# About Whickham School and Sports College

#### The School

Whickham School is a large and successful school in Gateshead with around 1600 pupils including over 250 in the Sixth Form. Standards are high and in the 2019 GCSE exams, 79% of pupils achieved a 4+ in English and 78% achieved 4+ in Maths.

Our Sixth Form is very successful with 50% of pupils attaining a A\*-B grade in the 2019 A Level exams. Our average Value Added score over the last 3 years is +0.27 meaning that students on average gain over a quarter of a grade better in each of their A Level qualifications than in a national average Sixth Form. Our vocational performance is ever stronger with an average of +0.56 meaning that performance is over half a grade better in each subject.

#### Ofsted

Our March 2018 Ofsted inspection reflects that we are a good school who 'recognise the importance of examination results as well as the development of pupils' characters.'

'Relationships between staff and pupils are positive and founded on mutual respect.'

'The Headteacher leads by example. He is uncompromising in his desire for all pupils to succeed.'

'Pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural awareness is developed very effectively.'

'When asked by an inspector to describe the best thing about coming to this school, one pupil responded by saying that 'you can be who you want to be and you do not get judged by others.'

#### **School Organisation**

Demand for pupil places is strong and the school is regularly oversubscribed. Pupils are organised into year groups whilst eight faculties deliver the school curriculum. The Sixth Form, which has its own dedicated facilities, is an increasingly popular choice of pupils from all over the region.

The school achieved Academy status in September 2011.

The Leadership Team meet weekly and share responsibility for policy generation, decision making, planning and the general wellbeing of the school. The relevant governing body committee is involved in strategic planning and policies from the onset. Faculty and Year groups meet every two weeks to discuss strategic issues.

#### **The Governing Body**

The governing body is enthusiastic and active and they bring a wide range of experiences and skills derived from their diverse employment in commerce, industry and education.

The relationship between the senior management team and the governing body has evolved into one which enables open and frank discussion to take place on school issues. The introduction of more linked governors to specific school subject areas has improved governor involvement and awareness of issues and priorities. Strengths and weaknesses are discussed freely.

The relationship between the governing body and staff is one of mutual trust and openness. The governing body endeavours to provide support as well as challenge and to become actively involved in all school matters. We consider the governing body to be part of the school management team and to support the school in its quest to maximise all pupil achievements in a happy interesting and safe environment.

# Whickham School 2020-21 Curriculum Summary

At Whickham School, we aim to provide a broad and engaging curriculum that enables pupils to fulfil their talents and interests, whilst gaining the knowledge and skills needed to succeed in your further studies, training and employment. High quality information and guidance is provided to help pupils navigate their pathways through the courses on offer.

A strong foundation is provided at Key Stage 3 where pupils follow a broad and balanced curriculum comprising the following subjects: Science, Mathematics, English, Modern Languages, Geography, History, RE, Technology, ICT, Art and Design, Music, Religious Studies and Citizenship.

Pupils are allocated to mixed ability tutor groups. Much of the teaching in Key Stage 3 take place in mixed ability groups although we set by ability in Mathematics and, from Year 9, English.

During Year 9 pupils will be supported in choosing their optional subjects for Key Stage 4. In Years 10 and 11 pupils follow a two-year programme of GCSE and BTEC (vocational) subjects. Pupils choose from a wide variety of different courses across many different subject areas. In addition to the core academic subjects that pupils study, and the opportunity to complete the "English Baccalaureate", we have an extensive range of highly successful creative and vocational courses that enable us to engage all pupils in making strong progress.

The school has a strong AEN department that provides additional support to encourage academic progress at all key stages.

The breadth of choice continues into the Sixth Form, with large numbers of pupils selecting from over 35 different A Level and BTEC National courses.

Whickham School is alive with activities that offer pupils the opportunity to broaden their interests and experience:

- Physical Education is highly prominent with a wide range of interests catered for. Our sports leadership programme is particularly strong
- The Performing Arts are also considerable strengths in the school. The school puts on a number of productions each year including an annual musical which plays to packed houses for a week. The school band and drama groups perform at various prestige events.
- Educational visits and exchanges are organised for pupils of all ages.



We hope you are looking forward to starting your first year at Whickham School. In the Maths department our aim is to further develop you as masters in Maths!

We will build on all of the skills you acquired at primary school through lots of problem solving and reasoning activities, in a variety of forms. We like to mix it up, encouraging you to work together, use card sorts, complete treasure hunts and complete captain activities - just to name a few.

