A DAY IN THE COURTS: YEAR 13 EXPLORE THE JUSTICE SYSTEM



This week, thirty Year 13 students visited the Royal Courts of Justice and the Old Bailey as part of their studies in Law, Criminology, and Forensic Psychology.

The day began with a guided tour of the Royal Courts of Justice, where students explored the historical roots of British law and gained insight into courtroom procedures and the roles within the justice system. In the afternoon, students observed live cases at the Old Bailey including trials involving bomb hoaxes, murder, and tax evasion offering a powerful and authentic look at real criminal proceedings. The visit was highly impactful, providing aspiring legal, criminology, and forensic psychology students with invaluable firsthand experience and further inspiring their future career ambitions.

FORMER STUDENT INSPIRES TRINITY PUPILS



This week, we welcomed Amie Bailey, a former Trinity student, to speak with pupils across all year groups about her journey into the construction industry. Aime explained how studying GCSE Construction with Mr Law sparked her interest, leading her through college, a BTEC, an HND, and ultimately an apprenticeship with the Chartered Surveyors Training Trust. MAKING A DIFFERENCE: YEAR 10 SUPPORT THE FOODBANK





THE SHARP SYSTEM



At Trinity Catholic High School, the safety and wellbeing of our students is always our top priority. We are proud to launch the SHARP system (School Help Advice Reporting Page) A confidential online platform that empowers students to report concerns and seek support quickly and securely.

The SHARP system allows students to raise issues such as bullying, online safety, hate crime, weapons, health and wellbeing, or any other worries they may have either about themselves or someone else. Reports can be made anonymously, ensuring every student has a voice and a safe way to be heard.

- 3. Explore the dedicated help pages on topics such as bullying, health, hate crime, and community safety.
