Dear Student, Parents, Carers & Governors

Once again, it has been a busy and productive week at Trinity.

Earlier this week, I wrote to you following a serious incident in the local area which involved the filming and sharing of inappropriate content. While the incident itself was concerning, it has prompted important reflection and clear lessons for us all as a school community.

One lesson stands out. When content is shared online, control is lost almost immediately. Images and videos move far beyond their original context. They invite comment, distortion and harm. This affects individuals and it affects the wider school community. These realities must be understood by our young people and addressed by us as adults.



Social media often moves faster than we realise. Many children receive hand-me-down phones from home, yet these devices still provide full access to powerful platforms. Our students often use this technology with greater speed and confidence than expected. They navigate apps, hidden folders and privacy settings with ease. Content spreads in seconds, and harm spreads with it.

I have been genuinely pleased by the number of parents who contacted me this week to say thank you for feeling confident to check their child's phone. Many shared how helpful this was at home. It is worth reminding our students of a simple truth. It is not their phone. You bought the device and you pay the

bill. Parental oversight is not an invasion. It is responsibility.

As a school, and in line with Department for Education expectations, we will now take a firmer stance on the use of smartphones. National guidance is clear that schools should be mobile-phone-free environments by default. Recent events have reinforced the importance of this direction.

Over the next few weeks, we will be reviewing our mobile phone policy in detail. We will gather evidence, reflect on lessons learned, and consider what best supports safety, wellbeing and learning. We will then present our findings and clear next steps to students, staff, parents and carers

The message remains simple. School and home must work together. Clear boundaries protect young people. Consistent expectations support families. Together, we can change the narrative around mobile phone use and strengthen the safety of our whole community.

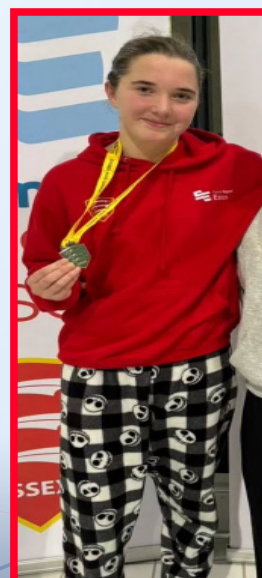

The SHARP system allows students to raise issues such as bullying, online safety, hate crime, weapons, health and wellbeing, or any other worries they may have either about themselves or someone else. Reports can be made anonymously, ensuring every student has a voice and a safe way to be heard.