We are really interested in the 'why it works' in Maths, not just the method and you will be given lots of opportunity for discussion and sharing ideas - all of which we welcome. We aim to build confidence and challenge you to think deeper and make connections between topics.

You will have eight lessons of Maths per fortnight and in Year 7 the main topics covered are place value, directed numbers (you might know this as negative numbers), fractions and algebra.

Once a fortnight you will have a problem of the fortnight lesson, where you will work on a longer problem for the whole lesson and be expected to hone in on those skills developed, working independently or in small groups and to reason in your answers and findings. These lessons are very popular with our current students, and we are confident you will enjoy them just as much.

All we require from you is to try your best - be resilient, independent and responsible. In a nutshell; 'be the BEST you can be', and we promise to provide fun lessons, homework and support all to allow you to do this! See you in September :)

# extra opportunities

- Every day we have a Maths homework club that runs as a drop in supported by staff in the department. Come here for help with homework, or just to work on it with friends, as many days as you like.
- During your weekly tutor time numeracy session there will be a challenge question available.
- Look out for the weekly problem on the projector in the atrium!
- Other exciting external trips may come up, for example, a selection of our current Year 7 and 8 students had the opportunity to visit the Centre for Life for a day of Maths. Activities included an Astronavigation show in the planetarium, an exploration of the topology of Mobius strips and roller coasters through the medium of bagels, and an investigation of modular numbers through the medium of card tricks. When these opportunities arise, places go fast so be sure to get your consent form returned quickly.



Year 7 begins with *Me, Myself and I: Autobiography*, an exciting unit where you will reflect on your own journey so far, giving thanks for your family, friends and experiences, hearing from others about their own journeys and transforming this into writing.

This develops into our first novel at Whickham School, *Coraline* by Neil Gaiman. This is a challenging, wonderfully written and imaginative fantasy tale. Reading out loud is absolutely encouraged in our classrooms!

In *A World of Words: History of English*, you will learn about the development of English from invasions and loan words, to accent and dialect through to neologisms and what the future of English may hold, producing persuasive writing on attitudes to the way people speak.

The final unit of the year is *Literary Legends*. We study prose and poetry of Charles Dickens, William Blake and Elizabeth Barrett Browning and get all theatrical in our study of Shakespeare, learning about the playwright's craft.

One hour per fortnight is dedicated to Accelerated Reading in the library and this is encouraged at home too. We get a bit competitive here, with classes competing to see who can read the most, and a pizza party for the winning class each term.

## extra opportunities

Throughout the year, there will be many opportunities to get involved in extracurricular reading activities. For example, World Book Day sees a fancy dress competition, literary book hunt and class activities. You can also see other options as part of the Drama schedule which will help to support your English passions and talents.

In P.E. we will be building on the fundamental skills that you have developed at Primary school. During Year 7 this will be delivered

through a range of activities such as football, netball, rugby, basketball, gymnastics, dance, athletics and cricket.

Within each of these activities we will look to develop your physical ability so that you have the necessary skills to perform with confidence and enjoyment.

Your aim should be to develop six different multi abilities to ensure success in PE:

- Physical Acquire and develop performance skills.
- Cognitive Select and apply skills, tactics in a range of sports.
- Creative Select and apply compositional ideas in dance and gymnastics.
- Social Evaluate and improve performance (self and peer assessment).
- Health and Fitness Develop knowledge and understanding of fitness and health.
- Personal Demonstrate a desire to improve.

Hopefully, this will inspire you to attend the various extra-curricular P.E. clubs on offer, inspiring you to value physical activity and the contribution it makes towards leading a healthy, active lifestyle.



- In P.E. we offer a range of activities for those seeking competitive fixtures against other schools and for those looking to play recreational sport for enjoyment.
- Most of our curriculum-based sports have a school team that you could represent.
- In Year 7 you will also be given the opportunity to represent your tutor group in an interhouse competition. This will run during lunchtimes and offers competitions across a range of sports.
- We also run an 'Active lunch' recreational programme, where you can play sport with your friends during your lunch break.

We hope you are looking forward to having specialist art lessons at Whickham. We have a whole floor of amazing specialist art rooms right at the top of the new school building and we think you will really enjoy the calm, creative atmosphere we have there. Don't worry if you aren't confident about your art skills! Your art teachers are brilliant at showing you how to improve your artmaking, but we do expect you to try your best and not be put off if you don't get it the first time. We will be working on a number of projects across the year, all designed to help you improve your skills and understanding of art.

