In Citizenship the examinations will cover the following areas:

Paper One:

1 Hour 45 minutes 80 marks Worth 50% of GCSE

Section A- Theme A: Living together in the UK.

Section B -Theme B: Democracy at work in the UK

Section C-Theme C: Law and justice.

Section D Extended-response questions related to Themes A–C.

Paper Two:

1 Hour 45 minutes 80 marks Worth 50% of GCSE

Section A- Theme E -Questions relate to your own Citizenship action and reflecting on what you did

Section B- Theme D: Power and Influence- using a source to comment on others' actions

Section C Theme D: Power and influence. One question will also link to content in one of Themes A–C

Revision tips:

Memory is engaged when students are required to think.

Do not:

Simply read over the material. This will not help you remember it.

Highlight lots of text, this gives you a feeling that you are learning it when in fact you are not.

Type up lots of notes.

Revise for hours at a time on the same topic.

Do:

Transform the notes.

Use flashcards to revise key terms in each theme

Create pictures to represent the material.

Produce flashcards. The process of doing this helps you to learn it.

Get others to test you using the flash cards.

Prioritise - chose the three key points to learn for a given topic.

Go through exemplar answers given in class and learn the rules of how to approach each question.

Watch the news and read newspapers about current events especially for Themes B and D.

Focus on longer answers and ensuring you look at both sides of the argument. Use past papers to attempt questions.
