1588, when Elizabeth I became queen, asking ourselves, "What was England like?" This was a year which fell within the Renaissance and students were asked to research this period and create a poster. The response was amazing, and we received some excellent examples of independent learning! Examples of Year 8 We continue this half term learning about the first Elizabethan period. **Renaissance** posters





October is **Black History Month**, and we have some exciting lessons for Key Stage 3. Linked to their learning about the battles for the Kingdom of England, Year 7 will be studying the ancient Kingdoms of West Africa. Year 8, as part of their topic on Elizabethan England, will be using sources to learn about the lives of the Black Tudors. This is based on the research of Miranda Kaufmann, who has written a book called "Black Tudors: The untold story" which brings to life the remarkable

stories of Africans who lived free in Tudor England. Year 9, as part of their studies of World War 1 will be using sources and interpretations to investigate the life of Walter Tull, a pioneering soldier.

We welcomed a large cohort of new Year 10 students to GCSE History this term where we are KS4 Histor undertaking a thematic study of the history of medicine in Britain from the Middle Ages to the present day. Students will learn about the extraordinary developments in science and medicine over a one-thousand-year period and the factors that have both helped and hindered the development of our understanding of disease and methods of treatment. This is a fascinating and challenging topic that will also focus on developing students' skills of historical source analysis.

KS5 History

We have a large uptake of new A level students, which means we have two classes in Year 12. Our Year 13s are currently studying Mid-Tudors Crisis for Paper 1 and Stalin's dictatorship for Paper 2.

They have also commenced their coursework on Civil Rights and Race Relations in the USA, 1850-2009. The History Society is up and running again. Lily P and Sophie M were elected as joint Chairpersons. They will be assisted by Ruby C in her role as secretary. The Society will run every Thursday lunchtime. Initially, the society will discuss the merits of various academic articles and will be open to all year groups. Throughout the year the Society will look for guest speakers and run some engaging workshops.

YEAR 9 RESIDENTIAL TRIP

Our Year 9 boys enjoyed an adventurous week away at Maes Y Lade Outdoor Education Centre at the foot of the Black Mountains in September, engaging in caving, mountain walking, canoeing, mountain biking and gorge walking. All boys had to contribute to the daily running of the house with chores in the morning, which for some was a new experience. The boys faced physical and mental challenges and developed teamwork and resilience.

BRONZE DUKE OF EDINBURGH

The Year 10 students participated in their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award qualifying expedition in Essex Outdoors near Danbury. All students were in a group of between 4 – 7 students and had to carry their own kit, navigate through the Essex countryside, and be self-sufficient in terms of their cooking. We look forward to welcoming lots of the Year 10s onto the Silver Award. As well as the expedition, our students contributed to the community in a range of volunteer activities such as helping at Brownies, litter picking and volunteering at church. They were also required to learn a new skill, such as a new language, coding, photography, cooking and learning an instrument. The physical section ensured our students were engaged in something active outside of their PE lessons.





Fixtures and clubs have started well this term with the introduction of girls rugby club, run by a coach from Woodford RFC. The girls have really enjoyed learning how to pass and move, in a basic game of touch, and our more skilful players who play for a club have helped and encouraged.

Notable results from our fixtures: Year 7 Boys football vs Caterham 4-0, Year 8, 9 and 10 netball vs Woodbridge all won, Year 8 boys football lost to St Bonaventures 5-6 in the Essex Cup.

All students in key stage 3 had a taster lesson for jujitsu with Sensai Michelle Say who runs East London Self Defence Club. Some vital skills were learned to defend and protect in threatening situations.

We are also incorporating group work this year for our Year 11 and 13 exam groups. We realise that students can feel overwhelmed leading up to exams and we will be running group workshops for all exam groups who feel they may benefit from the support.