- We will study the work of different artists to inform our ideas.
- You will get the opportunity to use a whole range of materials including pencil, paint, clay and fabrics (Textiles) and mixed media
- You will be given regular feedback in your sketchbooks to help you improve the Developing, Refining, Recording and Presenting of your ideas.
- You will be given homework which could include research, drawing or responding to feedback.

You will need your equipment pack and your sketchbook in every lesson. (Both can be ordered from the school).

You only need to take your sketchbook home when you have homework to complete.

# Art

#### EXTRA OPPORTUNITIES

- There will be an Art club that takes place after school one night during the week, time TBA. We will create Christmas Arts and Crafts, African Drums and posters exploring themes such as Cultural Diversity and Equality, Anti Bullying and Knife Crime to name but a few.
- But, if you are struggling with your homework, or just want to do something creative during lunchtimes, as a release from the pressure of the school day, you are more than welcome to work in art rooms with your teacher at lunchtimes or use the after school art club to help you.

In Year 7 Drama you will start with introductory skills as students will arrive from KS2 with varying levels of dramatic experience. You will participate in fun group activities to support confidence building with your peers and on stage. You will be working towards being able to completing the following skills:

- Group work Contribution, Directing, Supportive, teamwork.
- Techniques & Conventions Skills linked to different styles of Drama for impact on the audience.
- Voice
   Projecting appropriate voices for a character.

 Movement Using body language to express a character.

- Character Creating roles that are consistent and engaging.
- Analysis & Evaluation
   Discuss how drama is constructed
   and judge its effectiveness.

Drama will encourage you to use your artistic creativity and will involve the creation of imagined characters and situations which you will enact within a safe space. You will recreate situations using other perspectives to reach new and exciting conclusions.

# OPPORTUNITIES

There is a wealth of extra-curricular activities happening each week in the Drama Department for you to get involved with. We have annual whole school productions which have previously included: Little Shop of Horrors, The Wizard of Oz, Oliver, Beauty and the Beast. Looserville and Grease. A Drama club runs once a week which is currently open to all Key Stage 3 students on a Friday after school.

In music you will learn all you need to know to become a fully fledged musician. This will include learning about music notation (the language of music) how to compose (create music) and how to play various instruments such as the keyboard, guitars and drum kit.

# OPPORTUNITIES

There are instrumental lessons that are available to pupils at Whickham School and information about how they work will be sent home to you in due course. As the year progresses there will be opportunities for you to join in with. This will include the school wind band, rock band, vocal groups and more. Keep an eye on the bulletin when you join the school for all the information you need!

# History

Throughout KS3, you will build the skills and knowledge to deepen your understanding of this amazing subject. History at Whickham broadly follows a chronological approach. From the Anglo-Saxons through to the upheavals of the 20th Century, you will study many fascinating periods and event. History in Year 7 will begin by looking at the question, 'How dark were the dark ages?' We will explore the period following the collapse of Roman control through to the arrival of the Normans in 1066. From here we will look at how the Normans gained control of England, and go on to examine how various groups in society experienced the Medieval period in different ways.

In term two you will explore the Crusades answering the question, 'Did people go on Crusades simply to get in to heaven'.

Much of history is focused around debates and as such, each half term will look at a different enquiry question. As well as looking at key periods in history, it is also useful to look at how much things have changed over time. To do this, we also focus on one key area and track this over a long period of time. In Year 7, you will focus on change over time through studying public health from the Romans through to the 20th Century. Finally, in term three we will examine the Early Modern period with a particular emphasis on the War of the Roses.

# EXTRA OPPORTUNITIES

History is a subject where you can explore far and wide. Our homeworks often focus on independent research and this year we launched a book club and plans are afoot for a KS3 History club.



Geography at Whickham aims to give you the tools to explain the world around you. In Year 7 this will take a thematic approach where a series of stand-alone topics will be studied and then brought together in Years 8 and 9 to explain the geography of places, such as the Democratic Republic of Congo, Haiti and Russia.

The first theme in Year 7 looks at place and location and how they are represented through maps. To do this we will firstly look at representations of places on the Earth and how they have changed through time. We will then focus upon how places are located on maps and the detail that maps can illustrate about a place. This will be followed by our second theme exploring the value of rivers to a society and how rivers, through their journey from source to mouth, shape the land that they travel through. After this, our

third theme focuses on development and asks why a gap between the most and least developed countries exists? Lessons will then evaluate attempts by countries and organisations to close the gap. The next theme looks a topic that is of importance to an island nation like Great Britain - the coast. We will explore how the landforms along the coastline of Great Britain have been created and finish by looking at whether battling the forces that create the coastline can be managed or not. Year 7 in Geography will conclude by asking whether Malthus, a cleric and economist writing at the end of the 19th Century, was right to suggest that population growth would outstrip resources available and ultimately decline through famine, disease and pestilence.

