



Sixth Form Dress Code

Sixth Form students must be smartly and professionally dressed at all times, reflecting the expectations of a formal working environment.

The dress code is based on formal business attire. The school defines what is considered “smart” according to professional workplace standards and reserves the right to determine whether a student’s appearance meets these expectations. Students who do not comply will be required to change immediately or, if necessary, return home to change before re-joining lessons.

Students must wear business attire, such as a suit or tailored separates, including a smart jacket or blazer with trousers, and an appropriate formal top. Clothing must be professional, well-fitted, clean, and coordinated.

Casual, fashion-led, brightly coloured, or otherwise non-professional clothing is not permitted.

Students are expected to dress with maturity and pride, recognising that their appearance represents the Sixth Form and the wider school community.

If there is any uncertainty about whether an item meets the dress code, students and parents must consult the Head of Year before making any purchases.

Students must wear their own identity card on their lanyard, clearly visible at all times on school premises. ID cards and lanyards must not be swapped, shared, or replaced with those of another student.

A formal jacket or blazer must be worn at all times while on school premises, including in the common room, during lessons, when moving around the site, and while travelling to and from school. Jackets may only be removed with prior permission, either due to weather conditions or at a teacher’s discretion during a lesson.

<p>Students <u>must</u> wear a formal, smart collared shirt.</p> <p>A formal tie must be worn with collared shirts and top button done up.</p> <p>Alternatively, a smart, formal blouse may be worn.</p> <p>Colours: Shirts and blouses must be in suitable business colours that are plain or subtly patterned (for example, a fine pinstripe or light check only).</p> <p>Short or long sleeves, tucked into trousers.</p>	<p>Bright colours, excessive patterns or prints. <p>Hair and Make Up.</p> <p>Dyed hair must be natural in colour.</p> <p>Hair accessories (pins, hairbands and headbands) should be plain in colour and discreet in size.</p> <p>Make-up should be discreet and suitable for a professional learning environment.</p>	<p>Excessive or dramatic make-up</p>

Other Notes:

Sixth Form students are expected to follow the dress code at all times (other than specified non-school uniform days) while on the school premises, travelling to and from Sixth Form, and during out-of-school events or on trips that are organised by the school, or where they are representing the school (only if required).

Students who do not adhere to the Sixth Form dress code, including expectations around clothing, hair, and makeup, will not be allowed to attend lessons or take part in Sixth Form activities until the issue is resolved.

In cases where students arrive at Sixth Form in clothing that does not meet the dress code, and it is not possible to resolve the issue on site, they will be asked to return home to change. Parents or guardians will be informed the first time this occurs. The Sixth Form team will provide support and guidance to help students meet expectations and avoid repeated issues. Ongoing non-compliance with the dress code may lead to a formal review of the student's place in the Sixth Form.

Any further decisions regarding the suitability of students' dress or other aspects of their appearance (including jewellery, hairstyles, makeup, etc.) will be at the discretion of their Heads of Year and/or Director of Sixth Form, whose decision is final.

Students must not wear or use headphones, AirPods, or other electronic devices while moving around the site or when communicating with others. These items must not be visible, as they are not considered appropriate for a professional learning environment. Students must engage fully with their surroundings and peers at all times.

Jackets and blazers must be worn while walking to lessons around the school site. They must also be worn during lessons unless your teacher gives you explicit permission to remove them.

Tattoos must be covered at all times and should not be visible while on school premises.

Face masks are only permitted with approved medical documentation.

Students' hairstyles must be neat and appropriate for a professional learning environment. Hair should not obscure the face or eyes. In line with the Halo Code, our Sixth Form fully supports and celebrates the right of all students to wear Afro-textured hair in any suitable style. Any concerns regarding hairstyle suitability will be addressed with sensitivity and respect.

To maintain a consistent and professional dress code, headwear is not permitted unless it is worn for religious, cultural, or medical reasons. This includes hats, baseball caps, beanies, bandanas, and similar items.

Where headwear is worn for religious reasons, it must be plain and in line with the Sixth Form's smart dress expectations.

Durags, bandanas, caps, or any non-religious head coverings are not permitted on school premises. This is to maintain a professional appearance in line with the Sixth Form's formal business dress code and to ensure consistency and equality across all students.

On non-uniform days, students are expected to dress in a manner that is appropriate to an educational setting. The Head of Year and/or Director of Sixth Form have discretion to address any unsuitable attire, and students may be sent home to change if necessary.

Students who wish to request an amendment to the uniform policy in relation to their protected characteristics should contact the Director of Sixth Form.