EXTRA OPPORTUNITIES

There is Geography in everything that each of us does every day. Extra-curricular activities in Geography will reflect this. There will be Geography club open to Year 7 that will focus upon student activism for climate change and other environmental issues, such as palm oil. There will also be opportunities to explore topics in greater detail by listening to podcasts, watching documentaries and reading books that are linked to the topics being studied in Year 7. Finally, and most importantly, Geography is also about applying what is learnt in the classroom to the world outside. There will be opportunities for fieldwork and research of places linked to topics being studied to show that the world is a 'messier' place than neat theories explored in the classroom suggest.



In Year 7 we will explore lots of different aspects of the world around us - we look at the ideas of people who follow the main religions in the world and those who have no faith, through moral issues and big questions. We definitely ask more questions than we have answers!

We will start off looking at ultimate questions; it's an introduction to the way people think and the big questions that the world has. This can be everything from "does God exist?" to "what is the best part of a fork?"

We will then, over the next 2 terms, look at Islam and Judaism, their beliefs and practices and we can compare and contrast these 2 Abrahamic faiths, as well as how they approach moral questions such as "should we eat meat?" and "How can we protect the environment?"

#### Extra opportunities

There are religious and moral issues all around us. We have an "RE in the news" board which we will update weekly and you will have plenty of time to discuss these issues in tutor time.

There is also a KS3 debating society starting in September in which you can discuss any issues that interest you! We always look at both points of view. It's great for both building up skills to help your written work but also if you like getting stuck into a good argument!



In Year 7 ICT you will learn new skills and also build on the skills you have acquired through KS2. You will work on a range of different topics which will improve your confidence in the subject. These topics, delivered with real world examples, have an aim to prepare you for when you leave school. You will work independently and in groups on learning the following topics:

- Being safe online.
- Working remotely on cloud applications.
- Programming multiple different languages including Scratch or Small basic.
- Spreadsheet creation and understanding.

The homework you complete will be contributing towards your iDEA bronze award, which is an industry recognised award which helps you stand out from the crowd.

#### iDEA - (Inspiring Digital Enterprise Award). The aim of this is to develop digital, enterprise and employability skills for free. Feel free to read up about this at: www.idea.org.uk/about

The more our world relies on technology, it is even more important that you are introduced to and are confident in key topic areas to ensure you are prepared for the future.



#### EXTRA OPPORTUNITIES

Activities include code clubs, where you will fine tune your coding skills to work independently on tasks/games. One website we use is https://code.org/. Why not give it a go so you have a head start for September?

We have recently signed up to Amazon Web Services (AWS) to encourage girls aged 12-13 to consider a career in tech. This involves workshops delivered by Amazon with the aim of competing in an app-building competition to solve real issues faced by their school or community.



#### Y7 DT Food Technology overview:

In Year 7 Food Technology you will be introduced to the methods, equipment and appliances that will allow you to plan and produce food dishes safely and hygienically in the kitchen. You will develop your confidence in the following practical areas:

- Using the oven using the hob, main oven and top oven for boiling, baking and grilling safely.
- Using small appliances using hand blenders for a variety of hot and cold dishes.
- Using knives using knives to develop precise and accurate cutting, chopping and garnishing.

You will also investigate why the food we eat is important for our bodies and the world around us. You will look at what influences our food choices by exploring the principles of nutrition for a healthy diet whilst considering the impact of food miles and seasonality on the environment.

Food Technology will enable you to apply principles of healthy eating to your own diet and the diet of others when cooking a range of foods at school and at home. You will learn how to use your creativity to make food exciting and imaginative when feeding yourself and others!

#### Y7 DT Product Design overview:

In Year 7 Product Design you will start to build up your confidence and skills in a workshop environment across a range of projects. In Year 7 there is a focus on timbers. You will learn how to use both hand tools and machines in a safe manner while creating a boat, a Block head inspired by a film character and an animal themed pencil holder. You will develop your presentation skills by drawing design ideas from one point perspective and isometric while adding tone and shade. Students will learn the whole design process from start to finish- analysing a brief, understanding the wants and needs of a client, product specification, product analysis, initial designs, design development and evaluation. Design Technology allows you to build your creativity, problem solving, mathematical, communication and organisation skills.

#### Extra opportunities

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Formula 24 Green Power Race Team - Friday after school. Students are manufacturing a car from scratch, they have made the parts and wiring to race.



# Modern Foreign Languages

#### We hope you are excited and ready to learn a new language at Whickham School!

Year 7 Modern Foreign Languages begins with greetings, introductions and exchanging information so there's no need to worry if you have studied a different language in primary school as you will be able to take part in spontaneous conversations very quickly!

The rest of Modern Foreign Languages covers a variety of topics such as My Family, Pets and other Animals, Food and Drink, My House and Area and My School, Appearance and Personality, Music and TV.

For each topic you will learn a range of new vocabulary which will allow you to ask questions and give opinions with reasons as well as learning about German and French culture and the way of life.

Each half term you will cover all four skills which are Listening, Reading, Speaking and Writing so that you feel confident communicating in different ways. As well as these four fundamental skills, you will also improve your level of vocabulary and understanding of grammar using online platforms such as Memrise, Quizlet and Languages Online. Learning about the culture of French and German speaking countries is very important and is something that is covered throughout the year including European Day of Languages, a francophone Christmas, Gastronomy and Bastille Day, Oktoberfest and Carnival . We will study a French film called 'Les Choristes' to help us with the My School topic and in German we will study post war history with a film 'das Wunder von Bern'.

Learning a new language is all about having the confidence to make mistakes and giving things a go. We're looking forward to meeting you in September and hearing you speak some wonderful new Languages!

#### EXTRA OPPORTUNITIES

For extra curricular activities there will be a French and German café later in the year where you can put your knowledge of Food and Drink to good use by ordering some authentic French and German cuisine!

As well as this, you could be nominated for Linguist of the Lesson by your teacher and there will be regular Quizlet and Memrise competitions throughout the year to see who has learned the most vocabulary.





In Year 7 Science, you will build on your scientific knowledge gained at KS2.

The biggest difference is that we have labs where you will get the opportunity to do some exciting experiments!

At the start of the year, you will be taught how to think like a scientist and how to work safely in a laboratory, which is extremely important.

You will follow a course that is supported by an online resource called *Kerboodle Activate*, so if you are at home you are never stuck for information.

In Year 7 you will learn about different aspects of Chemistry, Physics and Biology.

You will start with "Working Scientifically", which gets you to think like a scientist and develops your skills of collecting and analysing data, designing experiments and interpreting and evaluating results. You will go on to study about cells, the structure and function of body systems and reproduction!

In Chemistry, you will learn about particles, atoms and elements, acids and alkalis and some chemical reactions. In physics, you will learn about forces, sound, light and space.

What is most important to us at Whickham School is that you enjoy science, have some fun and that you always try your best!

### OPTIONAL EXTRAS

We hold an exciting STEAM club which allows you to explore and investigate why science plays such an important part of everyday life and gives you the opportunity to investigate your own scientific questions.

There are also opportunities for you to take part in various external STEAM activities such as the amazing Marine Engineering workshop run by the Sea Cadets which explores the fundamentals of buoyancy and why things float.

Our leading edge projects run by the University of Newcastle gives you the opportunity to work on a lab based research project in a real university laboratory. This not only is a lot of fun but it gives you an insight of what it would be like to work as a scientist as a career or as a graduate.

# Cashless Catering: Biometric

#### The system works in the following way:

- Pupils are enrolled onto the system.
- Enrolling means the computer software will take a digital image of your child's finger and turn it into numbers (not the actual finger print image) which are stored on the school server.
- Every time your child's finger image is re-read a number is generated. This is unique to your child.
- Pupils will pay in advance for their lunches by using the pay-in point outside the dining hall.
- Pupils are identified at the till from their finger image, and the cost of their meal taken off their account.
- Your child will not need to remember to bring anything with them to the dining hall.
- It can be cheaper because pupils will never need to replace a lost or damaged card.
- Parents can pay for school meals using a credit or debit card online using ParentPay, meaning that pupils don't need to bring money into school.

As we hold personal data about your child we must provide you with a Fair Processing Notice. We are meeting the requirements of the Data Protection Act because:

- 1. The finger image data will only be used by the school and not passed to anyone else.
- 2. The data is safe and secure on our school server.
- 3. When your child leaves Whickham School the data will be destroyed.

# Free School Meals - Are You Entitled?

#### How can my children receive school meals?

Your child, or children, may qualify for free school meals if you are able to meet the following criteria:

You or your partner must have a child or children for whom you receive child benefit who is in full time education, under 19 years of age and who attends a local authority school or sixth form.

You and your partner must be in receipt of one of the following benefits:

- Income Support.
- Income Based Job Seekers Allowance (JSA IB).
- Guarantee Pension Credit.
- Employment and Support Allowance (ESA Income Related).
- Child Tax Credit but not Working Tax Credit and your income for Tax Credit purposes must be less than £16,190.00 (details are shown on your Tax Credit award notice).
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit.
- Universal Credit.

If this applies to you, please pick up a Free School Meals Application Form available at the School Office or for more information please contact school.

# **ParentPay** -Our online Payment Service

We're pleased to inform you that the school has the facility to accept online payments for school meals, trips and other school activities. Using a secure website called Parentpay you will be able to pay online using your credit or debit card.

Parentpay is easy-to-use and will offer you the freedom to make online payments whenever and wherever you like, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week- safe in the knowledge that the technology used is of the highest internet security available and that funds will reach school safely.

Parents will have a secure online account, activated using a unique username and password; making a payment using your credit or debit card is straightforward and no card details are stored on the system or are accessible by the school or Parentpay.

When you make a payment, an e-mail confirmation is sent to you, giving you reassurance that the transaction has been successful and Parentpay will hold an electronic record of all online payments for you to view at a later date.

Within Parentpay you will be able to access the extended facilities which allow parents to view the catering menu offers week by week, and to also view what your son/daughter has purchased each day.



You will also be able to view trip payments and balances and set reminders if you are paying in instalments for any of your purchases. In addition, Parentpay offers you the ability to set automated email/SMS reminders ensuring you never miss a payment.

An account activation username and password will be sent out to you from the school before your son/ daughter starts in September. You will be prompted to change these and to keep your new username and password safe and secure. Full details on how to activate your account and start making payments will be included.

Please look out for our new On-line Shop. The shop facility can be accessed - without logging in - from the "Parents" tab on the school's website. Items available to purchase from the On-line Shop will include starter packs and ties.

# **Attendance Matters**

Whickham School offers an exceptional learning environment where pupils are happy and want to attend.

Attendance is one of the most important elements in what makes a successful pupil.

We actively celebrate excellent attendance with termly prizes and annual certificates. Whickham pupils should be proud of their achievements and understand the significance attendance has on their further education and future employment choices.

However the real prize is the impact it has on their GCSE results clearly illustrated (right):


At Whickham school we expect our pupils to attend at **least 98%** of the time. This equates to no more than 4 days of absence across an academic year.

If your child is sick, you have a legal requirement to inform school on each day of absence. You can call the school's absence line on **0191 496 0026** to speak to a member of staff or leave a message clearly stating the reason for absence. Just reporting that your child as 'poorly' or 'under the weather' is not enough, please let us know the reason/condition that is preventing school attendance.

If you fail to inform the school, we are legally required to make contact with you or any other named contact.

Wherever possible, all non-emergency appointments should be made out of school hours. Where appointments are made during school hours, there is an expectation that your child attends school before and after the appointment to minimise lost learning.

**Chances of Success at GCSE** 



All appointments must be substantiated by evidence.

Examples of medical evidence include: Doctor's notes, prescriptions, labels from prescribed medication obtained during the period of absence, appointment letters/cards and referral letters.

Without these documents, we are unable to authorise absences.

As a school we are required to follow legal processes and have statutory duties and expectations from the Local Authority. Legal proceedings can continue across academic years, so if attendance is poor and unauthorised at the end of the year, monitoring and referrals will continue into the new academic year in September.

We work very hard with our pupils and families to avoid legal proceedings and communication is the key to a successful relationship with school.

We look forward to working together to ensure that your child succeeds and thrives at Whickham School.

Our strategy to ensure attendance expectations are met fall into five stages.

Whilst we will always include cumulative attendance percentages on all correspondence with parents/ carers, our strategy is based on the number of days of absence in relation to the maximum achievable attendance in an academic year.

Should your child become too poorly to attend school, please ensure that you call the school absence line by 9am; you must call every day of your child's absence. Please take a moment to read the following guide to common illnesses and the anticipated impact they may have on your child's attendance:

## Leave Of Absence Requests

We review LOA requests on a case by case basis, but as a general rule we do not approve leave of absence, unless there are exceptional circumstances.

Forms can be found on our website or online form and sent to the Attendance Officer, **Ms M Tillett-Hayes.** 

Response to requests will be sent via Text Message.

Unauthorised absences can result in Legal Intervention and the possible issue of a 'fixed penalty notice' of  $\pm$ 60 per parent carer which rises to  $\pm$ 120 if not paid within 21 days.

The school is extremely thorough when investigating prolonged absences. We trust our parents to be honest with us and inform us of planned absences and holidays, no matter the potential outcome.

LOA requests should be submitted at least 4 weeks in advance to allow pupils to plan around missed work.

The average academic year is 190 days long, please make every day count. Wherever possible please use weekends and holidays for everything else.



#### **Punctuality**

Punctuality is an essential life skill which transfers into adulthood. We expect our pupils to be in school on time, every day.

The first bell rings at 08:35 allowing 5 minute movement time before pupils should be at their classrooms and ready to take their seats at 08:40. It is expected that all pupils are inside the school gates before 08:35. Arriving late results in lost learning.

Pupils arriving late two or more times in a week will be required to stay for a twilight after school detention until 5pm.

Please encourage your child to get a good night's sleep and take responsibility for setting their own alarm.

Whickham is a busy area, so please factor in the traffic. It's better to be early than late.

#### **Home Visits**

Home visits can be made to check on the wellbeing of a pupil for one of the following reasons:

- No contact for the absence of a pupil
- School refusal
- Poor Attendance
- Long term illness support
- Safeguarding concerns

Home visits are part of our continued support of pupils and their families.

#### **Frequently Asked Questions**

#### Parent: My child is just having an 'off day' so I'm not sending him/her in'

**School:** Having sporadic days off school can quickly add up. We always want to encourage pupils to attend, sometimes getting out of bed, showering and putting on a uniform is all it takes to feel a little better. Coming to school on days when you don't really feel like it can make a big difference. We will always send pupils home if they are genuinely unwell.

#### Parent: My child was sick over the weekend, should I keep him/her at home?

**School:** We don't have a fixed 48hr rule for diarrhoea and sickness. If your child has had an isolated incident and is feeling better, please send them to school.

#### Parent: I have received an attendance letter and I do not like the tone.

**School:** We're sorry you feel that way but we have to state facts and legal information to make things clear. Each correspondence forms part of a possible legal intervention and must leave no ambiguity.

#### Parent: I can't provide medical evidence because it's impossible to get a GP appointment.

**School:** Wherever possible, we will request medical evidence. If your child is off for 4 consecutive days, we will expect a GP visit. If your child has had several shorter absences for the same condition, we will also expect a GP visit. Medical evidence makes the difference between authorised absence and unauthorised absence. We do not pursue legal intervention where medical evidence is provided. It's as important for you as it is for us.

## Parent: I do not like being challenged regarding my child's absences and reserve the right to make the decision as to whether my child is well enough to attend school.

**School:** We are sorry you feel that way but please bear in mind that our team are simply doing their jobs in complying with school rules and statutory guidance. It's not personal and ultimately we can offer a multitude of support to help your child's attendance improve and safeguard their future success. Remember, we care.

#### Parent: Why do I have to tell you the details when my child is unwell?

**School:** Firstly, your conversation with us is confidential. We do not share details with the wider school community but will need to know exactly what's wrong so that we can offer the right level of support and guidance. We care for every aspect of your child's health and wellbeing from migraines to mental health. Good communication will help us to help you.

#### Parent: Why do I need to call school every day when my child is absent?

**School:** Put simply, we have a duty of care and cannot assume that your child is at home. A daily call to us will give both school and home the confidence of knowing that your child is safe.

#### Parent: I cannot take your calls or make meetings due to work commitments.

**School:** We will endeavour to work around your schedule in the interest of your child. Conversations and face to face meetings are important in building relationships. Family dynamics are unique and so are the interventions we can put in place to help your child to overcome barriers to attendance.

# Parent: My child is anxious and their attendance has dropped, but you want to meet me to discuss this matter. You know why they can't attend, what is the point of this meeting?

**School:** Our meetings are intended to be supportive. We have a team mental health first aiders in school along with a dedicated counsellor. If you are seeking external help it's important to send in your appointment letters and stay in touch.



#### What is our main ethos?

We believe that every pupil can and should achieve their full potential. We realise that pupils will need support to ensure they do so, and we are here to remove academic barriers to learning so that pupils can achieve their full potential. Our aim is to ensure that the overwhelming majority of pupils attend school, lessons and complete their homework, which will result in pupils who make good progress and achieve strong outcomes.

#### What do we do?

We undertake a number of projects and interventions designed to support pupils in making the best progress they can and improve their attitudes to learning. Our work is centred around 3 main values:

#### Attendance • Lessons • Homework

We work closely with the pastoral team to ensure attendance is strong. If pupils are not in school they cannot attend lessons. To support pupil learning and homework completion we undertake the following interventions:

- Academic mentoring We mentor a wide range of pupils who need support in a specific subject or general help in improving their all-round learning habits. This ranges from short drop in to longer 1:2:1 sessions.
- Tutor time interventions We coordinate interventions across a wide range of subjects that give pupils booster sessions to improve their progress across the curriculum. This also includes a highly successful reading intervention where KS3 students read to members of our sixth form.
- Homework hubs These run every lunchtime for all year groups and after school each night. While anyone can attend after school, each year group has a night signposted for them to have priority over computer



access and pupils who fall behind with homework are expected to attend to get up to date.

- **Revision** We coordinate the delivery of revision for Y11 and the after school revision programme that starts after christmas for Y11 students. We have our newly launched "How to Revise" website, the first stop for all of your revision tips and advice, which can be used by every year group.
- After school support We have various staff in school who lead workshops and there are also online sessions and 1:2:1 tuition to offer further subject support within their subjects.
- In lesson support We work closely with Newcastle and Northumbria university who release undergraduate students into school to support our pupils. They work with key groups of pupils in lessons and provide additional subject support after school in our hubs.
- Enrichment opportunities We have organised mentoring through external providers such as NECOP to work with pupils in KS4. In addition to this we have previously run a number of successful trips including a visit to the North East Careers Fair and have had various guest speakers come into school to deliver STEM workshops and also inspirational talks from Cambridge university. While less speakers have been able to visit school, we are arranging a number of virtual opportunities for speakers to deliver sessions online in schools.
- IT support if you haven't got access to a computer at home we can help you with this. Just let the achievement team know and we can help remove this barrier to learning.

# **Tutor Time Activities** Literacy

Pupils should carry a reading book with them at all times as part of their essential equipment at Whickham School. This should be an Accelerated Reader book, which can be from the library or home.

During tutor-time literacy, each year group has a bespoke programme that is tailored to topics across the curriculum. There are also links to current affairs and issues to allow students to develop both vocabulary,

opinion and oracy skills.



Year 7 and 8 pupils follow our Accelerated Reader programme which helps to develop literacy, reading and comprehension skills.

For Years 9, 10 and 11, the book can be fiction or non-fiction. (This could include a novel, a play, a biography / autobiography or travel writing).

#### Why is reading so important?

- Improves your basic grammar, spelling and writing skills and can improve your progress across all subjects.
- Gives you a better and broader vocabulary.
- Gives you self-confidence as a reader.
- Improves your general knowledge.
- Helps you gain a better understanding of different cultures.
- Helps you to empathise and gives you greater insights into human nature and decision-making.





# Numeracy

"A numerate pupil is one who has the ability to cope confidently with the mathematical needs of adult life. There should be an emphasis on the wider aspects of numeracy and not purely the skills of computation."

#### **Cockroft report**

Numeracy is a life skill. It is a proficiency that is developed not just in Mathematics but also across the wider curriculum. Numeracy involves learners having the confidence and competence to use numbers and measures. It requires an understanding of the number system, recalling mathematical techniques and the ability to solve problems in a variety of contexts. A practical understanding of graphs, charts, tables and diagrams is an integral part of Numeracy.

All teachers are teachers of Numeracy. Whickham School is committed to developing numeracy skills in all of our pupils, in the belief that it will support their learning and raise standards across the curriculum because:

- Pupils need to be confident and competent with numbers and measures in order manipulate problems in a range of subjects and contexts.
- Mathematics and Numeracy supports problem solving and the development of lateral thinking.
- Developing a common approach to Numeracy will support the transfer of skills to different subject areas.
- Responding to higher order questions encourages the development of thinking skills and enquiry.
- Improving Numeracy can have an impact on pupils' self-esteem, motivation and behaviour.
- High standards of Numeracy allow pupils to learn independently.

At Whickham School pupils' numeracy development is supported in tutor time by:

- Providing pupils with the opportunity to practice their numerical skills using the Numeracy Ninjas programme.
- During the teaching of numerical skills links to real life situations are made wherever possible.
- Developing their understanding of financial numeracy through activities that expose pupils to bills, loans, savings and investments.
- Develop resilience and forward planning through engagement with strategy activities such as SODUKO.

At home you can support your child with numeracy by discussing and interacting with:

- Utility bills.
- · Current and saving account statements.
- Credit cards and loans.
- Planning a budget get them to help you plan your next holiday.
- Calculating best value for money when shopping.
- Any DIY opportunities to help you measure and plan materials required.
